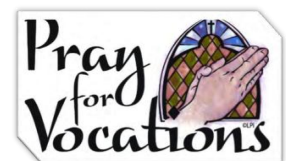

POPE'S MESSAGE FOR THE FIRST WORLD DAY FOR GRANDPARENTS AND THE ELDERLY – PART 1 of 3

The Vatican has released the message of His Holiness Pope Francis for the first World Day for Grandparents and the Elderly, which will be celebrated on Sunday 25th July on the theme 'I am with you always' (Mt 28:20). The text of his message follows below:



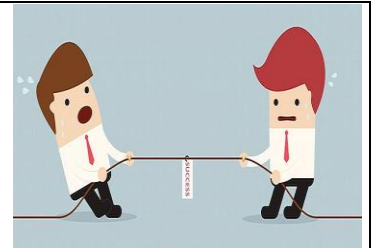
Dear Grandfathers and Grandmothers, Dear Elderly Friends,
“**I am with you always**” (Mt 28:20): this is the promise the Lord made to his disciples before he ascended into heaven. They are the words that he repeats to you today, dear grandfathers and grandmothers, dear elderly friends. “I am with you always” are also the words that I, as Bishop of Rome and an elderly person like yourselves, would like to address to you on this first World Day of Grandparents and the Elderly. The whole Church is close to you – to us – and cares about you, loves you and does not want to leave you alone!

I am well aware that this message comes to you at a difficult time: the pandemic swept down on us like an unexpected and furious storm; it has been a time of trial for everyone, but especially for us elderly persons. Many of us fell ill, others died or experienced the death of spouses or loved ones, while others found themselves isolated and alone for long periods.

The Lord is aware of all that we have been through in this time. He is close to those who felt isolated and alone, feelings that became more acute during the pandemic. Tradition has it that Saint Joachim, the grandfather of Jesus, felt estranged from those around him because he had no children; his life, like that of his wife Anne, was considered useless. So, the Lord sent an angel to console him. While he mused sadly outside the city gates, a messenger from the Lord appeared to him and said, “Joachim, Joachim! The Lord has heard your insistent prayer”. Even at the darkest moments, as in these months of pandemic, the Lord continues to send *angels* to console our loneliness and to remind us: “I am with you always”. He says this to you, and he says it to me. May every grandfather, every grandmother, every older person, especially those among us who are most alone, receive the visit of an *angel*!

JUST A THOUGHT: ‘The Brits’ are very much on our minds this weekend. They will face Italy in the final of the European Cup. Our relationship with them is complex. Some of us will find ourselves wishing Italy on to victory. Yet six of the English panel have Irish grandparents, and are thus eligible to play for Ireland: Coady, Rice, Kane, Maguire, Grealish, and Phillips. In fact Rice and Grealish represented Ireland at underage level. And still we will shout our heads off for Italy.



How do I know this? Well, I shouted my head off for Denmark! And we have an even bigger axe to grind with the Danes than the Brits, as the people of Clontarf will tell you. Fifty four years ago, in 1967, a young Danish student made the mistake of approaching Patrick Kavanagh in Dublin’s The Bailey pub, to discuss matters poetical. He must have been unaware of the long memories Irish people have, or of the relatively recent murder of Brian Boru, or both. In any case, Kavanagh enlightened him. “Get to hell out of Dublin, you treacherous Dane,” he snarled. “You killed our King.” Yet that didn’t prevent me from cheering loudly for the Danes on Thursday night. The Brits seem to annoy us in a unique way. At one level, they are unscrupulous. We see this in the political life of Boris Johnson. He makes a principle of unprincipled behaviour. He had no difficulties making contradictory promises to various factions.

And yet, the Brits are Victorian prudes when it comes to other aspects of behaviour. For instance, CCTV picked up their Minister for Health in an amorous embrace with a woman friend recently. There was a general ambivalence regarding whether to condemn his behaviour or to ignore it as harmless. But the Minister felt compelled to resign his job in any case.

