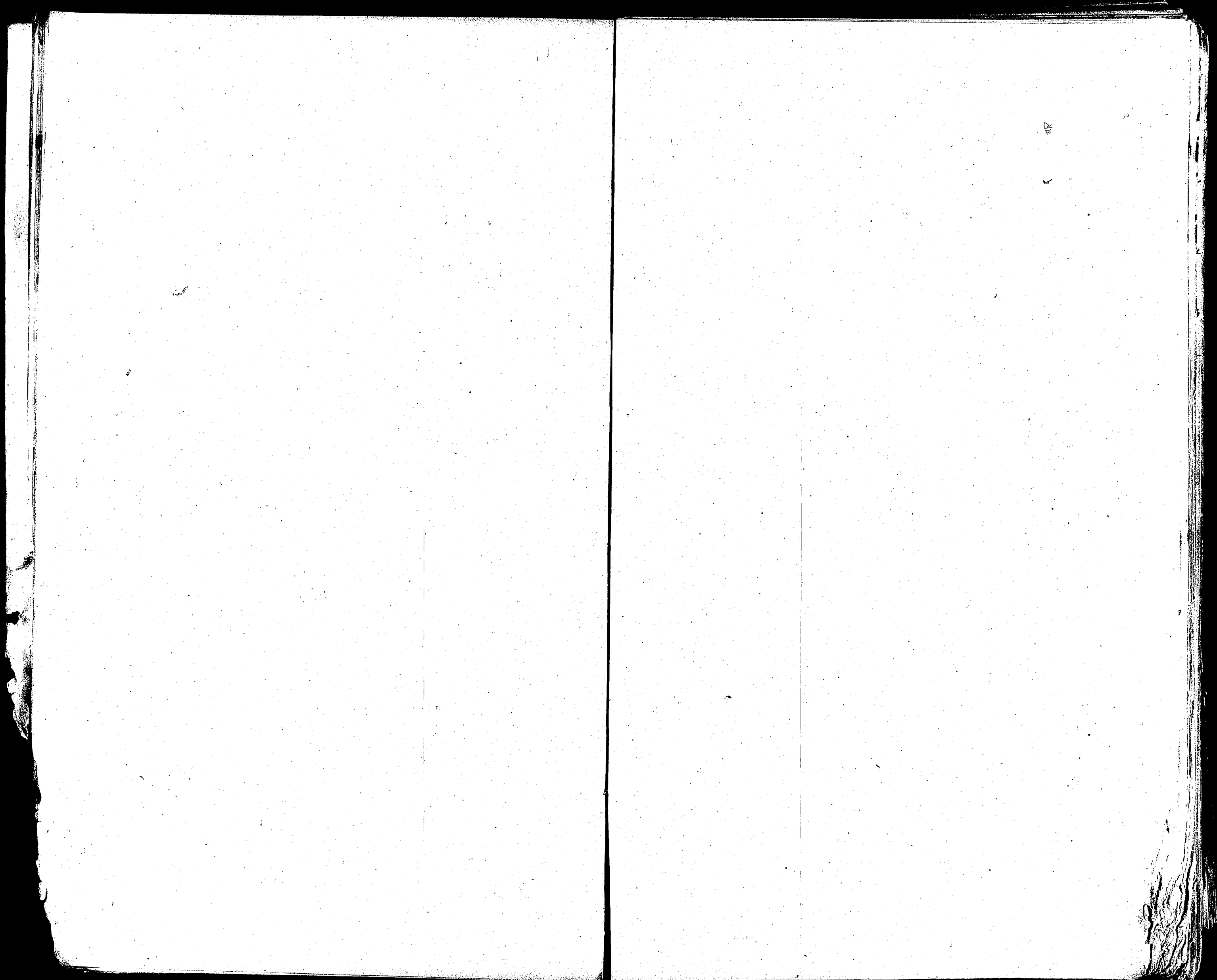

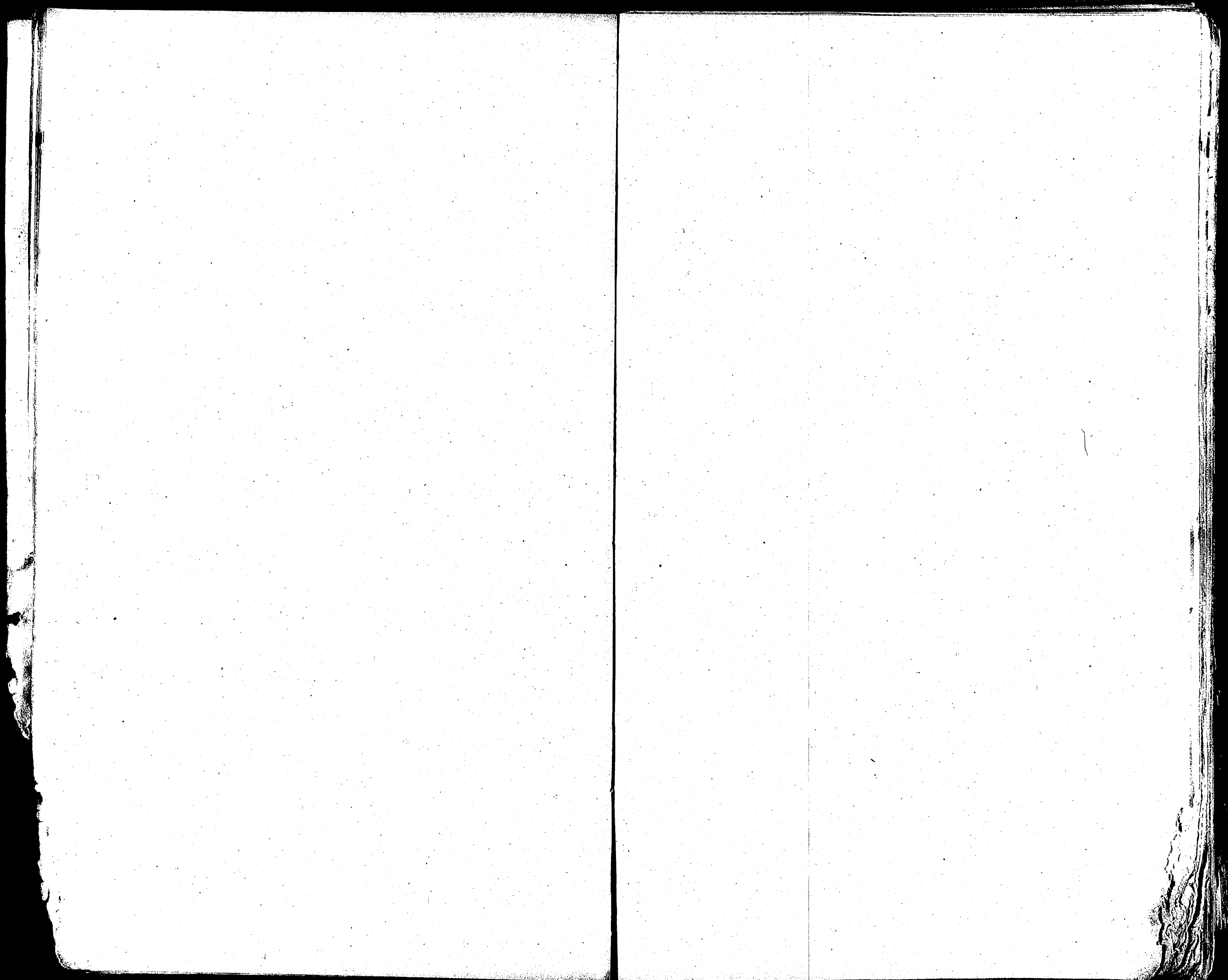

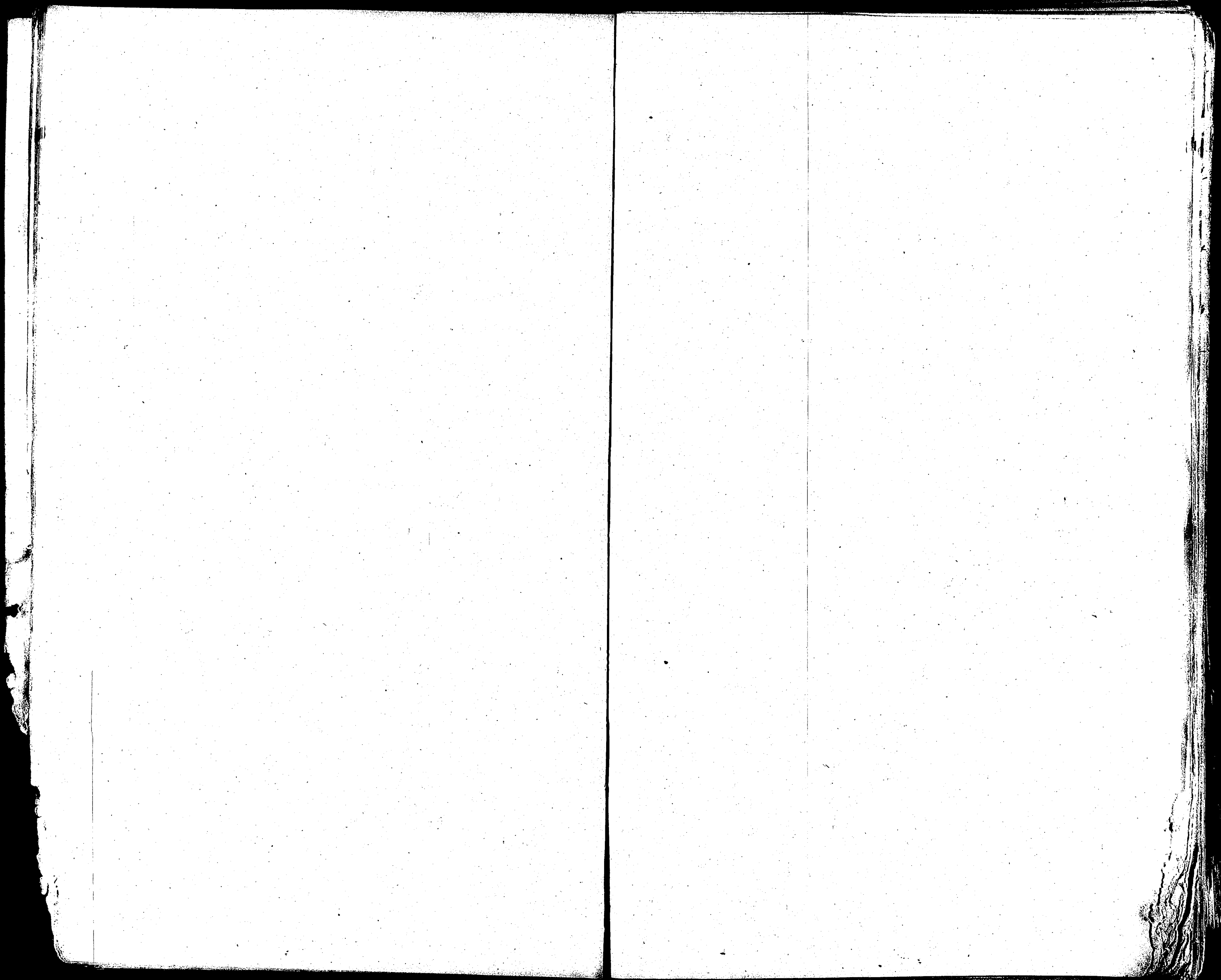

There is a very lamentable deficiency in Bedding which makes it necessary to put three persons in some beds. There