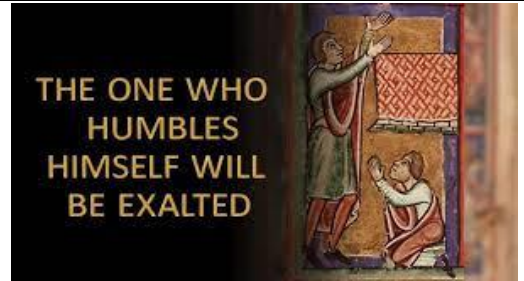

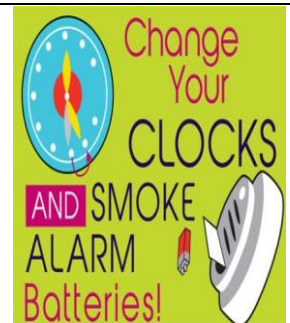

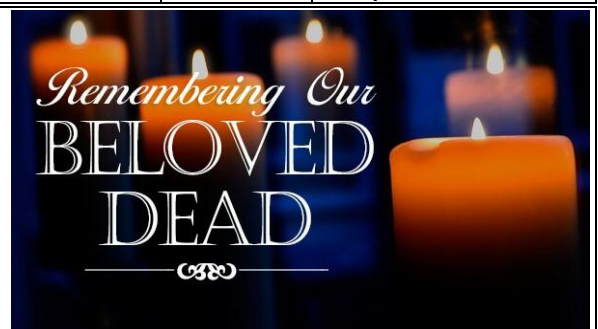

ANN HYLAND RIP: I can't let the weekend pass without saying a few words about our good friend Ann Hyland. Ann lived for most of her life in our neighbouring parish of Gortjordan. However she was a very frequent visitor to our parish supporting all our local Pioneer Association events, promoting the Association in our primary schools and organising the annual Réadóirí Competitions in Glencorrib Community Centre. Not only did she serve on the PTAA Regional Committees, she was President & Secretary of the Connacht Council Pioneer Association on different occasions. She was 100% committed to the PTAA which involved travelling to all parts of the country.

But it was at Gortjordan NS where her heart lay for 34 years (1773-2007). Hundreds of pupils from the school and their parents have had the utmost respect for Ann who taught there for decades along with our Donal Carey and Mo Mullin. She was a fantastic teacher in the junior room which can be very challenging at times, but she called all 'her pupils' 'her chicks' and she was definitely their 'mother hen'. She treated everyone she met with kindness, charity and fairness. She possessed gentle qualities with a caring nature, empathy, calmness and humility. She also possessed a great sense of humour and loved a good laugh. Everyone loved her.

She enjoyed watching sport. Manchester United being her favourite team across the water and naturally being a Mayo lady she was a big Mayo fan and supporter and loved to attend the matches with the family.

Ann was also a religious woman. She loved to attend Mass and Church events and when she retired from teaching; she gave her time to the Kilmaine parish newsletter and took Mass bookings etc. Ann will be missed terribly by her family and her many good friends near and far. 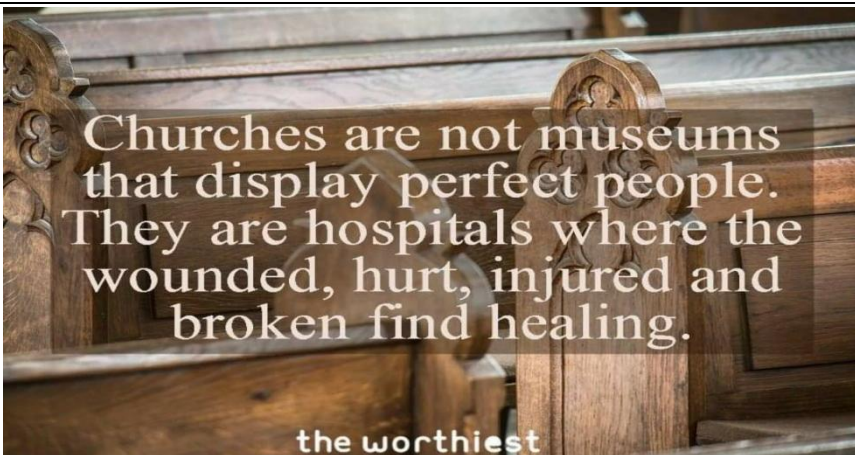
When Tomorrow Starts Without Me

A WORD IN YOUR EAR...

