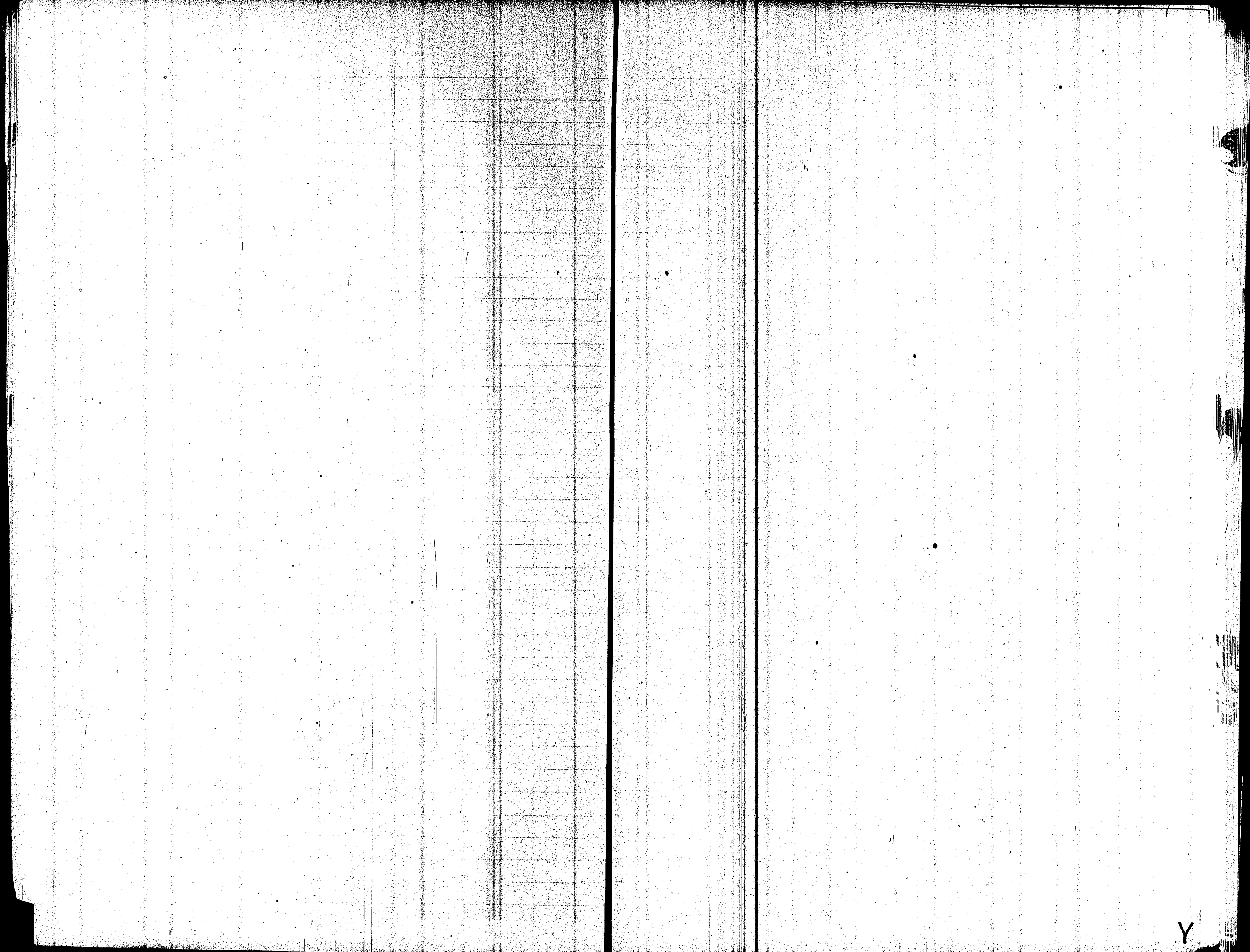

No. Report from the Master this day.

The following Orders of the Local Government Board for Ireland, were laid before the Board, and directions given thereon as follows:—

The following Letters from the Local Government Board for Ireland and others, were read by the Clerk, and directions given to answer them respectively, to the following effect (or Orders made on them respectively as follows):—

Letter from Local Government Board. No 21. 187. 1887. dated 28th September. 1887. answering to their letter of the 18th May last relating to the proposal to allow the master's family to reside in the Workhouse. acquainting the Board of Guardians that they now learn from their Inspector. Captain Sampson. that the room proposed to be assigned to the master's family is on the female side of the house. near the Schoolmistress's room. and the women's wards. This arrangement which would involve either the leaving open of the classification room on the women's side or the providing the master's family with a pass key. Captain Sampson considers most objectionable and in the circumstances mentioned stating that the Local Government Board cannot consent to the proposal.

Resolved

Resolved. that the Local Government Board be requested to inform the Guardians as to whether their letter of the 28th inst. referred to the additional rooms applied for by the Master. or whether the Board object to the Master's family living with him in his own apartments in the Workhouse. where they have resided for twelve months previous to his application for increased accommodation.

Letter from Local Government Board. No 39. 242/87. dated 28th September. 1887. acquainting the Board of Guardians that they have received the half-yearly Report of their Inspector. Captain Sampson. in the Union. which is of a satisfactory character as regards its financial state.

With respect to the general management and condition of the Workhouse. Captain Sampson reports that he has again to call attention to the dirty and untidy state of the Hospital Wards; that the floors have the appearance of never being washed, and that the tables and other portions of the wards were also dirty. Captain Sampson states that the nurse appears either unwilling or unable to discharge her duty in a satisfactory manner.

Captain Sampson has been obliged on several occasions to call attention to this matter: and the Board request that, having regard to his observations on the subject the Guardians will be so good as to consider the question of requiring the nurse to tender her resignation.

As regards the manner in which the duties of the resident officers are performed. Captain Sampson observes that while so much of the time of the officers is taken up

fighting amongst themselves it is impossible that the business of the house can be properly conducted.

The Board request that the Guardians will give this subject their serious consideration.

With reference to the performance of his duty by the Clerk Captain Sampson pointed out that the Ledger is not kept fully posted up.

It appears from the Report that Stock of the provisions clothing &c in the Workhouse has not been taken since July 1886. and the Board call the Guardians attention to Article 64 No 24 of the Workhouse Rules which requires that Stock shall be taken once at least in each half year.

Captain Sampson refers to the fact that a Visiting Committee has been appointed, but that they never appear to visit or inspect the Workhouse.

The Resolution was thereupon declared Carried by a majority of 4 votes, and Miss O'Malley, Hospital Nurse, was called before the Board of Guardians, and severely reprimanded by the Presiding Chairman.
