The Clerk's Report of Visitation was read (this on the first meeting in every month). Number of successful cases:—
The Report of the Visiting Committee was read, and Orders were made thereon as follows:—

That the workhouse porter whom he reported as having resumed his duties on 29th ultimo, left the same evening, and since remained at his own home; that the Porter sent a medical Certificate, recommending his exemption from duty for 14 days ending the 16th instant.

Ordered:—That the master have the duties of the Porter discharged as heretofore

That on the night of the 30th ultimo, when taking up the key of the Prison gate he was not satisfied that the schoolmaster was in, and at about 9.30 he went to the schoolmaster's room, to see if he was there; that he the (master) went to the Hospital, and asked

The Reports of the Master and other Officers were read, and Orders made thereon as follows:—
The Nurse if she saw the schoolmaster, who replied in the negative; that close to 11 o'clock the schoolmaster came from the Hospital; went to the Dispensary, and by means of the key of his room—as he states—got access to it; and that as access from Workhouse grounds to the outside, could be obtained by this means the Guardians might consider it advisable to alter the locks of the place.

Ordered:—That the schoolmaster be given a copy of the master's report relating to him, and that his explanation be considered at next meeting of the Board.

That a patient named James Thomas when admitted, had in his possession a Book of Ireland Deposit receipt for £10, which he authorized him (the master) to draw, lest he might die.

Ordered:—That the master be directed to lodge the

The following Orders of the Local Government Board for Ireland were laid before the Board, and directions given thereon as follows:—

The amount with the Treasurer of the Union that an old man named Thomas Stenaghty was on the 6th instant admitted to Hospital in a weak state who informed him gave a large sum of money to a woman named Biddy Burke, that the old man wanted it back; that the police recovered some of it and are investigating the matter that a woman named Bridget Garry with two children were admitted without her husband, that she states she does not know of his whereabouts.

Gentlemen,

I beg to acknowledge the receipt of the resolution passed by you on Monday last and the various letters accompanying it; and to assure you that I feel very deeply the manifestations of your opinion thus publicly given expression to.

It is a matter of great gratification to me to find that during my term of office as your chairman I have succeeded in carrying the good opinion of all classes of your board. I had hoped you would have let me slip quietly away, but as such is not to be, I can only say that for some months past it has been my intention to vacate the chair, and I would have done so, but I thought the proper course to adopt was to wait until the books had been

been signed, and the financial year closed. I then carefully reconsidered the subject with the result that I decided on forwarding you my resignation, and whilst most gratefully thanking you the Board for the resolution they were good enough to pass and their more than kind appreciation of my services I find with regret and after mature deliberation that I am unable to comply with the terms of the resolution.

Resolved:- That the clerk be directed to advertise in the local newspapers giving notice that the Board of Guardians will at their meeting to be held on Monday the 26th November instant proceed to the appointment of two Relieving Officers viz:- one for No. 1 Relief District comprising the Electoral Divisions of Ballinacree, Seale, Portroyal at a Salary of £24 a year as Relieving Officer and £6 a year as Sanitary Sub Officer one for No. 2 Relief District at a Salary of £22 a year as Relieving Officer for the Electoral Divisions of Long Howdrowood, Shrule.

er. the horrid scenes of '47 will be repeated if the Government do not devise some means of employment for them. The Guardians therefore respectfully but earnestly appeal to the Government to start public works in those districts which after inquiry they will find need it and they hope that the landlords in this Union will assist their tenants by giving those poor people time and by making abatements in keeping with the low prices prevailing for cattle, pigs, &c. to such as would make an effort to pay. The Guardians make this early move in the matter feeling that in the near future they will be called upon to levy a special rate to relieve distress, which to a moral certainty is sure to be.

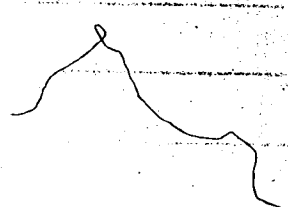

order of the 12th instant. calling upon me to give a written explanation in reference to the charges preferred by the master of the Workhouse against me. I beg to reply as follows:-

On the night of the 30th ultimo I left my room in company with Mr Gurney & P. O. (who was here discharging duty) at about 8.15 P.M. saw him to the front gate. I then returned and went over to the Hospital to see a young man who is laid up in Ward C. 6. from a broken leg. After conversing with him for some time, I had an occasion to leave, telling him I would again return. On my return he told me the master came and looked into the ward, but never said a word; I then left for my own room. On my way I met Miss Burke the Hospital nurse who asked me down to the Dispensary. it being at the time 9.45 P.M. to get some cotton-wool for her sister who was then lying up with Fever in the Fever Hospital. I told Miss Burke I had not the Key of the Dispensary. she being under the impression that I had it (owing to the Dispensary Porter's illness) as I had it last year while he was unwell. Owing to the real urgency of what was required I said to Miss Burke that when I was discharging duty there last year,

I remarked that the Key of the Dispensary and that of my room were nearly alike. (not alone that of my room but that of the boys' lavatory also which is in my possession) so we resolved to go down to the Dispensary and see could we open it. On our way to the Dispensary we went into the master's office, told him where we were going, and got the loan of a lantern from him. It was only on our return from the Dispensary he told us of the seriousness of what we had done. On the following Monday (the 5th instant) the master called me into his office; Miss Burke was there he demanded of both of us a written explanation. Miss Burke gave it. I refused telling him at the same time, that as I went there I would bear the responsibility and hence the cause of his report. The master mentions in his report that it was close to 11 O' P.M. when I went into his office, it was not close to 11 O' when the cotton wool was delivered at the Fever Hospital.

