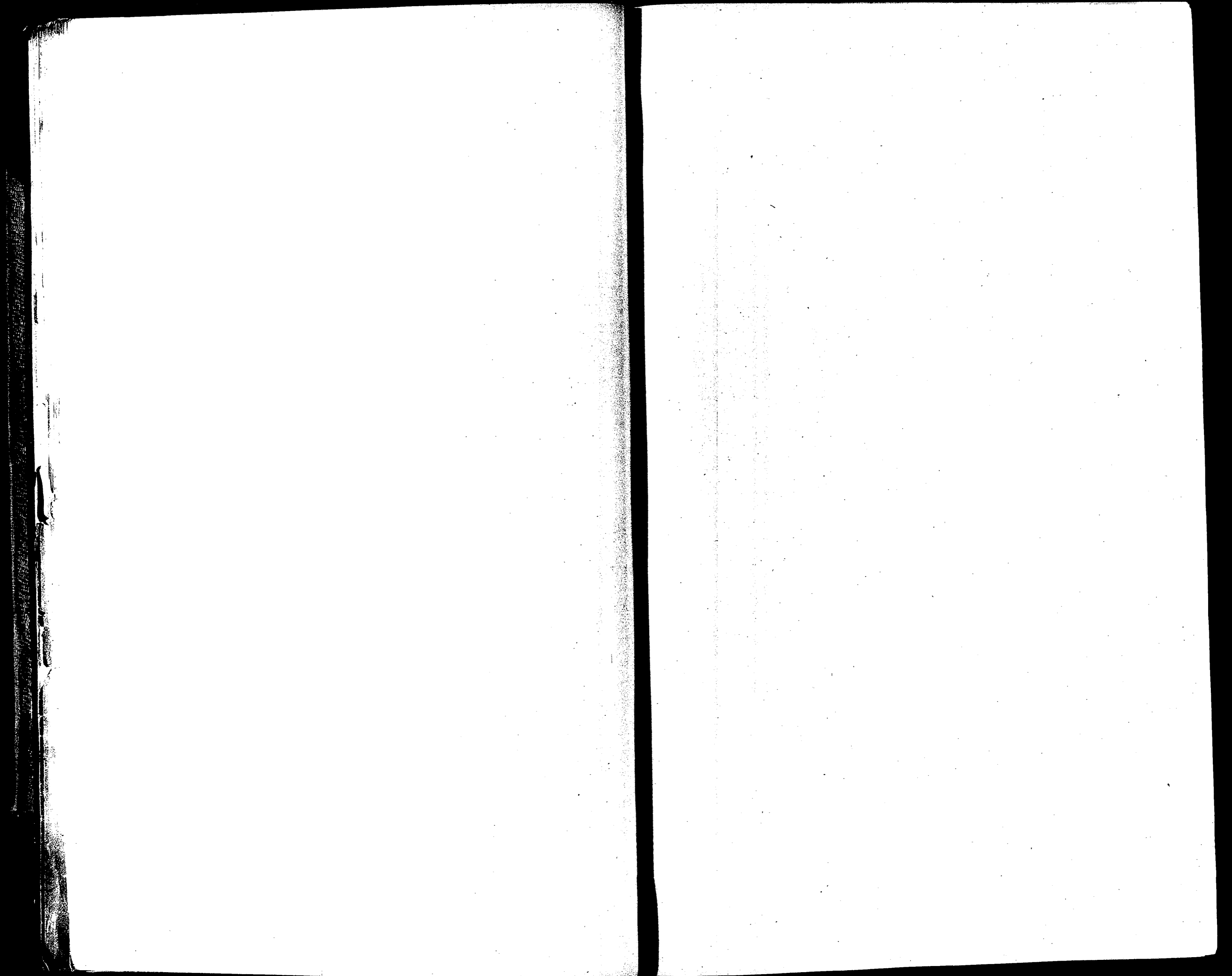
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