



With regard to the resolution relating to the Four Hospitals, regarding me to report on whether any incanvencions or breach of discipline occurred from the fact of Mr. M'Keen having a scap'd pass key, which only gave access to the stufumary during the night, I beg to state that no incanvencions have resulted and no breach of discipline has come under my observation for over fifteen years, during which time Mr. M'Keen has exclusively charge of the Four Hospitals. I cannot but be surprised that

pass without bearing testimony to the high character of Mr. M'Keen during the long period — Her exertions, honesty, ability and zeal during the epidemics of Small-Pox and Typhus, should make her worthy of the confidence of the Guardians, for during the long hours, I frequently visited the Hospital at midnight and at early morning, and always found her zealously and fearlessly discharging the duties of her post.

If and we were to communicate orders to the Four Hospitals and stufumary, if through the key is taken up, no access is given from the building in case of accident or emergency.

I would suggest that in case the key is taken up that some precautionary measure be adopted and that a responsible person be put in charge.
