A reading from the holy Gospel according to John

Just before the Jewish Passover Jesus went up to Jerusalem, and in the Temple

he found people selling cattle and sheep and pigeons, and the money changers sitting at their counters there. Making a whip out of some cord, he drove them all out of the Temple, cattle and sheep as well, scattered the money changers' coins, knocked their tables over and said to the pigeon-sellers, 'Take all this out of here and stop turning my Father's house into a market.' Then his disciples remembered the words of scripture: Zeal for your house will devour me. The Jews intervened and said, 'What sign can you show us to justify what you have done?' Jesus answered, 'Destroy this sanctuary, and in three days I will raise it up.' The Jews replied, 'It has taken forty-six years to build this sanctuary: are you going to raise it up in three days?' But he was speaking of the sanctuary that was his body, and when Jesus rose from the dead, his disciples remembered that he had said this, and they believed the scripture and the words he had said. During his stay in Jerusalem for the Passover many believed in his name when they saw the signs that he gave, but Jesus knew them all and did not trust himself to them; he never needed evidence about any man; he could tell what a man had in him.

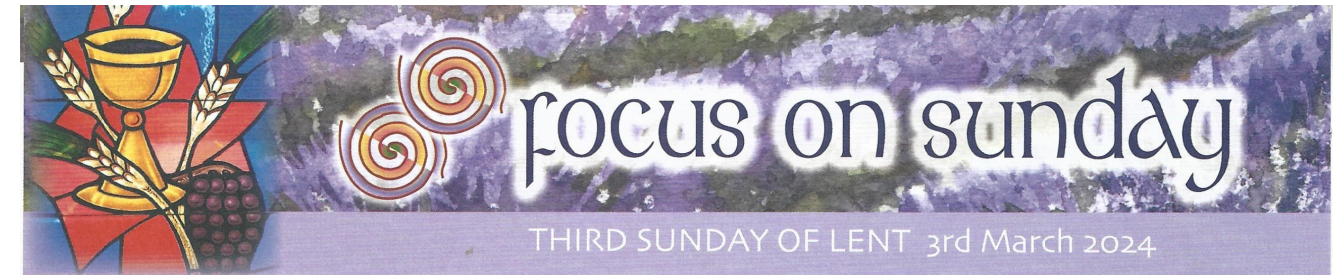

THE REAL TEMPLE IS INSIDE OF EACH OF US



Zeal for your house will consume me'
 In a rare occurrence, we hear of Jesus' anger in today's scripture as he loses his cool with those selling goods in the most sacred place of worship, the Jerusalem Temple. The goods sold in the Temple markets were used in sacrifices so that people could be considered ritually clean in order to be closer to God. It was a model of religion that was exploitative and needed challenging. Jesus is overcome with righteous anger because of the injustice he sees before him; this sacred place (*hieros*) was now a marketplace. What sacred places have we turned into marketplaces today? Our economic systems are driven by profit at the expense of our environment and at the expense of the world's poorest people. Mother Earth cries out to us to stop making this household a marketplace.

In October 2023, Pope Francis published another teaching on the environment, called *Laudate Deum*, meaning Praise Be! Pope Francis calls on world leaders to urgently take the steps needed to ensure a safe world for future generations. He calls for an urgent switch to clean energy, he criticises the slow progress of governments on this issue, and to people of good will he says: "The world sings of an infinite love, how can we fail to care for it?" Each of us are called to do our part. Jesus displays a righteous anger in the Gospel today, standing up for those who are oppressed by an unfair system. In this spirit of love and compassion may we too hear the cry of those made poor and the cry of the earth; may we call for the restoration of this sacred place, our common home. Let us pray this week that 'zeal for your house will consume' us and that we will take the necessary steps to ensure a liveable world for all.

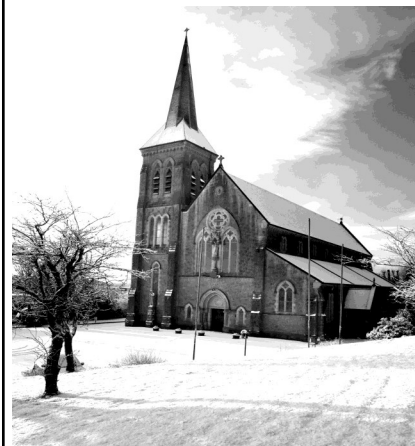

NATIONAL TREE WEEK runs from 3rd to 10th March. This year's theme is "Planting Trees for a Greener Future" which aims to emphasise the importance of trees & forests in helping to mitigate climate change and promote biodiversity. Tree saplings have been grown from seeds collected here in Ballyhaunis parish. Each Station area is asked to plant one of the saplings which will be blessed at the end of Mass this Sunday 3rd March. The blessing is intended to raise awareness of the challenges posed by climate change. Children from Scoil Íosa will also be involved in promoting the event by making a short video on trees. This is a follow-up to the Season of Creation event in our parish last September. The Season of Creation, initiated by Pope Francis, arose out of his encyclical "Laudato Si'" as a practical way for parishes to encourage care of creation. We work closely with the Tidy Towns committee, who will launch their Biodiversity Action Plan for Ballyhaunis on Friday 22nd March in the Community Hall, along with local beekeepers.

PASTORAL LETTER: As we journey through Lent, it is an opportune time to think about the Synodal Pathway which will feature again in October's second plenary meeting of the Synod of Bishops in Rome. The following is an extract from a Pastoral Letter issued by Archbishop Francis Duffy entitled "Imagining a new way of being Church in Ireland"....

"What does God want from the Church in Ireland at this time? That is the key question being asked of us in this diocese and in this country as we continue along the synodal pathway. Two years ago many of our parishes engaged in the synodal process of listening. The fruits of that process contributed to the Irish report to the International Synod held last October in Rome and a second, follow-up meeting of the Synod will be held this October in Rome. Arising from the listening, discernment and discussion to date, one key question has emerged. I invite you to reflect on, pray about and discuss this question and let me know what you think.

The question is: "How can we imagine the life of the Church in Ireland where people are co-responsible for the Church's mission in different ways"?

I believe this is an exciting time to be a Catholic in Ireland, a changing Ireland. There is now a far greater welcome for people who once were on the margins of church and society. We also have many, many people who have come from other countries and cultures to live here and so enrich our lives. There continues to be a great willingness among our people to generously support organisations such as Trócaire in its efforts to assist developing countries and to help in areas of sudden disasters. We are well able to look beyond our shores to help and encourage others in need. The circumstances in which we live our faith are rapidly changing at local level. On one hand, there are many involved adoration groups, prayer groups, apostolic societies and youth organisations, all contributing positively to the life of the Church and all motivated by love of the Lord. On the other hand, there are fewer and fewer priests, vocations to the religious congregations are also down, and the number of people who attend Sunday Mass is in serious decline, especially among the younger generations.

Yet, in our parishes there is an eagerness among people to take on more responsibility for pastoral initiatives. Some are willing to be more directly involved in pastoral leadership and are keen to receive support and training".