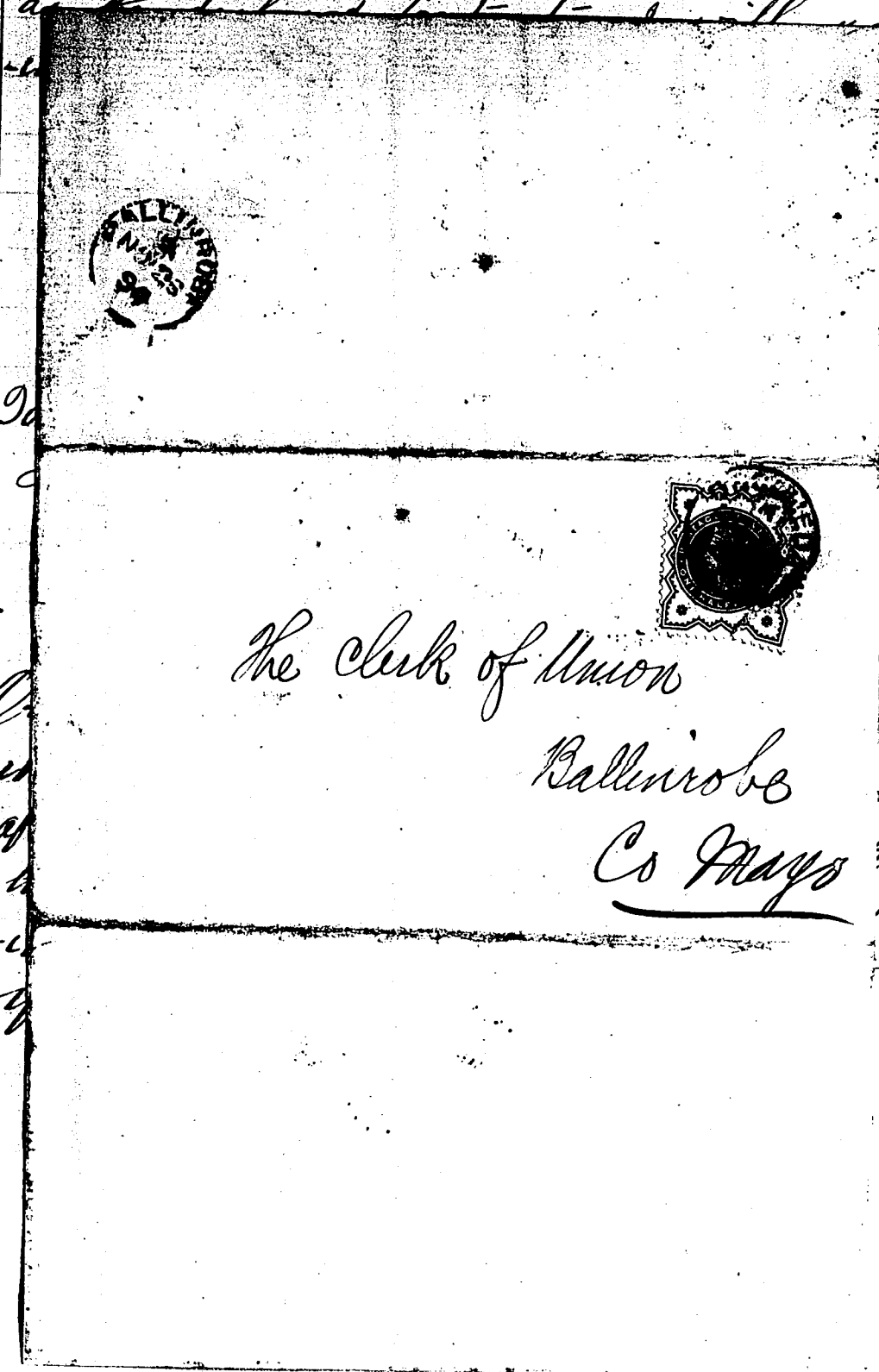

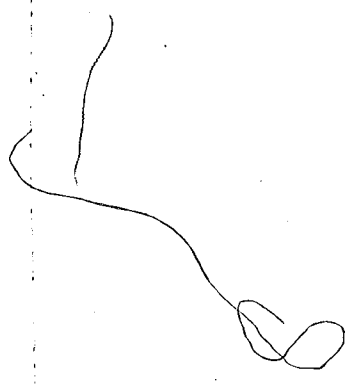

I respectfully say that the report which I refer to should not be read aloud in the Board room in the presence of any person unconcerned, it being a confidential report for the information of Guardians Teacher and Board's officers I enclose the report to let you see that this statement is correct.

On the whole I have shown an average of over 90 per cent of passes in my school and taking into consideration that Workhouse children are neither as bright or as
