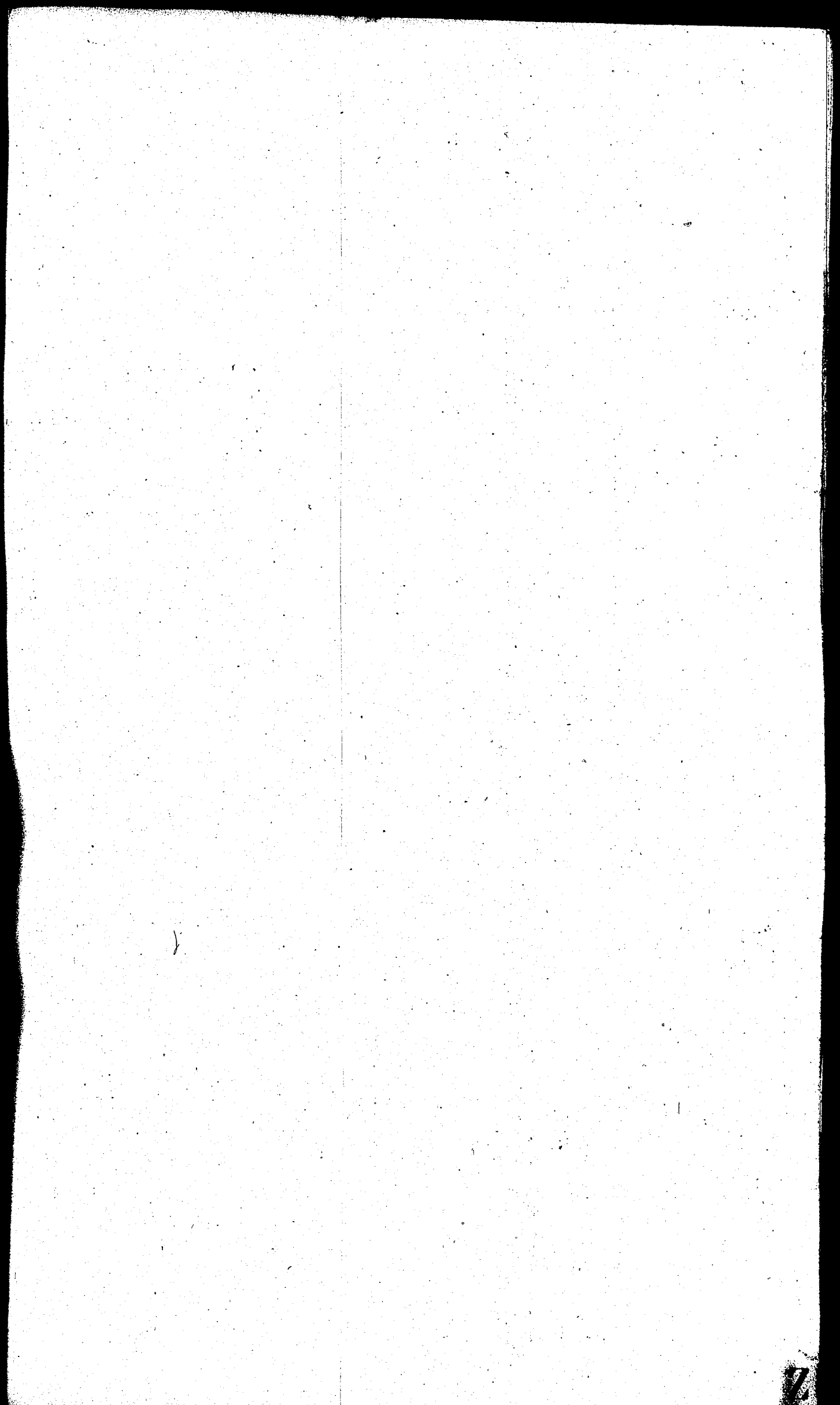
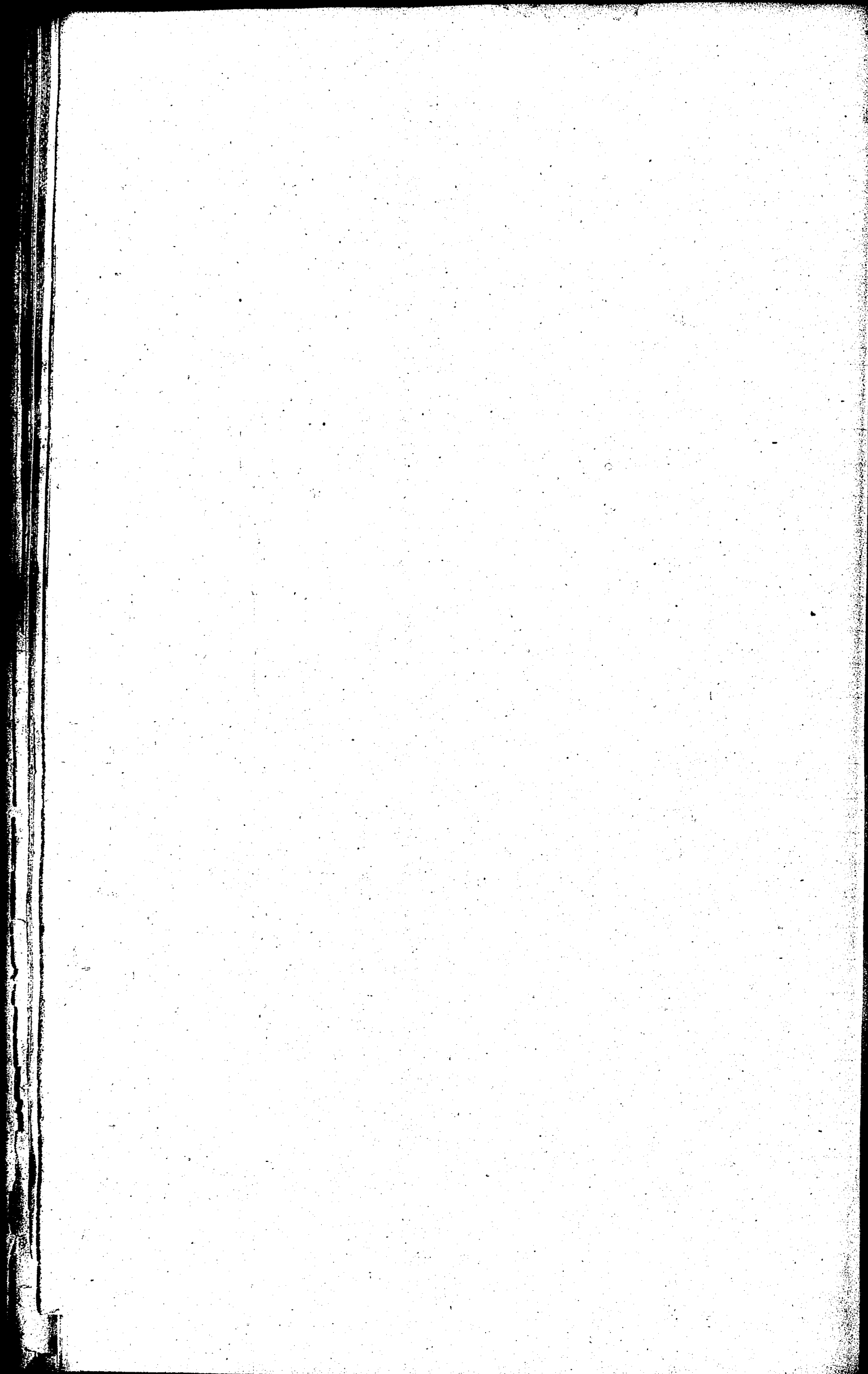

