They came is all sorts of shapes and sizes; there were big ones and small ones, pudgy ones and skinny ones, tall ones and short ones. They were made from wood, from glass and from pottery. Some were plastic, others were fine china. There was even one which was knitted out of wool. Some were missing a finger or two, others had their heads glued back on. Some came on their own, others were in their mangers and some even came with the whole crib for company. In all there were over 60 Baby Jesus' to be blessed at Masses last weekend. As I admired the beautiful collection of little statues I wondered at their exquisite uniqueness. Although several of them were very similar, no two were exactly the same. Each was special and easily identifiable to their family. Each has their own connection to a family's story, holding a special place in the memories of adult and child alike. The wobbly leg a reminder of a fall some twenty years ago, a missing arm testimony to the enthusiasm of a teething toddler, the glued-on head a quick and 'temporary' fix before mammy might spot it.

The dusted down and much loved family crib which makes its annual appearance once a year brings with it its own story. It reminds us of Christmases past and fills us with happy (and sometimes sad) memories of moments shared with family and friends. And at the heart of the Crib is our Baby Jesus, sometimes slightly wonky, sometimes a little worse for wear, sometimes so fragile that it cannot be touched but always so special to the family in whose story it plays a unique part.

After Mass last weekend when families came up to the altar to collect their Baby Jesus they were very careful to pick out their own. There may have been 'better' ones there, there may have been newer ones there, there may even have been nicer ones there, but each family wanted their own Baby Jesus back. Somehow that little statue had found a unique and special place in the heart of the family and without it there at the centre of the family crib, Christmas would not be the same.

Isn't that the truth of Christmas. Somehow Jesus manages to be born into our lives in ways which are unique to each of us. He finds a way to make His home in our hearts no matter how well or how poorly we prepare. Jesus is the gift which perfectly fits the size of every heart, and the heart of every home.