It is sometimes claimed that the morals of the Irish (and English) people are rooted in Victorian respectability rather than in any Christian teaching, a cultural rather than a spiritual matter.

The war of Irish Independence came to an end 100 years ago on this day 11th July 1921. Yet the fascinating rivalry between the two will still go for another while yet.

Amazed by his quick response, the King tried to test him again, "What if there are more crows than you answered?"

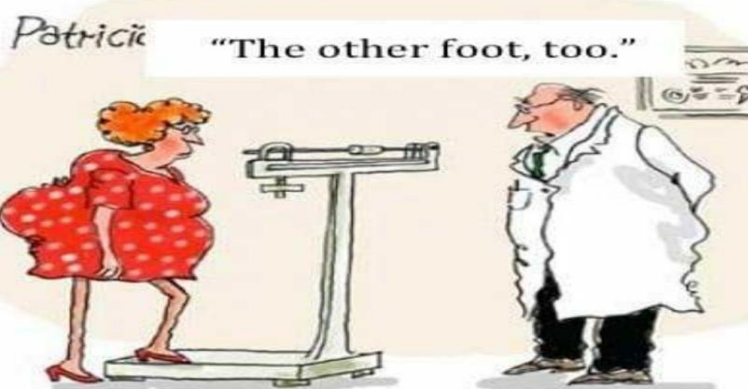
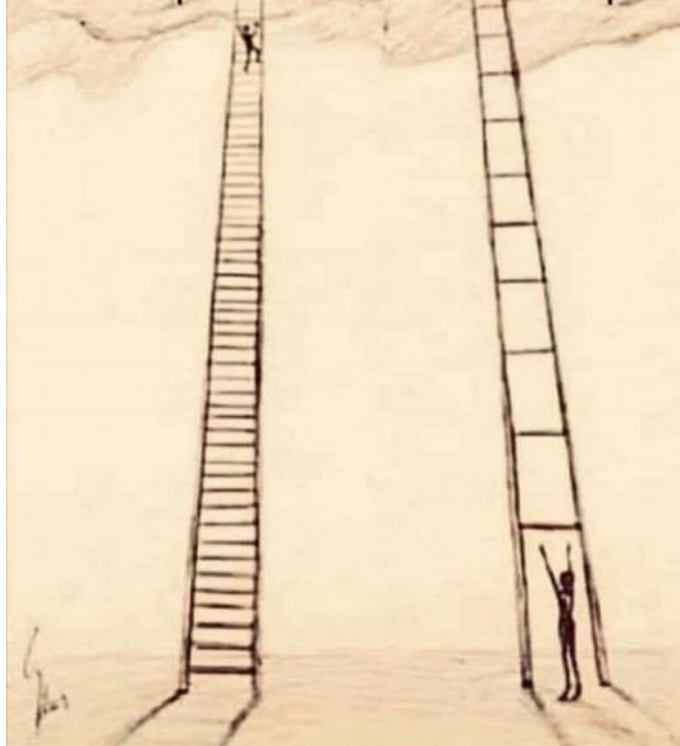

