Sir,

The Commissioners for administration of the Laws for Relief of the Poor in Ireland desire to inform the Board of Guardians of Ballinacorney Union that they have received their Inspector D. Raughan's Half-Yearly Report relating to the Union, in which he states that he inspected the Workhouse on the 25th ultimo, and that the day rooms and dormitories were clean and well ventilated - that the latter apartments contained a sufficient supply of clean good bedding, the provisions in store were of good quality, and the sanitary condition of the House was good.

D. Raughan also states that the inmates are well cared, that the Hospital is kept scrupulously clean and is well supplied with bedding and that the Patients seem to be in as satisfactory a condition as their various ailments admit of.

D. Raughan further states that the Schools are progressing favourably in literary acquirements, but he suggests that

that the industrial training of the girls be varied - it appears that at present the work is not alternated; thus the girls employed at making up dormitories are not employed at making or at cleaning knives and forks and tools and shoes, while the girls employed on those latter works are not employed at washing and scouring or making up dormitories.

D. Raughan observes that the boys' clothing is very much worn and should be replaced, and he suggests that, as the present staff is feeble and in delicate health, and not able to do the work, the Guardians should employ a competent staff, who would get the clothes made up, and instruct some of the boys in his trade; and the Commissioners request the attention of the Guardians to D. Raughan's suggestions.

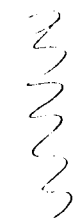

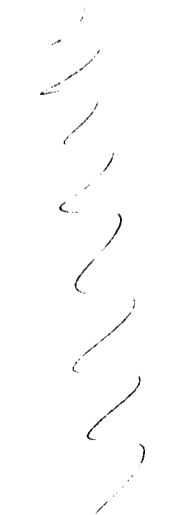

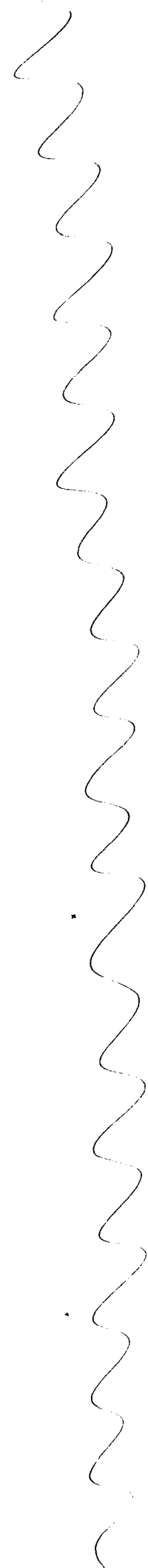
