

#### MESSAGE OF THE IRISH CATHOLIC BISHOPS FOR THE DAY FOR LIFE - 3rd OCTOBER 2021

The fragility of life and the reality of death have been brought into sharp focus during the Covid-19 pandemic. In Ireland alone, more than 8,000 people have died with Covid-19. Each of these lives is precious and every life matters. With a most amazing spirit of solidarity, the energies of our society - in hospitals, test centres, vaccination clinics, schools, churches, supermarkets and in so many other places - have been directed towards protecting those who were most vulnerable to disease. We have begun to see the fruits of those efforts.

While all of this was going on, the Oireachtas was being asked to discuss legislation to provide for assisted suicide. That particular piece of legislation, thank God, has been rejected by the Oireachtas Committee for Justice on the grounds that it was deeply flawed. The surprising and disappointing thing is that the Oireachtas Committee did not reject the principle of Assisted



Suicide and has proposed that Assisted Suicide be discussed further by a special committee, which would report within a specified timeframe.

Compassion is often presented as a justification for assisted suicide, but having compassion means "suffering with" someone. Assisted suicide reflects a failure of compassion on the part of society. It is a failure to respond to the challenge of caring for people who are terminally ill, or who have disabilities or dementia, as they approach the end of their lives. Those who assist with a suicide, whatever their motives, co-operate with the self-destruction of another person. It is one thing when life is allowed to take its natural course, with appropriate management of pain and stress, but is not artificially prolonged by burdensome treatment. It is something else entirely, when one person actively and deliberately participates in ending the life of another.

One feature of the legalisation of Assisted Suicide in other jurisdictions is that, once it becomes lawful, it is then presented and perceived as something good to do. Instead of being surrounded by love and care, people who are already vulnerable and dependent on others due to their illness, are made to feel that assisted suicide would be "the decent thing to do".

Assisted suicide presumes that there will be somebody with the required skills who is prepared to "assist" in bringing about the death of another person. Wherever assisted suicide is legalised, healthcare professionals are assumed to be the "suitably qualified persons" because they are already licensed to use drugs. It is important to be clear that healthcare professionals are given privileged access to the human body and to drugs for the express purpose of healing and alleviating pain. Any suggestion that they should be expected to assist and, under certain circumstances, actually perform the act that ends the life of another person, is seriously damaging to the ethos and the credibility of the healthcare professions.

Jesus gave us the image of the good Samaritan as the model for our compassion and our solidarity with those who find themselves vulnerable and who fear being abandoned in their final illness. The Good Samaritan is one who "crosses over", who "binds up wounds" and who, most important of all "stays with" the person for as long as is required.

There is much that we can do to foster a culture of life. We can begin by overcoming our fear of talking honestly about death and dying. Dying is as natural and universal as living and breathing yet our society can make it difficult for people to talk about it. As Christians, of course, our faith in the Resurrection of Jesus will stand to us. For some, if not for all, the support of prayer, and the opportunity to share faith can be of great help.

The Hospice Care Movement fosters a culture of living well until the end. By doing normal things with people who are terminally ill, we can contribute to fostering their sense of being "normal", which can often be undermined by the "routine of illness". The experience of presence, companionship and even the acceptance of limitation and dependency, when we take time to appreciate them, can greatly enrich the later stages of life.

The attitude of Jesus towards the sick and towards those who are in any way marginalised, has much to teach us about the value of time spent caring for one another. Many of us, at times, are called to be carers in our own circle of family and friends. Others may find it possible to care for the carers. The bonds of friendship and solidarity that are developed and strengthened in caring relationships extend beyond the carer and the one who is cared for to the whole of society.

#### **JUST A THOUGHT 2:**

Fifty years ago this month, in September 1971, Ray Tomlinson was a young engineer working with a Boston firm. His boss had given him a very general task: figure out some ways in which humans and computers can interact. Tomlinson started tinkering with the interaction - or lack of it - between distant colleagues who didn't answer their phones.

He then began sending messages between two computers in his office. "The keyboards were about 10 feet apart," he remembers. "I could wheel my chair from one to the other and type a message on one, and then go to the other, and then see what I had tried to send." He eventually found a way to



send messages from one computer to another - inventing the system we now know as e-mail. The first email was never preserved because as Tomlinson observed, 'test messages were entirely forgettable and I have, therefore, forgotten them'. Today, more than a billion people around the world send an email message every day. Tomlinson says that back in 1971, he did have some idea of the long-term impact his invention would have. "But I never imagined how quickly that would happen" he said.

