The Clerk informs the Board that he will comply with the request of the Commissioners,

Circular Letter from Poor Law Commissioners 71^o 7074/14 dated 3^o May, 1864, stating that the Expenses under the Acts for Registering Births and Deaths, and Marriages, are paid in England as in Ireland. — partly from the Poor Rates and partly from the General Taxes.

Letter from James Sheehan Esq, Secretary of the Catholic Institution for the Deaf and Dumb, dated 3^o May, 1864, stating that an order has been made for the admission of the deaf Mute John Brown, and that he should be sent to the Office of the Committee on Monday the 9th inst and the Clerk informed the Board that the Father of the deaf Mute will take him to Dublin on Monday the 9th inst, and present him at the office at the hour indicated in the Secretary's Letter,

Referring to the case of Bridget Farmer, it is Resolved,

That the Board beg to express its thanks to the Poor Law Commissioners for the inquiry instituted by their directions, and for the Letter which they have addressed to the Board of Guardians of the Castlebar Union explaining so clearly the infraction of the Law committed in the compulsory removal of Bridget Farmer from the Castlebar Workhouse,

The Board entertains no hope that as the Castlebar Board is now aware of the legal responsibilities which they have incurred, there will be no recurrence of a proceeding so unjust and illegal.

The Board does not consider it expedient or desirable to take any steps with a view of prosecuting the Castlebar Board of Guardians for a conspiracy,

The Clerk is instructed to receive with the Minutes of the days proceedings, the Minutes of evidence enclosed with the Commissioners Letter of the 27th ultmo. 71^o 8795,

The Relieving Officers were called before the Board and informed that the Board has provided a spring Van for the conveyance of sick and infirm paupers to the Workhouse, and that the Van is now on the Workhouse premises and available when required, —

The Relieving Officers will have to hire a horse for the spring Van whenever they may have occasion to use it; and it shall be optional with the applicants for relief to use the spring Van or not.

The Committee appointed to take stock of Clothing, Bedding, Linen, Provisions, &c, reported that they found the stock to be correct, and to agree with the known Books, on their recommendation the following Articles of Clothing and Bedding were condemned as unserviceable; —

Bedding, 182 Sheets, 16 Blankets, 202 Rugs, 84 Rest-beds, 2 Bolsters.

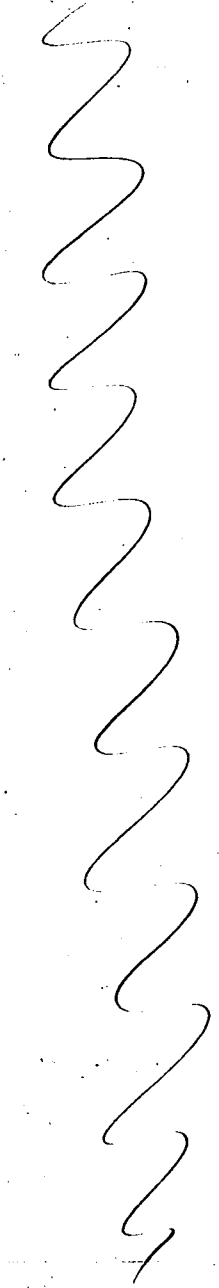
