

CURIOSITIES

Curious objects, structures, monuments, landmarks, sights, etc. For example, Wishing stones or "chairs," freaks of nature (i.e. grotesque rock formations)—in fact, any scene or object which may be regarded as queer, quaint or mirth-provoking. Location and description. Any story or legend to be related.

In John Hogan's of Bellanaboy a building which in the distance resembles a round tower. Said to have been a windmill — or perhaps a pigeon house — used by the former Lord Clarendon of Newbrough. 30' high, diameter about 14'. Pillar exposed.

In Mr. J. Hopkins' of Hollymount House — in the field near the residence, a 15' high monument on a circular base 4' in diameter — which rests on a rough block 3' wide. A kind of pedestal with sculptured figures surmounts the column. Said to mark the grave of a favorite hunting dog. Fifty paces from Hollymount House. Latin inscription which is difficult to decipher but which reads in part — "Deus natus habet alia feit/...2 uenda.... domus placens/ hanc ducere matris istab/ Viges cum numero/a speciosa pecto/ me & re lacuum & vos colis subversum" {Assumption of lines difficult}

CUSTOMS, PATTERNS, ETC.
Brief account of old customs, traditional cures, etc., still practised in the district. Pilgrimages to Holy Wells, Shrines, etc. Patterns.

Local customs almost extinct. There are those of Shrove Tuesday or "Pancake night" — Bonfire night — St. Martin's Eve — Hallowe'en and St. Stephen's Day (Wren Boys).

Superstitions of tipping over the chair which held the coffin — taking the longest route to the graveyard with a funeral — giving a hand with clucking if a visitor — and last of the rule which forbids a bird to return to her own home for a month after marriage.