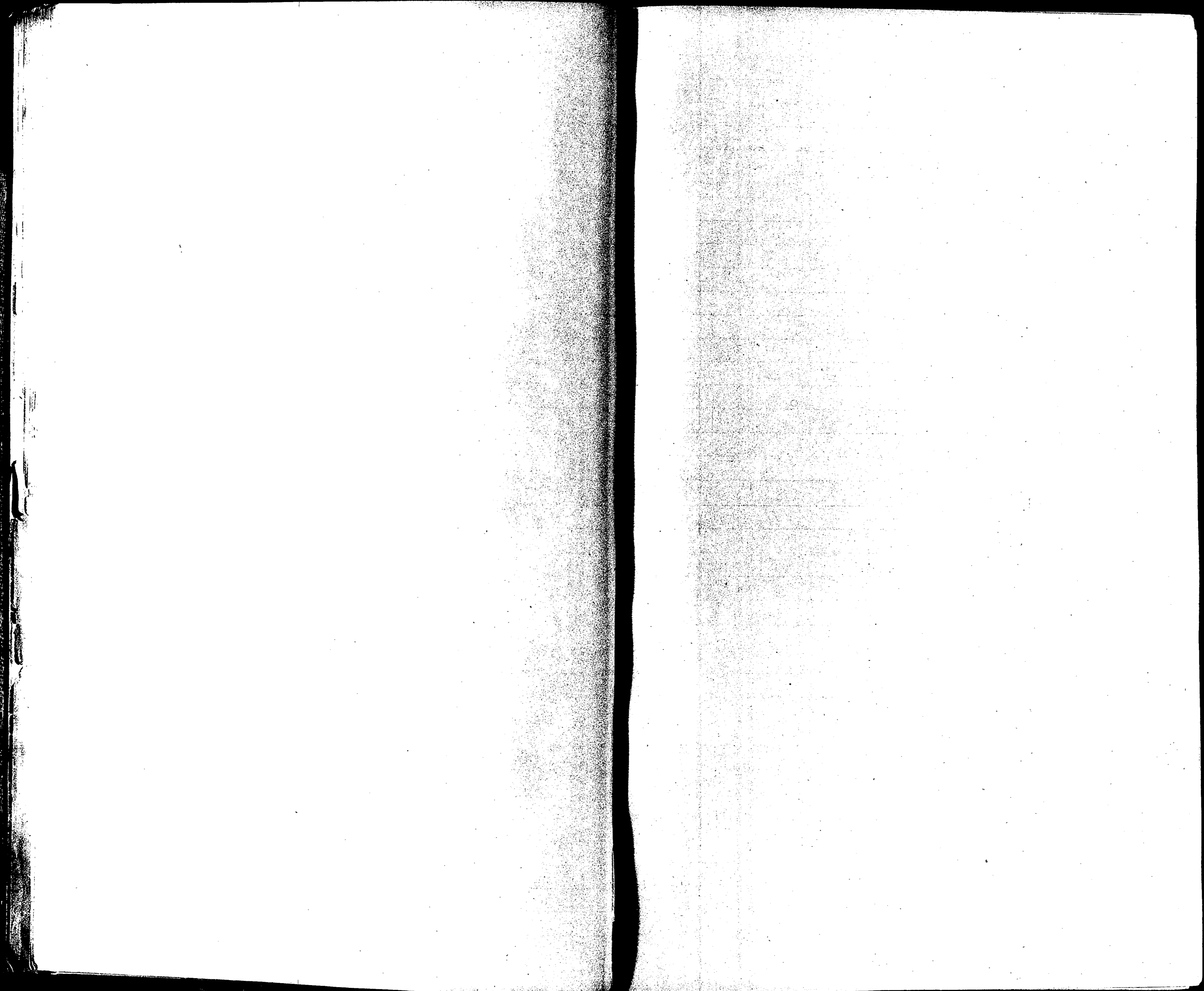

