<u>Srebrenica – a Place of Tears.</u>

Srebrenica is a site in Bosnia Herzegovina which will be remembered for generations to come. In July 1995, following the breakup of Yugoslavia, thousands of Muslims in an attempt to escape a Serb onslaught sought refuge in a chicken hatchery outside the town in the hope of being protected by a small UN peacekeeping force. The UN however were unable to hold off the advancing Bosnian Serbs and what followed was one of the worst acts of genocide to take place in Europe since World War 1. Almost 8000 men and boys were systematically taken from the building and executed.

I visited Srebrenica some years ago. The remains of the chicken hatchery is still standing and on the day on which I visited it was open, enabling any few visitors who happened on the place to walk through. Although now just a large empty abandoned building myself and I somehow felt the fear and horror of those fleeing civilians who had huddled there in their thousands.

Across the road from the hatchery stands the Srebrenica Memorial Centre, the site in which thousands upon thousands of graves are marked by rows of white headstones. It is a sad place, a quiet place, a holy place. As we made our way through the vast cemetery looking at the headstones we couldn't but notice that many of the headstones bore no inscription whatsoever — the work of identifying the bodies is still ongoing. We also noted that that there were no crosses over the graves — these were the graves of Muslim men and boys and this atrocity was inflicted on them by so called 'Christian' forces. Our sadness was tinged with shame, and we had a sense of being intruders on this sacred ground.

On the day we visited the Memorial there seemed to be no one there bar ourselves. We spoke in reverential whispers and before leaving stopped to offer a quiet prayer. Just as we were about to leave we saw that two other men had entered and, like ourselves, were silently taking in the horror of the events which this memorial was commemorating.

Our paths crossed and we paused to greet each other. They were visiting from America and one of them happened to be an Iman – a Muslim religious leader. I identified myself as a Catholic priest and we spoke for a while.

We spoke of the sadness of that place and of a world which is divided and broken in so many ways because of religious beliefs. We spoke of the importance that places like Srebrenica have as reminders to the world of the evils of war and of religious fundamentalism. We finished by saying a prayer together for those buried in the graves around which we were standing but also for those who continue to be persecuted because of their ethnicity or faith. As we were leaving we instinctively reached out and hugged each other. We left with tears in our eyes.