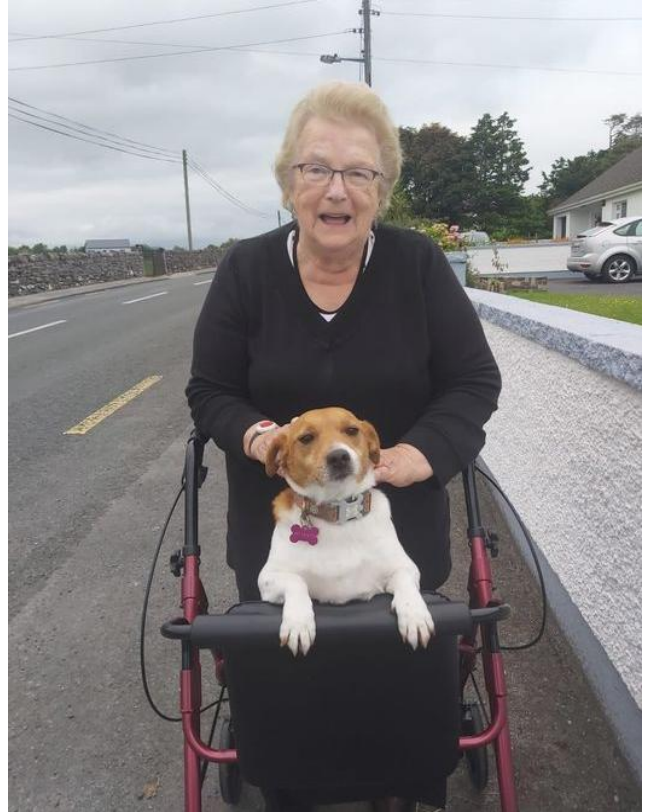
A LITTLE BIT OF HUMOUR

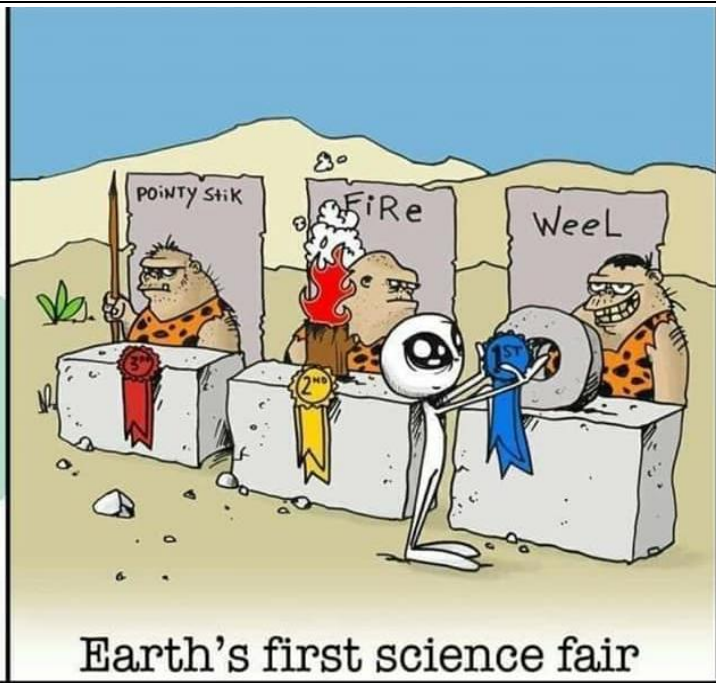

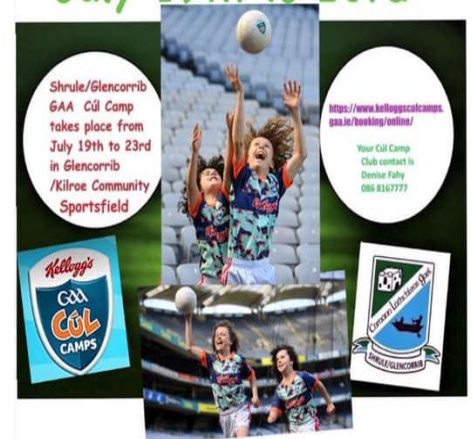

Suddenly, we realized that we were all still holding our roasting forks with marshmallows on them....



