Referring to a resolution of the Board on the 17th ultimo, directing proceedings to be instituted against 33 defaulters under the Comp Vaccination Act, I beg to report that in the Ballinacorney Dispensary District 10 defaulters were each fined five shillings and costs of Court. 14 defaulters were each fined one shilling and costs of Court, and 9 defaulters were each fined one penny and costs of Court. - In two cases service of Summons could not be effected.

In Hallinacorney Dispensary District, one defaulter was fined six pence and costs of Court, and in a hos one shilling and costs of Court. The case of a Miss P. Honehan of Lisinstown was not proceeded with. The cases of two defaulters tried at the Ballyglass Petty Sessions Court were adjourned to Wednesday the 25th instant.
