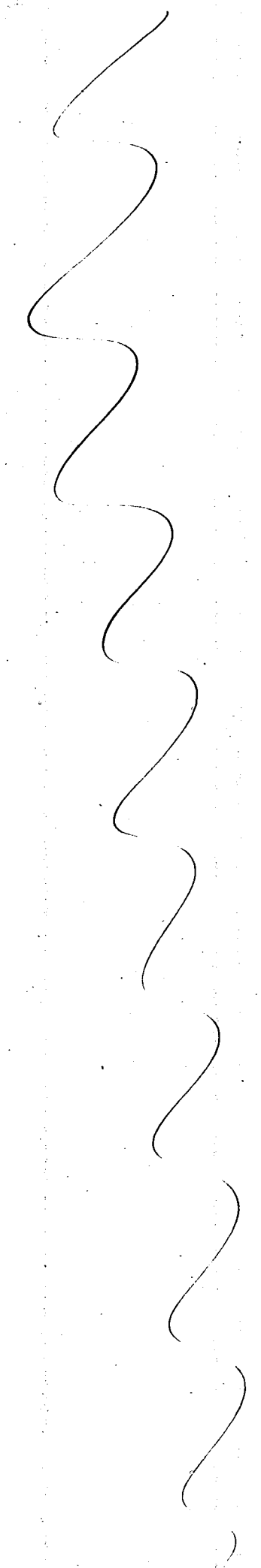
Consideration Schedules of irrecoverable Rates in their respective Districts,

not interfere with the <sup>10</sup>efficient discharge of her duties, should the expectations of the Board in this respect be not realized, it will without hesitation, withdraw the permission,
