The following Letters from the Local Government Board for Ireland and others, were read by the Clerk, and directions given in answer to them respectively, to the following effect, for Orders made on them respectively as follows:—

Order from Local Government Board, No. 22, 222, 1882, dated 21. July 1882, transmitting therewith to be laid before the Board of Guardians a bill which has been introduced to them by an inmate of the workhouse named John J. Ryan, complaining of the conduct of the collector, and requesting the abolition of the Guardians thereon.

In answer to the foregoing Order, the Board of Guardians beg to advise that the same has been taken into consideration by the collector for classification purposes, and the Guardians consider it was right in doing so. The Guardians have reason to believe that the Ryan of the workhouse has from all times kept a remarkably clean.

The Board of Guardians closed to being under the notice of the Board of Guardians, the following particulars relating to the case of a poor old woman named Ellen Hanter, residing at Blansard, in the Workhouse District:—

Miss Rose, General Manager, N. of M. Co., having called the attention of the Collector of the District to the case of the woman, he visited her, and found her in a destitute condition, he spoke to her, expressing his willingness to furnish her with suitable food, or to convey her to the Union Workhouse if she did not reply to him, she refused to be issued, but professed herself unable to do any work to earn her support.

The Guardians request that the Local Government Board will be pleased to inform them as to whether anything can be done to prevent this wretched poor old woman from being in this situation.
