Mr. Lynch states that the boys' and girls' wards are cold; that a few boards to close partitions in each of the wards would secure them from draughts; that a fire screen is required for the lunatic ward.

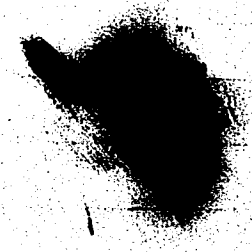

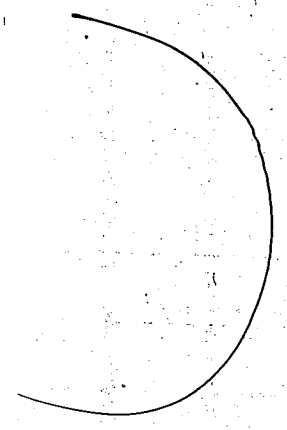
