IMPORTANT PUBLIC BUILDINGS

(Give brief notes on architectural features)

St. Mary's Catholic Church: A fine building of red brick and stone. It has a central tower, double aisles, galleries, resting these from first aisle by pointed arches on short round columns. The arches crossing continue light wood springing from lead esp. beams. Inter aisle from first by pointed arches on fluted octagonal columns. There are no piers in the bays, to each side a high pointed stepped arch giving to side-altars. Central window of 5 long lights painted light with 5 foil circles. Side altars galleries have windows of two light-painted lights, two of 10 windows (figuratively) (except galleries) to each side all are higher than the rest and each has 2 upright panels with 5 foil circles. Each with

FORM D. SURVEY

to Glebe St. and parallel with Main St. and Bowgate St. — ~~broad~~
Linenmarket, which runs parallel to Glebe St., and Church
Lane which joins Main St. and New St.

W. Main St. and Bowgate St., most of Glebe St., New St.,
and Linenmarket, runs from the west, north, east, and
south sides of a rectangle, respectively. In the rectangle are
the Catholic church in its own grounds and fronting Main St.
and the Protestant church which is in its own ground of ab-
out acre and is shut away between the streets with an entrance
by gate through a Main St. building.

Main St. is perhaps 150 yds. long. It has some fine stone
houses - the rest two-story — slated. Business premises, with
the Court house, and two banks. The latter, with a few neat shop-
dwelling houses are the best and cleanest buildings in the street.
Main Street's southern continuation, Bowgate St. (about 100 yds.) be-
comes 20 houses, 3 of which are hatched two-story and 1 hatched single.
The remainder are single-story slated. A few houses are neatly
kept of the remaining two-story slated. This street and New St. have
pavements. Bowgate thoroughfare 30' wide — Main St. wider.
Abbey St. has a good bank building on its corners and opposite
a clean 2-story corner premises. Further are some business
premises and garages — dwellings, hatched and slated, and a
row of 2-story slate cottages.

Bridge St. is short. Has a few solid and clean stone
High St. has 2-grade R.R. and an intermediate number of slate
and hatched dwellings. High Rd. and Chapel Rd. have 2-story
slated and unslated, very poor and small one-story hatched houses.
Also Roseau zinc roofed, unslated. Very unprepossessing. Some
timber down houses.

Glebe St. has some 3-story houses near its junction with
Main St. and Abbey St. — further on its length (350 yds.) a
notable collection of two-story slated, one-story slated,
(cont'd.)

a few two-storey thatched, and about 20 very poor, low, single-storey thatched cottages. Also some old tumble-down houses and bits of old walls. Pavemented street. Unkempt and ugly feed for the most part. At the end of the street is the entrance to the Convent of Mercy.

New St. (about 350 yds.) has some 35 houses - (sections each side of street are recent) - of which some 15 are thatched, some tiny and thatch, and the most unkempt also. One tiny zinc dwelling. Also the dilapidated ruins of old buildings.

At the end of Cornmarket near the Rly. Station about 100 yds. is ordinary road with, in an hotel (2 storeys) and some houses near enough - Then the street widens into the market place and turns again to its right angle junction with the bottom of Bewgate St. Cornmarket's wide portion has some solid houses, some ill-kept two-storey thatched, and some thatched dwellings also unpossessing. There is one tiny zinc-roofed household. And some tumble-down houses. Except for the new recent portion the street is stony and grass-tufted. The portion running to Bewgate St. lies to Christian Bros. school, clean-cut, modern, with front lawn. Opposite it St. Mary's Hall. Further it lies shops (with opposite a wall: Cranmore House in own grounds) and a cinema with dance hall.



FORM D — BALLINROBEImportant Public Buildings.

(There are no vestibuley lights. All lights are of stained glass)

West rose gable has main entrance, pointed headbed limestone with mould in black terminals. Each outer aisle has also a western pointed door of dressed limestone, of similar design to main doorway over which is the west rose window of 3 long tracery-painted headed lights with 6 panes in pointed arch with black terminal mould. Between main door north aisle & double triforium-painted window lights first aisle and between main doors and outer south aisle is the tower which has a short spine - double triforium below, a centre small triforium and an uppermost triforium which holds the church clock dial. Vestibule to south-east.

Nave and first aisles vaulted between 1850/60. Transepts and tower added about 1877. Outer aisles (which run into former transepts) present

St. Mary's Church (Protocant): nave and tower to west gable. A neck church. (80' x 35'). East windows of cleaved limestone, 3 light pointed with 3 roses each. Pointed arch. Nave windows of two pointed light wooden mullioned. Square west tower with plain pointed eaves and vestry off tower north. Tower flanked (south & north) by a smallish cut pointed window in upper west rose gable.

Surveyor's Note on Town of Ballinrobe - Co. Mayo. ITA 1315 (11)

Form D gives to perhaps unnecessary length - street details of Ballinrobe Town. Form A - Topography. Adds little with the aspect of the Town. This because the town of Ballinrobe is easily the most ill-kept town in Mayo - if not in Ireland. There is no semblance of public spirit in the matter of pride in the place. It is doubtful if there are a dozen sound buildings in the town. Streets are left for days & weeks uncleaned after fairs - sometimes the rain is allowed to do the cleaning. The town has ugly dilapidated ruins in almost every street - most of the shop & dwelling structures are badly in need of touching up. Worst aspect are the many tiny sham thatched houses that ~~this~~ lie in almost all the streets. These habitations, and also some with zinc roofs, should long ago have been

condemned and removed.

For these reasons the town of Bellmawr must fail to offer a pleasing glimpse to the tourist. Although it should be an ideal centre for the lakes boating, walks, and canoe & the Raritan River fishing — it cannot be so — since the accommodation & service afforded by the few hotels in the town are the poorest possible.