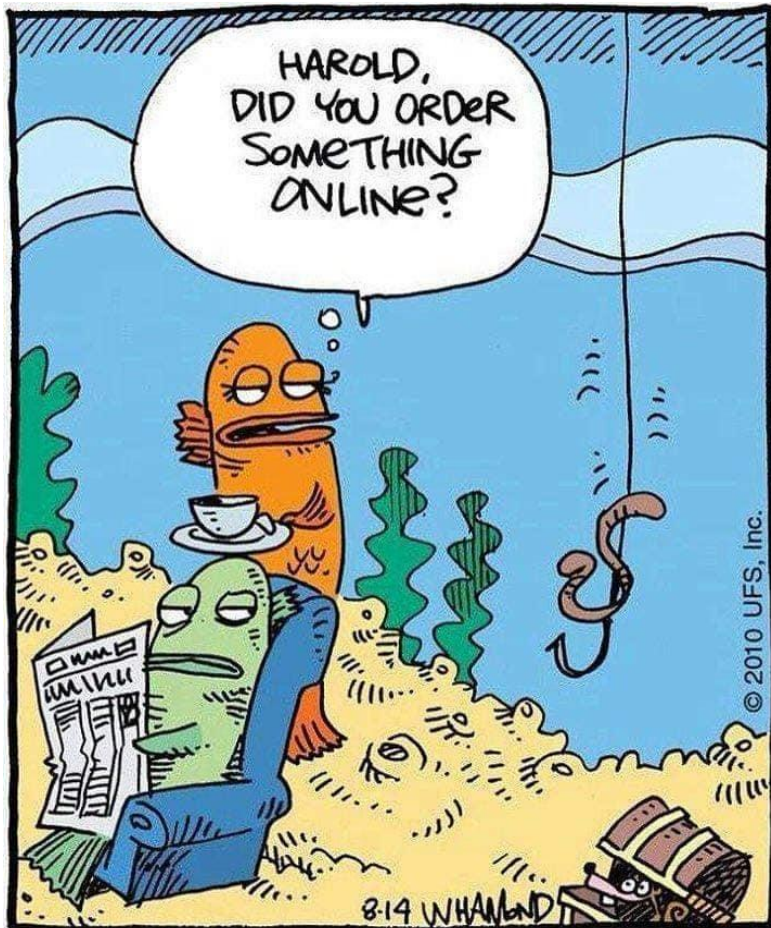
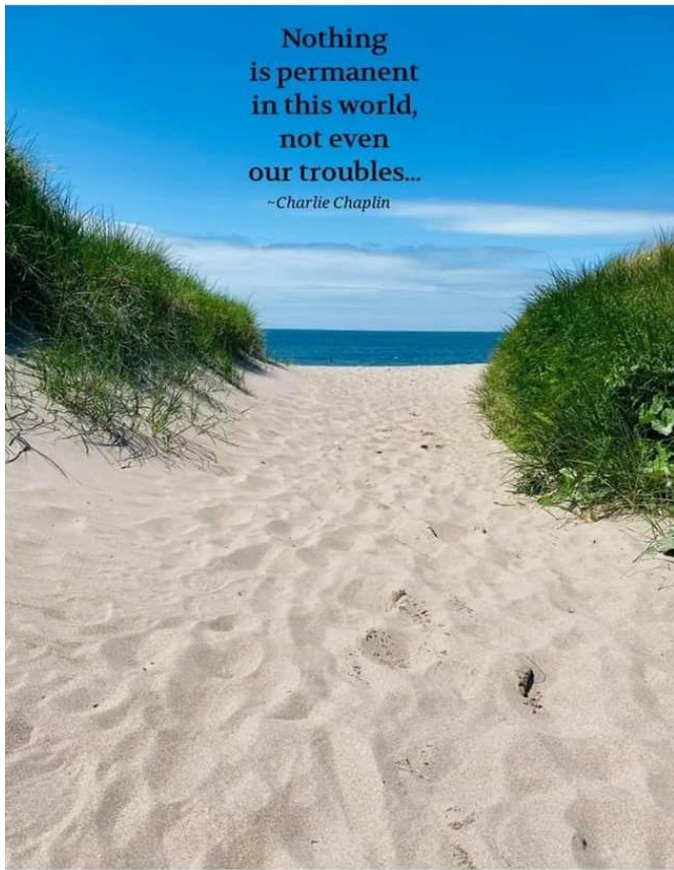

