FREE OFFICE SKILLS COURSE:



HISTORICAL SGK FIELD NAMES PROJECT:

On Monday evening last 16TH October, Historical SGK had a workshop in Glencorrib Kilroe Community Centre with archaeologist Dr. Eva Campbell in relation to our field name project. This project has generated huge enthusiasm by the group and it will be a very interesting project over the next few months.

Some group members have already started and we have already discovered some wonderful field names like "Poll a' Mhadra Uisce" (the otters lair / low place of the otter), "Teach na Stile" (the Still House for making Poitín), "Crocán na gCnámh"



(the hill of the bones - maybe an old burial site), "Crocán na Saighdiúirí" (the hill of the soldiers), "Cam Oiléan" (the crooked island, "Príosún" (Prison Island), "Crann Cam" (the crooked tree - a bad corner on the road in Ballynalty, "Sceach a' Dúinín" (the bush by the fort), "the Roinntín" (the little division / plot of land), "Oileán na mBráthar" (the priest's island- on the Black river where the monks stayed for a while after the left Ross Abbey, "Garrai na frankach" etc.

Recording field names is a very valuable way to preserve the local heritage. Simple field names like "Barley Field," "Potato Field," "Shed Field,", "Paddock", "Craig", "the field with the 20 trees", "The Gardens" and others, offer glimpses into the agricultural practices and land use patterns of the past.

Since the arrival of the bulldozer in the 1970s and 1980s, the current landscape of the parish has changed a lot. However to recreate the old landscape and fields names before they are forgotten, we have been supplied with lots of old maps that we can use to trace where these old fields were and to name them. It would be a shame to lose this important piece of our heritage. At our October meeting in Shrule, we allocated group members to each townland / village in the parish. This person will contact the land owners in that townland in the coming weeks with a view of recording some of your local field names.

A Word in your ear...

On Sunday morning last, a brown-and white capsule that spent the last seven years swooping through the solar system had finally come home. And it had brought with it a cosmic souvenir: a parcel of space rock that scientists are hungry to get their hands on.

On Sunday morning last, those scientists waited eagerly as the pod shot through Earth's atmosphere at thousands of miles per hour. It gently parachuted down into the damp Utah desert, about 80 miles west of Salt Lake City, at 8:52 am local time. It brings an end to a mission that took seven years, involved a journey of 4 billion miles, and cost more than a billion dollars.

The capsule's landing is a major win for NASA's mission. The spacecraft set out in 2016 to retrieve material from Bennu, a carbon-rich asteroid about 190 feet wider than the height of the Empire State Building in New York. Researchers hope this pristine space dirt will reveal clues about the birth of our solar system and the genesis of life on Earth.

At first I felt quite cynical as I followed the story of this space capsule. With all this world's suffering and conflict, how could it be right to spend billions on space exploration? Wouldn't this money have been better spent tackling poverty and other injustices? The Gospels tell us that some of Jesus's disciples asked similar questions when a woman anointed him with expensive perfume in the week before his death. Jesus rebuked them, telling them that she had done a beautiful thing for which she would always be remembered.

Gradually, my cynicism has given way to a sense of awe. The insistence that every human activity must be commodified in terms of its usefulness and cost drains us of curiosity and imagination. G.K. Chesterton wrote that "the world will never starve for want of wonders, but only for want of wonder." The material collected from that asteroid weighs about nine ounces - less than a small bag of sugar - yet scientists are hopeful that it might help to explain how life on Earth began. Samples are being distributed to laboratories around the world, and they are saving some of the material so that future generations can analyse it with perhaps even greater expertise. In these dark times, this bold, far-reaching endeavour is surely a cause for wonder.

Yet even as we make vast progress in science and technology, the questions we ask have changed very little. It is of the very essence of our humanity to ask questions about life's origins. This is part of our search for meaning amidst the struggles and vulnerabilities of the human condition. Like us, the ancient sages of all the world's religions and philosophies sought to understand the nature of the universe and our place within it. Our desire for meaning leads us to ask not just what, when and how, but also why? For that, we need poets and artists, philosophers and theologians, myth makers and storytellers, as well as scientists and inventors. I feel a sense of amazement that today, in an American laboratory, a handful of matter from space might be about to reveal something about the origins of life, which are our origins. The words of the Old Testament psalmist come to mind:

"When I consider your heavens, the work of your hands, the moon and the stars that you have made, what is man that you care for him, mortal man that you keep him in mind?"

Would your child(ren) be interested in becoming an altar server?

Pupils from third class upward are welcome to become altar servers – no experience necessary!

It is a long tradition in families that children become altar servers, just as their mom and dad before them. Altar servers have a long history in the church and in celebration of various liturgies, especially on weekends. Apart from enhancing the way liturgy is celebrated, becoming an altar server allows a child to grow in confidence and self-esteem by working and carrying out various activities in public, along with learning collaboration, teamwork, cooperation, and communication skills that are the basic blocks of society and the social framework.

The aim, depending on numbers, will be to form teams that will be put into a Rota. It would be hoped that each team would have pupils from various classes allowing the students to learn from each other. While this will be the guide in forming teams, every effort will be made to accommodate pupils and parents/quardians.

Finally, in line with child safety policy, each team is required to have TWO adult supervisors. Clergy count as 1, so another adult is required. The previous policy whereby parents/quardians of a team would take it in turns to be supervisor will NO LONGER be necessary. This is due to several parents volunteering to take this role. This means that if your child wishes to become an altar server, it will not necessitate you being Garda Vetted.