Shakespeare and the Old Testament are the two great fountains of wisdom in western culture. Both sources associate age with wisdom, but in different ways. Shakespeare admonishes his character (and his readers) thus: "As you are old and reverend, you should be wise." In the Old Testament proverb, poverty is preferable to folly: 'It is better to be a poor but wise youth than an old and foolish king who refuses all advice.' And yet we seem to be living in a world where old, foolish and dangerous leaders are asking increasingly impossible things of young people.

Europe is torn by war for the first time since 1945. Russian forces have suffered huge losses in Ukraine. So Vladimir Putin has ordered a "partial mobilisation" to beef up his invasion force. The Economist spoke to several men in St Petersburg about the prospect of conscription. "We have fallen into hell—that's how I see it," said one. Another hoped his poor eyesight would spare him.

The New York Times recently gave its entire front page over to transcripts of intercepted calls made home by young Russian soldiers in the first weeks of the invasion. Most are unsuitable for broadcast, but the overall picture is one of young soldiers appalled at what they've been instructed to do and misled by their supposed superiors. One transcript reads: "Mum, there are bodies everywhere. This is messed up. They said it was a training exercise. But they have told us to kill everyone. They lied to us. Putin is a fool."

Meanwhile, in Iran, young women and girls are refusing to obey the instructions given by their elders as to how to live their lives. After the murder of 16-year-old, Massa Amini by the 'Morality Police' schoolgirls are defiantly chanting 'Woman, Life, Freedom,' at incredible risk to themselves. The authorities responded with tear gas, arrests and beatings.

In both cases, Russia and Iran, these young people have been failed. Their worlds are run by old doddering men who have lost touch with real life. These old fogies are ordering young people - even children - to carry out their impossible instructions.

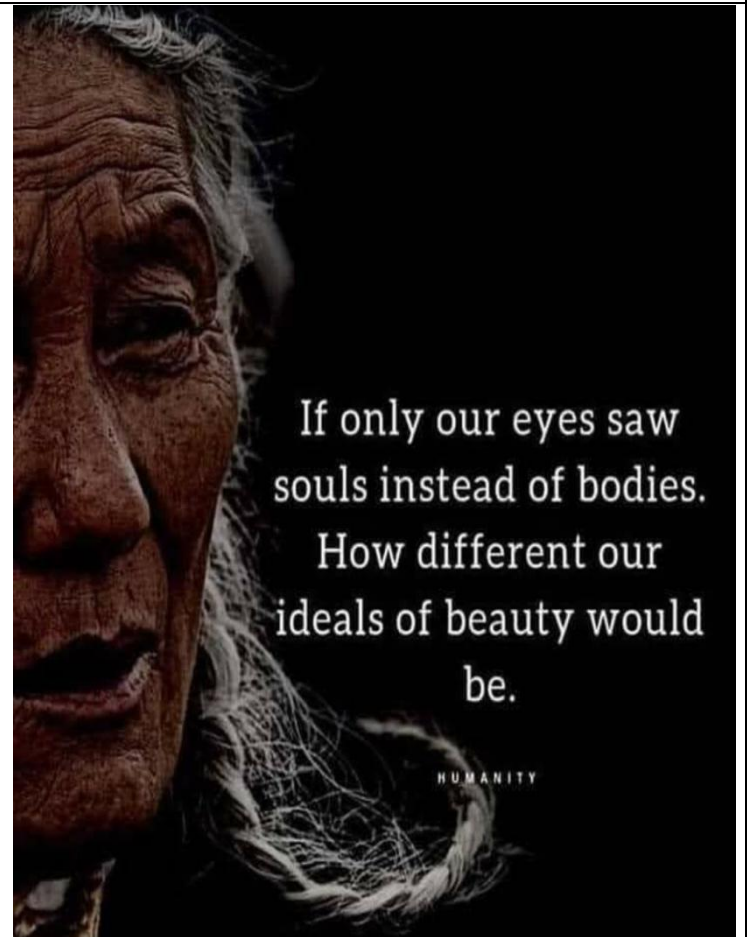
The biblical narrative is clear about what will happen if an older generation burdens its youth: it will provoke them to wrath. Jesus' line on this is stark: if anyone causes the young to go astray or stumble, it would be better for them to be dumped in the sea with a millstone around their neck.