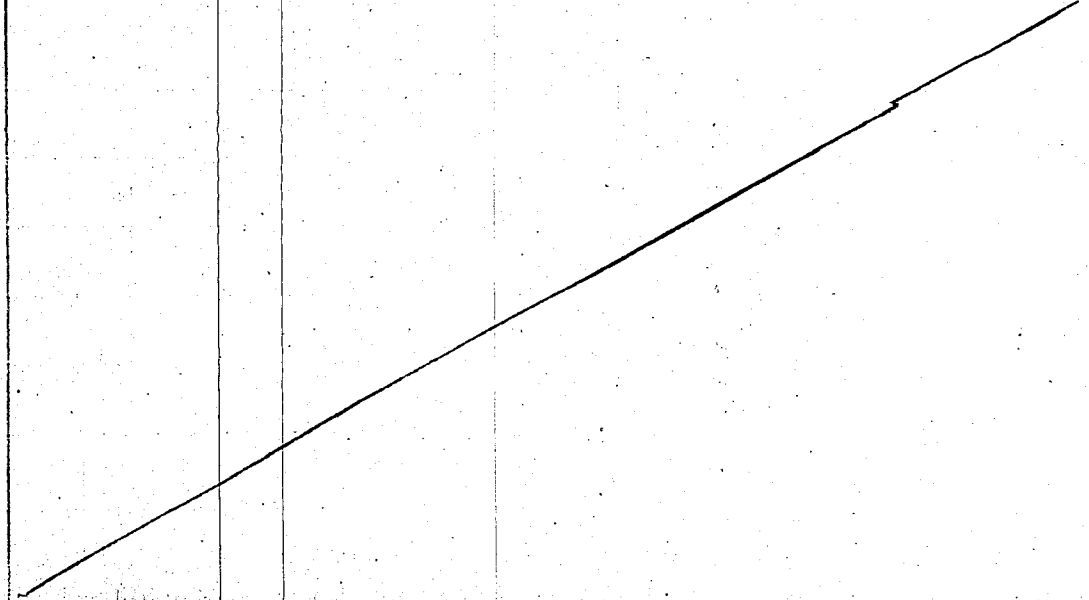

We are decidedly of opinion that those portions of the building under the name of Wards for Suits, which have been for a considerable time occupied as an Hospital for fever patients are admirably adapted for the purpose having separate wards for Males and Females and being detached in every respect from the several other buildings and yard of the Establishment being also separated from the Infirmary by a solid wall two feet thick - In consequence of the pressing terms in which the subject has been laid before us, we considered it advisable to make enquiries as to the situation in which fever wards are generally situated both in County Infirmary and Barack Hospitals, and we have upon

best authority, ascertained that in
no Public Establishment, the Convenience
of Invalids, and security from Contagion
is more perfectly attained than in the
buildings, & now occupied, and
we therefore are of opinion that no
additional buildings should be constructed.
Our Medical Officer, Doctor Hamilton
taking the same view of the subject, &
the Guardians. Doctor Hamilton having
also suggested that in the event of any
increase of fever in the Establishment,

That all itinerant Mendicants whom
age, disease, or any other cause may render
really unable to provide for themselves
shall be taken up by the Police and brought
before a Justice of the Peace who shall be
authorized to send them provisionally to the
Workhouse to be afterwards dealt with by the
Board of Guardians, as paupers at present
admitted by a Vagrant order, and
that the Poor Law Board, having the entire
Control over the paid Officers of the Union
their Salaries should therefore be paid out
of the Consolidated Fund, and that
the expenses of building the several
Workhouses throughout the Country, shall
be defrayed by Government