The Clerk laid before the Board a Letter which he received from the Clerk of Clapham Union, dated the 17th Inst. enclosing a copy of a Petition to the House of Commons, with reference to a Bill introduced in the last Session of Parliament, proposing that the Appointment of Gs and Levy Cops Paris Rate on the Counties and Poor Law Unions of Ireland, shall be made by the Commissioners of Valuation in Dublin, Upon which it was Resolved, that a similar Petition be adopted by the Board, and signed by the Chairman on its behalf, and that the Clerk be directed to forward it to Lord John Brown, M.P. for presentation to the House of Commons,

Gentlemen,

I feel it to be my duty to bring under your notice the following circumstance:—

On Friday the 5th inst. I was in the act of copying the Minutes of Thursday's proceedings, when Mr David Elligott of this Town, your Contractor for supply of Clothing Materials, called on me in order to inspect some of the Clothing Samples which were in my custody, at his request I showed him the sample of Canvas for

Bed-trotter.
 The cases of provisional relief, and applications for relief were considered and decided on, as set forth in the Application and Report Books.

The Bonds and other securities in force were laid before the Guardians by the Clerk together with his Report thereon, as follows: (this on the second Meeting after the Annual Election in every year.)

Bed-trotter, and the sample Rug, Mr Elligott in my presence then proceeded to measure the width of the Canvas on the Board-room table, and after having done so, he spread the Rug on the floor, leaving the Canvas still on the table, then went to the head of the table near the fire-place and resumed my writing, but my attention was immediately attracted by the noise of a Scissors as if after cutting something, I at once got up and went to where Mr Elligott was measuring the Rug, and found the Canvas with him, he having removed it from off the table, I took it up and remarked to Mr Elligott that one side of the Canvas had a sledge and that the other had not, in reply to my observation he stated that Canvas was usually finished in that manner, Mr Elligott when measuring the Rug occupied a kneeling position, and his back was turned towards my face, as soon as Mr Elligott left the Board-room, I called upon the Workhouse Master and stated to him that the Canvas was cut by Mr Elligott, and we both inspected the Rug and found on it threads of the ravelling of the cut, which threads I now beg to lay before you, — The Workhouse Master then informed me that about 2 inches had been cut off the width of the Canvas.

In connection with this subject, I beg to mention that the sample of Canvas was in my custody from the day the Contract was declared in September last, up to the 5th of Nov., and was then locked in my desk, and no person had, or could have had, access to it for that period without my knowledge, I also think it necessary to state that on the 4th of Nov. Mr Elligott got an Order from the Board of Guardians to supply 700 Yards of Canvas for Bed-trotter,



In conclusion I have to add, that it is with
much regret [from a deep sense of
official responsibility] obliged to make the
present statement, reflecting as it necessarily
must, on the character of a man with whom
I have been for the last few years on friendly
terms, and whom, I have always regarded
as a most respectable person,

The Board having had before it the "Chaplain's Book", observes that the Roman Catholic Chaplain has not recorded therein the progress of the Children, upon which it was Resolved that his attention be called to Article 109 N^o 3 of the General Regulations of the Poor Law Commissioners of the 5th of February 1849, which requires that the Chaplain shall examine and catechise the Children at least once in each month; and after each of such examinations to record the same, and state the general progress of the Children,

Mr. John Mullin the Master of this Workhouse, having announced his intention of applying for the vacant Mastership of the Galway Union Workhouse, and having requested a Testimonial from this Board: It is unanimously Resolved that the Board feels most happy in being enabled to testify, that for the last four years he has discharged the various duties of his Office, with zeal, efficiency, and integrity, and that his conduct in every respect has merited, and elicited, the entire approbation of the Guardians, who have always for

in Mr. Mullin an Officer, able and anxious to carry out every measure tending to enforce a better supervision of, and due subordination and discipline among the Workhouse inmates; and most diligent in promoting the interests of the Guardians, by his judicious management both of the Establishment, and of the Farm attached, in which he has been eminently successful.