Those with responsibility are asked to instruct the youth in the ways of life. So that when the young are old, they will in their turn do the same for their young. But give them instructions that go against both their consciences and their better instincts, and they will revolt to the point where they risk their own lives. Their brave efforts to bring about the fall of an unjust society are admirable. There is often a disconnect between the expectations of the old and the hopes of the young. In many places the conversation between the generations has broken down. For some, there doesn't even seem to be a conversation. But ways need to be found for it to happen. There are nearly 2 billion young people between the age of 10 and 22 in this world. And many have something helpful to say about the way we should go.

For age doesn't have a monopoly on wisdom. Again, it is better to hear from a poor but wise youth, than an old and foolish leader who refuses all advice.

WEEKEND MASS - SCHEDULE REVIEW

Over the next number of weeks, there will be a count will be taken of numbers attending weekend Masses. Currently, there are 4 Masses celebrated at the weekend – Saturday vigils 6.30pm Glencorrib and 8pm Shrule and on Sunday 9:30am Glencorrib and 11am Shrule. It is no longer possible to ignore the low attendance at some of the Masses as well as the challenges in getting volunteers. Over the next number of weeks there will be a review if this number of Mass are any longer necessary. The primary way in which this will be explored is gauging the level of attendance at each Mass, and if there are sustainable numbers to justify scheduling Mass at that time. This would mean a Mass or Masses no longer be scheduled, with relevant Mass intentions transferred to other Masses.



