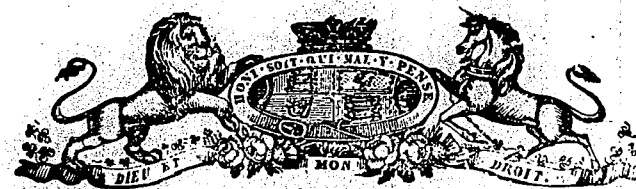

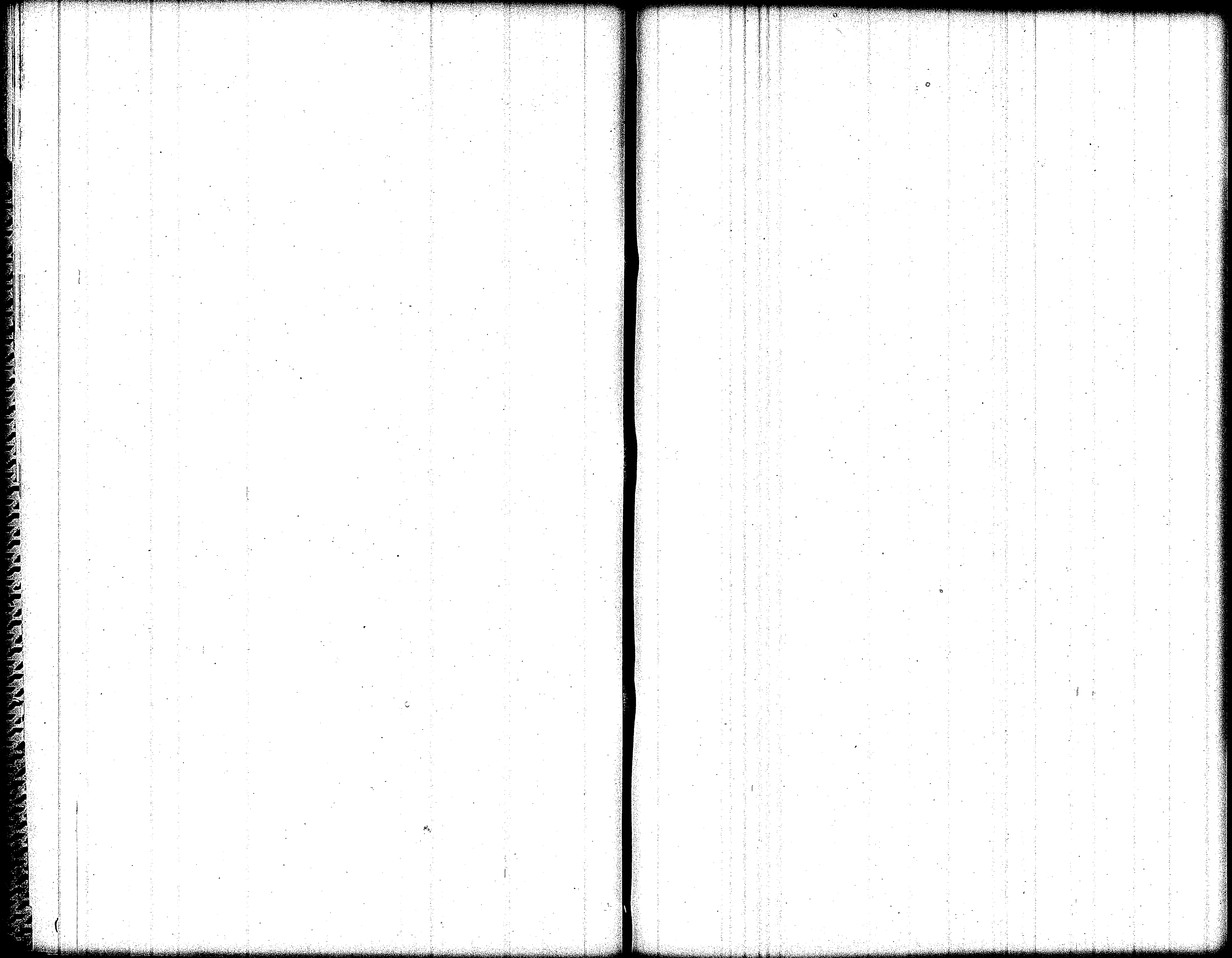

The following Letters from the Local Government Board for Ireland or others, relating to Sanitary matters, were read, and directions given thereon as follows:—

Reports of duties performed by the several Medical Officers of Health in the Union during the Quarter ending 31st December, 1881, were laid before the Sanitary Committee, from which it appeared that 129 persons had been limewashed and disinfected, and 89 other persons treated.

The Reports stated that the sanitary condition of the Union was satisfactory, 110 cases of Fever, 1 case of Scalding, and 2 cases of Typhoid, and 129 cases of Popliteal vein thrombosis during the Quarter. The Houses in which those diseases had occurred were limewashed and disinfected.