Mr. Mullin also possesses a thorough knowledge of Agriculture, and has, every Year since his appointment, been awarded gratuities by the Education Commissioners, (on the Reports of their Agricultural Inspectors) "for the improved and highly successful state of Agriculture," as exemplified by him on the Workhouse Farm

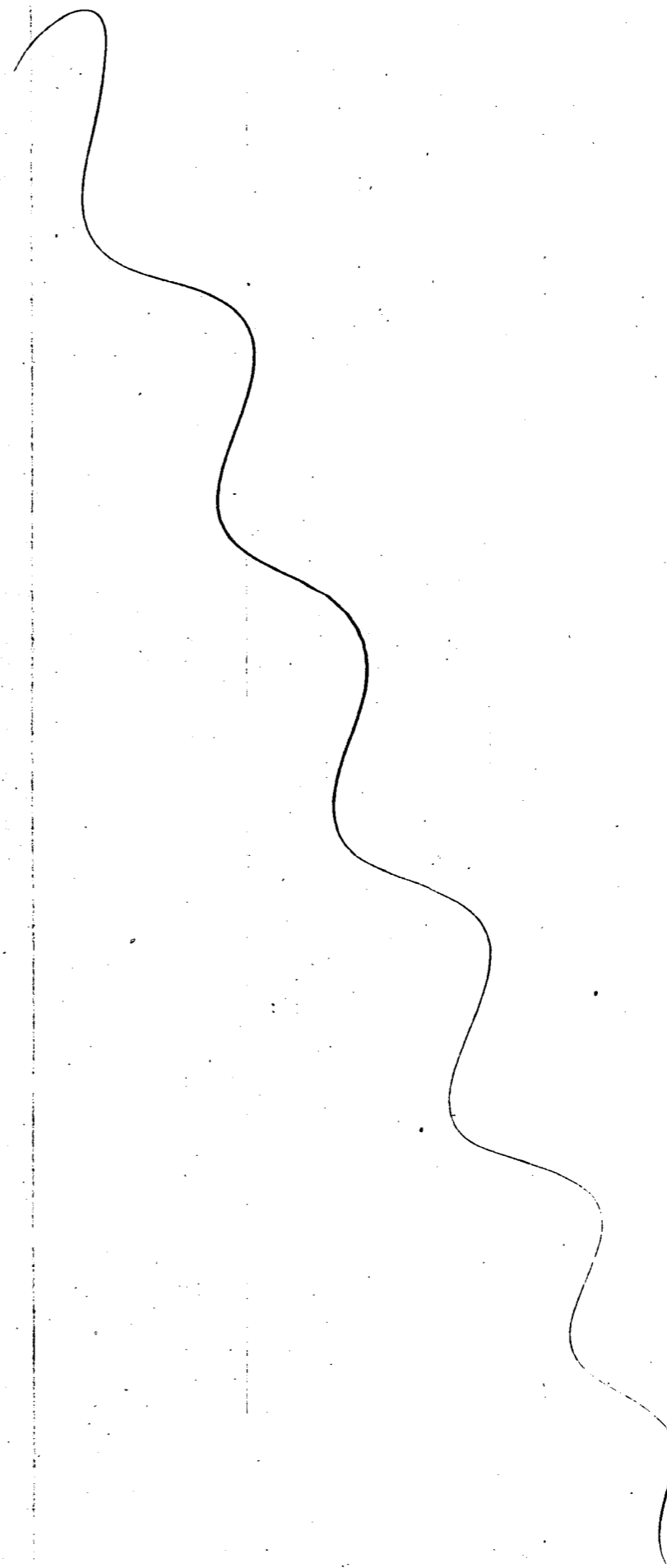

I beg to remind you that my present salary as Chaplain of your Workhouse, is quite inadequate, whether you consider the heavy responsibility of the obligations imposed upon me, or the salaries generally allowed to Chaplains of Workhouses elsewhere a class I need not point to the Workhouses in the South of Ireland, where £60. per Annum, is considered as an extremely small allowance for a Chaplain; but looking even nearer home I see, for instance, in the great Union, Castletown, that the standing salary of the Roman Catholic Chaplain is £50. a Year, and no reduction I believe, was ever even attempted,

Now I respectfully submit that the number in the Workhouse on the average is larger, and the valuation of the Union is larger also than "Castletown", and in fact I am obliged to keep a second Curate in consequence of the Workhouse, therefore there should be something like the competent support for a priest allowed as Chaplains salary, I need scarcely say that £40, cannot be said to be equal to that; hence I am mulcted on the double by the reduction of my salary
