The Minutes of last Meeting were read and Signed.

Notices of Marriage between the parties hereunder named having been received from the District Registrar by the Clerk, were duly read at the Board this day in accordance with the 15th section of the 7 & 8 Vic., c. 81.

The Workhouse Register was produced, examined, and authenticated, from No. 2299 to No. 4019, both inclusive, by the signature of the Chairman, and countersignature of the Clerk.

The Out-door Relief Register was produced, examined, and authenticated from No. 1 to No. 10 inclusive, by the signature of the Chairman and countersignature of the Clerk.

The Clerk's Report on the execution of Orders previously made by the Board was read to the following effect:

The Clerk produced the Treasurer's Receipt for a sum of £8.14.5. lodged to credit of Repayment of Relief Act, being the amount deducted from pension of John McGrath, for support of his wife for Half Year ended 30th Sept. 1862.

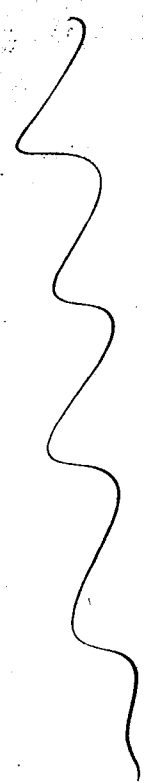

Circular Letter from Poor Law Commrs.
No. 10. 578/60. dated 16th May. 1860, requesting to be furnished with certain Returns called for by an order of the House of Commons dated 8th Inst.

Circular Letter from same No. 112 m/60. dated 20th May. 1860. transmitting for the information of the Board of Guardians a copy of the Act for the Regulation of Births and Deaths in Ireland (24 Vic. Cap 11) and with reference to the 20th Secⁿ of the Act, requesting that the Board will at once take into consideration the question whether it would be desirable to have a Registrar Office provided in some part of the Workhouse, or whether it would be better to provide one elsewhere.

The Board of Guardians cannot arrive at a decision as to whether any portion of the workhouse

Workhouse can be allocated for the purpose of a Registrar Office until they receive the plan of the Office to be approved of by the Registrar General, and they request that the Poor Law Commissioners will be good enough to procure same from the Registrar General, and forward it for the Board's information.

The Clerk read a Report from the Committee appointed to superintend the execution of Workhouse repairs of which the following is a copy:—

We the Committee appointed to superintend the execution of repairs in the Workhouse beg to report to the Board of Guardians that we have inspected the works this day, we have ordered that the mortar joints should be carefully and clearly raked out to a sufficient depth, and the close joints properly widened we have authorized the Master to employ a few more labourers to assist in raking out the joints, also to procure the materials for scaffolding, and to employ a carpenter to make crutches for some, — we have directed the Master to procure a supply of good clean lime stone sand to mix with the cement.

The old louveres should be at once directed up with Cement and Masonry.

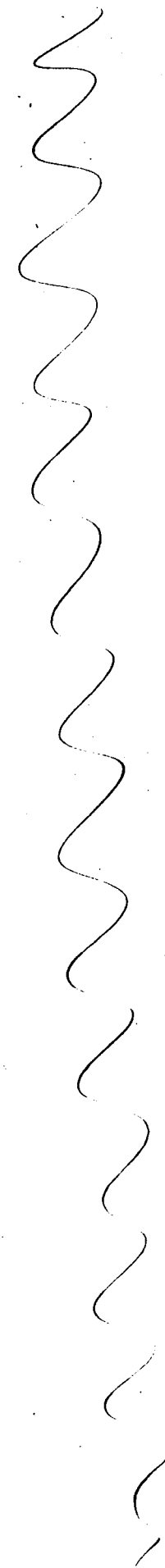
The Books and other securities in force were laid before the Guardians by the Clerk, together with his Report thereon, as follows: This on the second Meeting after the Annual Election in every year.
