He consumed the clothes he wore his clothes and the clothes in the Nurse's class belonging to his three sisters who were admitted at the same time with him, and the doctor of and immediate effect to my recommendation — only one animal of the  
-workhouse

Workhouse, a woman named Sally Flynn, has been admitted with Scalds, she is now in the Fever Hospital, and is nearly recovered. I have adopted every means in my power to prevent the spread of Scalds among the workhouse inmates, and at my suggestion, the collector has placed the collar of Nicholas Finney and his three young sisters in an apartment of the workhouse where they cannot come in contact with the other inmates.