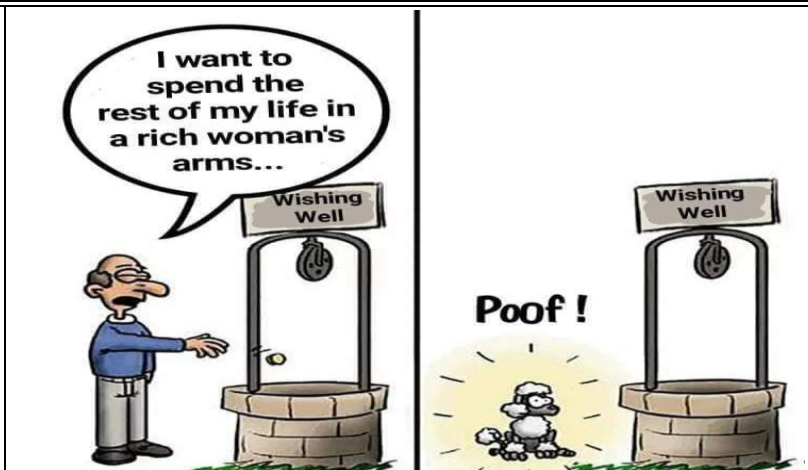

JUST A THOUGH:

The first day of school our professor introduced himself and challenged us to get to know someone we didn't already know. I stood up to look around when a gentle hand touched my shoulder. I turned round to find a wrinkled, little old lady beaming up at me with a smile that lit up her entire being. She said, "Hi handsome. My name is Rose. I'm eighty-seven years old. Can I give you a hug?" I laughed and enthusiastically responded, "Of course you may!" and she gave me a giant squeeze. "Why are you in college at such a young, innocent age?" I asked. She jokingly replied, "I'm



here to meet a rich husband, get married, and have a couple of kids..." "No seriously," I asked. I was curious what may have motivated her to be taking on this challenge at her age.

"I always dreamed of having a college education and now I'm getting one!" she told me. After class we walked to the student union building and shared a chocolate milkshake. We became instant friends. Every day for the next three months, we would leave class together and talk nonstop. I was always mesmerized listening to this "time machine" as she shared her wisdom and experience with me.

Over the course of the year, Rose became a campus icon and she easily made friends wherever she went. She loved to dress up and she revelled in the attention bestowed upon her from the other students. She was living it up.

At the end of the semester we invited Rose to speak at our football banquet. I'll never forget what she taught us. She was introduced and stepped up to the podium. As she began to deliver her prepared speech, she dropped her three by five cards on the floor. Frustrated and a little embarrassed she leaned into the microphone and simply said, "I'm sorry I'm so jittery. I gave up beer for Lent and this whiskey is killing me! I'll never get my speech back in order so let me just tell you what I know."



As we laughed she cleared her throat and began, "We do not stop playing because we are old; we grow old because we stop playing. There are only four secrets to staying young, being happy and achieving success. You have to laugh and find humour every day. You've got to have a dream. When you lose your dreams, you die. We have so many people walking around who are dead and don't even know it!

There is a huge difference between growing older and growing up. If you are nineteen years old and lie in bed for one full year and don't do one productive thing, you will turn twenty years old. If I am eighty-seven years old and stay in bed for a year and never do anything I will turn eighty-eight. Anybody can grow older. That doesn't take any talent or ability. The idea is to grow up by always finding opportunity in change. Have no regrets.

The elderly usually don't have regrets for what we did, but rather for things we did not do. The only people who fear death are those with regrets." She concluded her speech by courageously singing "The Rose." She challenged each of us to study the lyrics and live them out in our daily lives.

At the year's end Rose finished the college degree she had begun all those years ago. One week after graduation Rose died peacefully in her sleep.

Over two thousand college students attended her funeral in tribute to the wonderful woman who taught by example that it's never too late to be all you can possibly be.