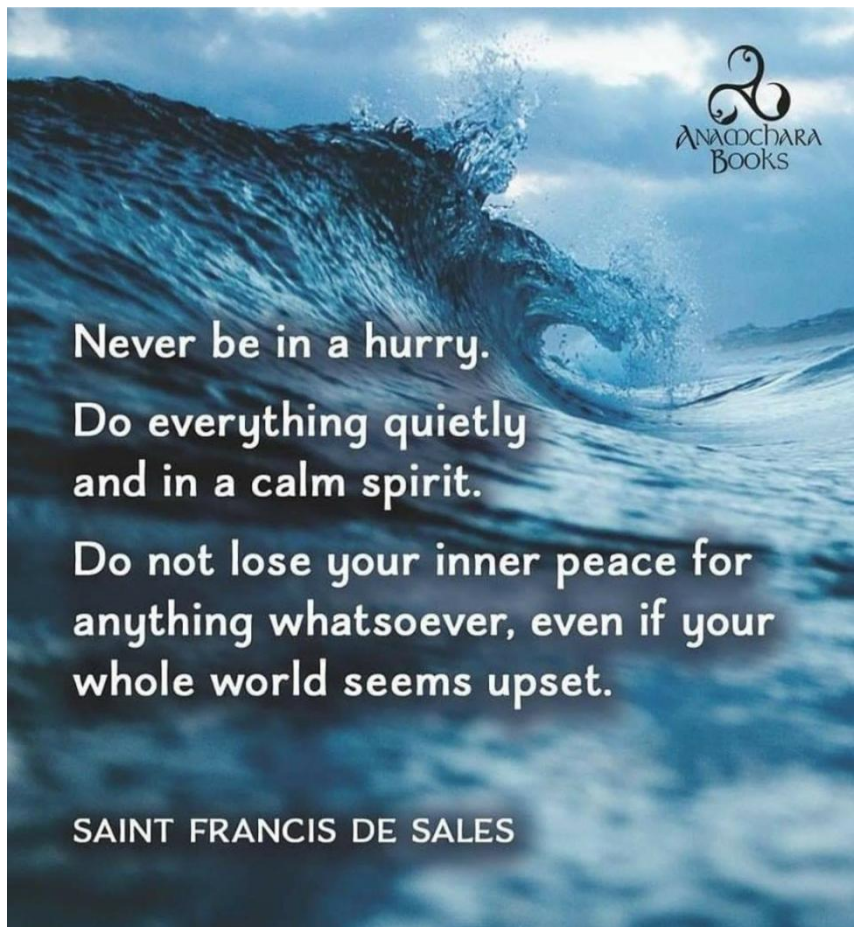
MISSION SUNDAY

It is hard to write on Mission Sunday when our own experience of missionary work is so limited and when I know so many people have given such great service to what we call the missionary fields. I was struck though by the words of one missionary who said that his work in South America was a great privilege and that during that time working with people living without even basic facilities, he came to realise that in the end the most important thing to have is faith in God. No achievements, no wealth, no honours could win eternal life. The only thing that matters is to know Christ Jesus and believe in him who is praying for us as we proclaim the gospel.

That's quite profound because it applies to each and every one of us, missionaries or not. What we are confronted with on this Mission Sunday is a question of faith and belief. We can sit at home and be comfortable and pray and send a few quid to others – and that is important - but there is a calling to all of us to put faith into action. There are many who need the practical gift of time and they are our neighbours, they are those who are frightened in and by these days, they are you and they are me.

The writer Raimundo Panikkar puts it like this: 'The great challenge today is to convert the sacred bread into real bread, the liturgical peace into political peace, the worship of the Creator into reverence for the Creation, the Christian praying community into an authentic human fellowship. It is risky to celebrate the Eucharist. We may have to leave it unfinished, having gone first to give back to the poor what belongs to them.'

And I think it isn't that we see the poor as simply being those without the basic everyday needs, we now can know what Jesus means when he speaks of those who are 'poor in spirit'; people whose spirits are ground down and are heavy burdened. Today we can proclaim that we too are missionaries because we can put faith into action in caring for our brothers, our sisters, our neighbours. By doing simple things we bring Good News, we can be certain that Jesus is in us and with us, and that it is within all of us to bring the hope of a brighter day.

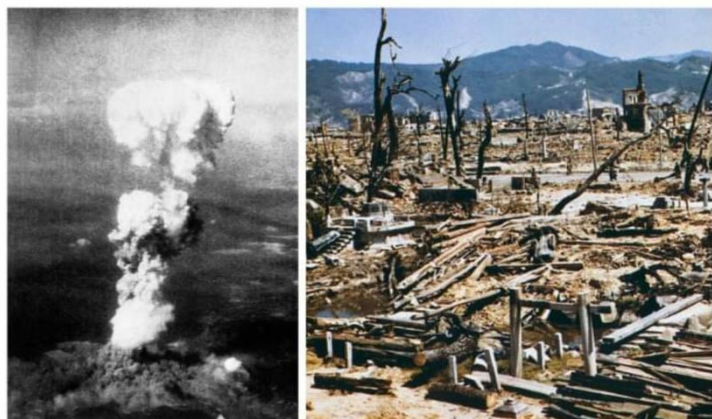

WHY DID JESUS FOLD THE LINEN BURIAL CLOTH AFTER HIS RESURRECTION?

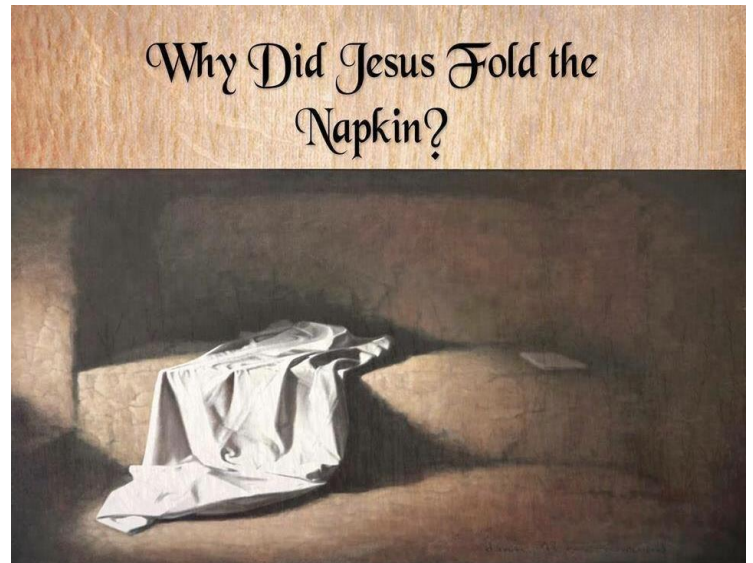
I never noticed this.... The Gospel of John (20:7) tells us that the napkin, which was placed over the face of Jesus, was not just thrown aside like the grave clothes. The Bible takes an entire verse to tell us that the napkin was neatly folded, and was placed separate from the grave clothes.