Technology changes the world rapidly. In a new book, 'Exponential', Azeem Azhar sees unparalleled change today due to the accelerating development of computing, Artificial Information, renewable energy, biotech and manufacturing. He suggests a growing gap between new technologies and our ability to keep pace or to cope. He asks about the extent to which such technologies can be harnessed in the service of society or whether their momentum will simply leave us floundering behind?

Some react against the power of technology by resisting or rejecting it. Some religious thinkers have used the story in Genesis of God's judgment falling on the people of Babel who pushed the limits of their skills to build a vast tower. But as the story makes clear, the folly is not the building of the tower in itself but the motives behind it - the desire to be seen as great and the false sense of security that technology might give. For me, the Biblical idea of human beings, made in the image of God, with the gift of creativity is to be celebrated as much in engineering and technology, as in art or music. This gift is to be treasured but also used responsibly and unselfishly for the good

of all and the glory of God.

Technology is at the heart of future of humanity, whether in the presence of new nuclear submarines in the contested South China Seas or in both the cause and mitigation of the climate crisis. How it serves the world for good is a question for all to engage.

Ray Tomlinson never achieved the fame of other inventors. Yet, his playing with a Great Idea changed the world. Later he

Great Idea changed the world. Later he commented, 'I think the only "dismay" I feel is over the tendency to blame the medium for what is a human tendency to

misuse certain tools. Technology has such positive possibilities.'



Tomlinson's technological optimism found solid support not just in the proliferation of his own invention, the Internet, but in the recent discovery and administration of the Covid vaccines. It is difficult to imagine such an efficient delivery of the vaccine without the existence of the Internet. Tomlinson remains a neglected genius.

#### **AROUND THE WORLD**

**COVID & EUROPE**: European countries with insufficient vaccination coverage could be in serious trouble if they relax Covid-19 restrictions in the next few weeks, according to a new report by the European Center for Disease Prevention and Control. So far, only three of the bloc's 27 member countries have fully inoculated more than 75 percent of their residents, according to the agency's data. Just over 62 percent of the bloc's total population is fully vaccinated, and eastern nations like Romania and Bulgaria are far behind wealthier countries to the west. That level of vaccine coverage will not be enough to forestall outbreaks when pandemic restrictions are relaxed, the agency warned, especially now that the Delta variant is the bloc's dominant strain.

**COVID & AFRICA**: Only nine African countries have met a target of vaccinating 10 percent of their populations against Covid-19 by the end of September, the World Health Organization said on Thursday — a statistic that illustrates how far the continent is lagging behind global vaccination rates.

**VATICAN SPECULATION** about a papal resignation due to ill health has appeared over recent weeks, most of it originating among some Italian commentators. This is wide of the mark. Following an intestinal operation at the beginning of July, the Pope spent the rest of that month recovering before returning to normal duties in August. The only sign he may not yet be firing on all cylinders was when he told a group of lawyers in the Vatican last week that he would address them sitting down, as he'd been advised to avoid standing by his doctors. In his first interview since the operation, the Pope was asked by Cope, a Spanish radio network, how his health was. "I am still alive!" he joked. He went on to dismiss the rumours that he was planning to resign: "Always when the Pope is ill there is a breeze or a hurricane about a conclave."



Kenya

**KENYA:** Kenya's Catholic bishops have moved to ban politicians from addressing congregations from church platforms ahead of August 2022 general elections. Bishops' conference chairman Archbishop Martin Kivuva Musonde said: "We firmly state that our places of worship and liturgy are sacred and do not serve as political arenas."

AUSTRALIA & USA: A security pact between US, the UK and Australia that will enable Australia to build nuclear-powered submarines for the first time has come under criticism from some church groups. The trilateral agreement, announced last week, is seen as an effort to counter China in the region. Pax Christi International said on 17 September that "even as the world bans nuclear weapons, countries still spend, militarise and put the world at risk." In Australia, Joe Camilleri of Pax Christi Victoria said that Australia "has saddled itself with a vast military project of unknown cost and duration".



#### **GOD LOVES US NO MATTER WHAT:**



do we want to leave to those who come after us, to children who are now growing up?'