are three Committees unoccupied on this account. The Vice Guardians have not means of remedying this evil, as their funds are insufficient to cover the ordinary expenses, but must when the rate is put into collection, this evil may be cured.

The Schools are all unsupplied with the most ordinary School requisites, which prevents the Master from efficiently performing his duty the same remark is applicable to this as to the Bedding.



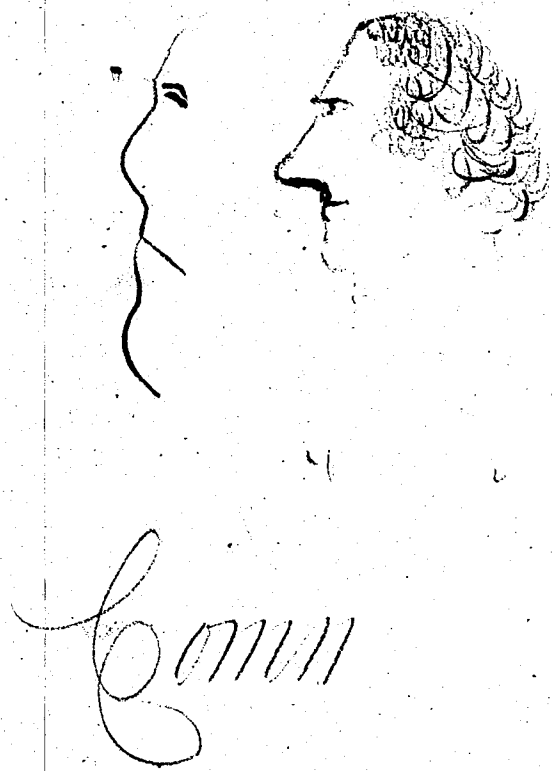
