The Minutes of last Meeting were read and signed.

The Workhouse Register was produced, examined, and authenticated, from No. 1337 to No. 1350, both inclusive, by the signature of the Chairman, and countersignature of the Clerk.

The Out-door Relief Register was produced, examined, and authenticated from No. to No. inclusive, by the signature of the Chairman and countersignature of the Clerk.

The Clerk's Report on the execution of Orders previously made by the Board was read to the following effect:

That he forwarded to the Door Rate Collectors a copy of the Resolution requiring them to close the collection of the outstanding Rates on or before the 1st of July next.

That he forwarded by the post of the 5th Instant, to each Guardian of the Union, a copy of the Estimate for a new Rate, and at the same time intimated that the Estimate would be considered on this day.

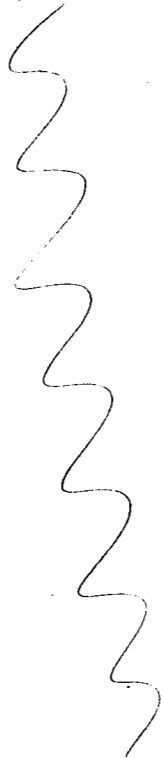

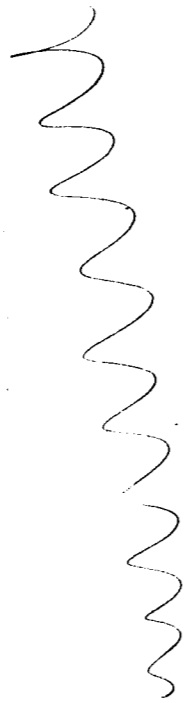

The Bonds and other securities in force were laid before the Guardians by the Clerk, together with his Report thereon, as follows: (this on the second Meeting after the Annual Election in every year.)

an arrangement for visiting periodically the Divisions referred to; but whenever an application for relief has been made to him, by, or on behalf of any poor person residing therein [a case of rare occurrence] he has attended to it with promptness, and afforded such relief as the circumstances of the case required.

The Board of Guardians have a return before them, a copy of which return is herewith enclosed for the information of the Commissioners, from which it will be observed that for the last 16 months only three persons residing in the Divisions of Ballinchalla, Ballyovey, Cappaghduff, and Queenhill have made application for relief, one of whom was a Lunatic who was removed from the Workhouse by his friends a few days after his admission, and but 14 in Partryal Electoral Division.

That the Electoral Division of Partryal with the exception of the Townlands of Troagh and Cloine is situated nearer to Ballinacree than to Cappaghduff, and it would be an inconvenience to the poor of that Electoral Division if it were to be taken from the Ballinacree District and added to a proposed new District of which Cappaghduff would form the centre.

That the arrangement of the Relief Districts which have existed since 1853, when the Union contained a population more numerous than at present, has been found to work satisfactorily, and the Board of Guardians see no reason to induce them to make an alteration.

The Board of Guardians have to observe, that in the Union of Swinford with a population of 52,004, and containing an Area of 152,894 Acres there

that we only 2 Relieving Officers, and in the adjoining Union of Claremorris with a population of 32,070. and containing an Area of 110,750 Acres there is but one Relieving Officer,

I have to report that on Thursday evening last a poor Woman named Bridget Conroy was accidentally killed by a horse and cart running over her on the public road connecting to the "Entrance gate" to the workhouse.

The friends of the deceased Woman were all very poor, and had not the means of conveying the body to her own residence, which is some distance from this, and at the request of a few respectable persons, I consented