Early Sunday morning, while it was still dark, Mary Magdalene came to the tomb and found that the stone had been rolled away from the entrance. She ran and found Simon Peter and the other disciple, the one whom Jesus loved. She said, 'They have taken the Lord's body out of the tomb, and I don't know where they have put him!' Peter and the other disciple ran to the tomb to see... The other disciple outran Peter and got there first. He stooped and looked in and saw the linen cloth lying there, but he didn't go in.

Then Simon Peter arrived and went inside. He also noticed the linen wrappings lying there, while the cloth that had covered Jesus' head was folded up and lying to the side. Was that important? Absolutely! Is it really significant? Yes! In order to understand the significance of the folded napkin, you have to understand a little bit about Hebrew tradition of that day. The folded napkin had to do with the Master and Servant, and every Jewish boy knew this tradition.

When the servant set the dinner table for the master, he made sure that it was exactly the way the master wanted it. The table was furnished perfectly, and then the servant would wait, just out of sight, until the master had finished eating, and the servant would not dare touch that table, until the master was finished. Now, if the master were done eating, he would rise from the table, wipe his fingers, his mouth, and clean his beard, and would wad up that napkin and toss it onto the table.

The servant would then know to clear the table. For in those days, the wadded napkin meant, 'I'm done'. But if the master got up from the table, and folded his napkin, and laid it beside his plate, the servant would not dare touch the table, because... **The folded napkin meant, ... I'm coming back! HE'S COMING BACK!!!!**

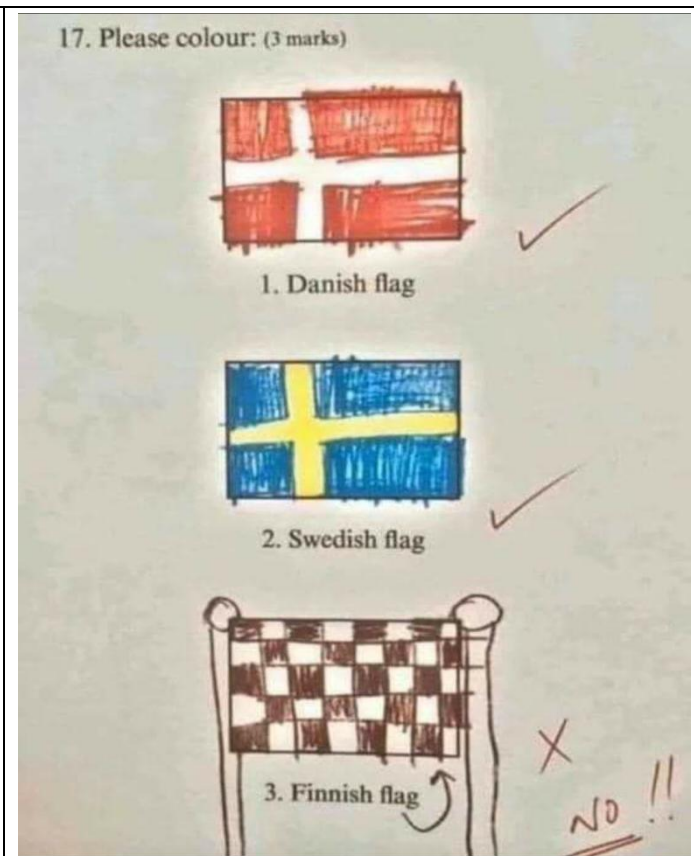
