

PARISH NEWS - MASS LIVE STREAMING UPDATE

Last year, when the parish began streaming weekend liturgies on the parish Facebook at the start of the pandemic in the first lockdown, it was done in response to some parishioners unable to tune into the parish radio. The living streaming with view it would be a short and temporary requirement. It was never intended to become a regular and indeed necessary element to liturgies, especially funerals.

As many are aware, the living streaming of liturgies provided some source of comfort to many who were unable to leave their home or attend. Owing to occasion mishaps, to ensure more reliable streaming; proper cameras and equipment are now being installed in churches in Shrule and Glencorrib so it is now possible for all public liturgies to be live streamed. There should be now a noticeable improvement in both sound and quality of picture.





"BONFIRE NIGHT" OR ST. JOHN'S EVE

June 23rd, is Bonfire night, otherwise known as St. John's eve, traditionally a big bonfire was lit after sunset in a village or public area. Everyone attended and it was typically a festive occasion of celebration. Farming families would take embers or coals from this fire at home time and throw them in their fields for good luck, that's what my dad's family grew up doing anyway. I love traditions; there are usually a thousand different versions!! Some took cold ashes to protect the potatoes from blight... the famine tales of the past still keeping the anxiety alive in the hearts of every farmer.

Fires were an opportunity for communities to gather, eat, dance and sing! The flames were believed to hold great power for fertility of both women and land (great harvest). Some even lit the hearth fires in their homes from the embers of the community fire, another pirseog to bring good luck into the home and ward off evil spirits. Fire, the light, often used to ward off evil, the darkness.

St. John's Eve is the day before the feast of John the Baptist, and very close to the Summer Solstice on June 21st. It is probable that St. John's night is a result of changing times where Pagan festivals were converted to Christian holidays with similar celebrations.

I grew up in Shrule and Bonfire night was a big thing... we'd be gathering for weeks! It was a great opportunity for every house in the village to burn their crap! The fire was always in the village green, beside the River. My dad owned the garage the other side of the river (the wrong side, the Galway side, but we won't get into that today ()... anyhow he was a very popular man, and we were a very popular family in the weeks leading up to Bonfire night!!! Why? One word... Tyres! Yes I know, I know, environmentalists are losing their hair reading this, but well... far from knowing anything about damage to the ozone layer, we were reared!

Dad claimed to hate this time of the year as he would be pestered for weeks on end for tyres and anything to burn, but I think he secretly got a kick out of the smiles and recognition from every young lad in the village from the beginning of May... their way to start building rapport now so that they could approach him in June! It was also an opportunity for cheap labour and a good clear out of his yard! Mind you, the man at one with the workings of an engine never appreciated the interruption of the constant traipsing of every child and teenager in the village in through the garage in search of tyres! I have no doubt that some of the villagers picked up some choice words to colour up their vocabulary on those trips into his world of grease and exhaust fumes!

There was nothing quite like the sight of a convoy of young people rolling tyres from the garage down the road to "the pile"... the same black spot burnt into the grass from previous years... positioning was everything... stay away from the telephone poles and wires!

We were engineers in the making, we were good in collaboration... we had to work together to manoeuvre and steer giant tractor wheels from the back yard of Hyland's Garage over the bridge and down to the green without losing momentum or crashing into a car! The bigger the pile, the more pumped up our chests were with pride! Our village was THE BEST! Bragging rights with the Zulus or Queallys was always on the table.

There were many occasions when the fire literally burned for days on end... and the thick black smoke that filled the sky and ordained our clothes and our hair was a source of great excitement and joy. True, we should probably have worried about our planet and our lungs, but our innocence has me looking back fondly as I think of the orange light and the shadows across my friends faces as we sat and stuffed our faces with penny sweets from Teresa Greaney's and talked about

everything and everyone!! We hadn't learnt how to be politically correct either yet! As the years went on the penny sweets turned into a flaggin' or a tin of harp or a cigarette.... but our lack of political correctness remained about the same!

Yes, the untold damage we did to the planet in our naivety is massively regrettable; we had yet to know any better. However, at the same time, we did absolute wonders for our mental health. We sat, we talked, we sang, we laughed, we connected, no one had to be invited, being alive was your invitation, we were all part of something bigger... no had to be welcomed, you just belonged, everyone belonged... we were happy to belong.

Those were great, great days.



'TALITHA CUM'

In today's Gospel we hear two healing stories: Jairus' daughter and the woman with a haemorrhage. At first glance these stories might not seem to have a lot in common. The woman is a complete social outcast because of her condition, yet Jesus calls her 'daughter'. He does not let social convention dictate who can be called a child of God. Jesus reminds the people of this woman's true identity. The synagogue official surprises us, pleasantly, with his faith in Jesus and his message. What these two characters have in common is faith against all the odds as they reach out to Jesus in faith-filled action. There are those in the story who laugh when Jesus says he can bring back Jairus' daughter.

They are sent away. Jesus' healing breaks down the barriers that isolate us from one another and from God. We can all recall times when we were struggling. We needed something to move us, to help us forgive, to help us walk away or to relieve us of physical pain. In the end it can be the simple gestures that save us: a kind word, someone praying for us, a gentle touch or we reach out to someone and like the woman with the haemorrhage we suddenly feel within ourselves that we are healing. These accounts show us something of how God's grace can enter our lives and transform situations. Mark leaves untranslated Jesus' native language when he restores the young girl to life: 'Talitha cum' – a beautiful phrase meaning: 'Little girl, get up!'. Jairus' daughter has been given new life; the woman has also been given new life. Both have overcome barriers that were keeping them from being free. We know what those barriers are for each of us. God's grace is gentle yet can bring life to situations of death. What do you need healing from today? Bring this to prayer.

After putting Sienna in her pram, I took a look at his phone which was a really old Nokia. As he didn't have a smart phone I told him that he wouldn't be able to view it. So, I forwarded the message to my phone and eventually managed to open the picture. He was so emotional seeing his great granddaughter for the first time and you could see his love for them both through his teary eyes.

The man insisted on giving me £20 to treat my daughter to a toy as a thank you for helping him which I insisted I didn't want, but he was having none of it. So, I asked him to wait there and I went to boots and printed the photo for him and ended up buying a frame for it too.

When I returned with the framed photo, he was so happy, literally overwhelmed.


