I have to report that a New Sacket and Vest has been stolen from the Yarker Workshops in the Shed Buildings on the Right of the 10<sup>th</sup> St<sup>h</sup>. This robbery has been effected by some person or persons who came over the boundary wall and forced open the shutters of the window. I have no apprehensions remained the Yarker establishment to the place originally intended for it in the present Workhouse.

The Clerk has intimated to me that the Commissioners of National Education have awarded the sum of £3. 10<sup>0</sup> for instruction to the Boys. I have respectfully to request the pleasure that I decline to accept that gratuity. They have furnished Books of account to be kept and require Returns periodically which to be in connexion with any other duties would be impossible to discharge. I have however to add that the routine of Agricultural operations followed by me which has met the approbation of the Guardians for the last four years will be continued.

The following Letters from the Poor Law Commissioners and others were read by the Clerk, and directions given to answer them respectively, to the following effect, (or Orders made on them respectively, as follows:

Letter from Poor Law Commissioners 71<sup>o</sup> 24329/1854 dated 22<sup>o</sup> July 1854, stating that the Committee were thankful highly desirable to secure the services of efficient Relieving Officers, and it appears to them that £20 per Annum will scarcely compensate the three Relieving Officers for the discharge of the duties which are required of them to be properly performed, and suggesting that an additional £20 should be allowed to each of those Officers.

Resolved that taking into consideration the increased nature of the duties which Relieving Officers are required to perform owing to the improved circumstances of the Country, the Board regret they cannot concur with the Commissioners as to the Amount of Salary to be allowed to those Officers. The Board however agree to continue to pay Mr. Mullen and Mr. Lonkan the present Relieving Officers Salary of £15 per Annum each. Mr. Mullen to reside in Colinstone and Mr. Lonkan in Hallymount. The Union to be divided into two Districts as follows:

The Work states in reply to an inquiry from the Guardians that if the Amount of old Union's Rates subsequent to the date to which they have been included in the Rating Adjustment Order, had been added to the Electoral Divisions of the present Union, the Amount as set forth in Column 11 of the Estimate would be £3023.7. of instead of £3789.14.6. It therefore appears to the Board that the sum of £3023.7. is the Amount which would be required to be provided for next a Rate, assuming that the same Number of paupers would be chargeable to the Union for the next Year as was chargeable for the last Three Months, and that the Contract price of provisions would remain the same. The Guardians however entertain no doubt but that one half of the Summits at present in the House will be used at the approaching Harvest, and that the next Contracts for Provision will be considerably lower than the contracts now in being - It is therefore Unanimously Resolved that the Requirements of the Union be estimated at £2250 or thereabouts, and that the following Provisions Rates producing the Amount calculated on the principle of the Estimate be agreed upon,

The Workhouse Register was produced, examined, and authenticated, from No. 2715 to No. 2729, both inclusive, by the signature of the Chairman, and countersignature of the Clerk.

The Out-door Relief Register was produced, examined, and authenticated from No. 3208 to No. 3210, inclusive, by the signature of the Chairman and countersignature of the Clerk.

in the Ballinrobe Union Ledger to "Final Adjustment Account  
Claremorris Union Account"; which with the payment directly  
made to the Claremorris Union closed the Account of the sums  
declared by the Adjustment Order to be in favor of certain Landlords  
separated from Ballinrobe Union, and now forming a  
portion of the Claremorris Union,

That as the Account is closed as shown by the  
Books of the Ballinrobe Union, yet the Board are not  
cognizant of the manner in which the sums paid to the  
Commissioners have been credited in the Claremorris Union  
Accounts, and it may be, that the balance of the sums not  
directly paid to the Guardians of Claremorris Union is still  
brought forward as a debt due by Ballinrobe Union, and that  
the Advances made by the Commissioners to Claremorris Union  
may also appear on a debt still due to the Commissioners

It is therefore desirable to avoid all uncertainty  
on the subject that stamped Receipts or Vouchers for the  
Cheques issued should be passed by the Commissioners for the  
payments made them; and our Clerk is hereby directed  
to communicate with the Clerk of Claremorris Union respecting  
a stamped Receipt for £1230-9-11 directly paid over to that  
Union - He is also directed to forward a receipt stamped,  
signed by the Board for £1201-4-0 the amount paid on  
Claremorris Union to the Union on Account of the debt due  
under the above Resolution Order -

The Bonds and other securities in force were laid before the Guardians by the Clerk, together

The Amendment was therefore lost by a Majority of 24 yeas

Mr Thomas Grady came before the Board and claimed  
a Sum of £3, for travelling expenses incurred by him whilst  
attending as Poor Rate Collector at Belfast Quarter Sessions on  
the County of Galway on the 13<sup>o</sup> of October 1851 - Belfast is a  
distance of 60 Miles from the Collector's residence and he was  
four days absent from home.

It appears that Mr Grady attended at the desire of  
the Guardians to support Civil Bills for recovery of the Rate  
of 1849 due by subsequent Occupiers in the Cong and  
Pop Electoral Divisions of the former Union, the Statute of  
27 years for proceedings against subsequent Occupiers during the  
Rate of 1849 being then about to expire. It also appears that  
he was not collector when the Rate of 1849 was made, and only  
took up the Warrants on the resignation of Mr. Dancy's  
Collector.

The Board admit the justice of Mr Grady's claim  
and are willing to pay him the amount provided the Poor  
Law Commissioners capture of the payment as a charge  
against the Cong and Pop Electoral Divisions of the former  
Union.

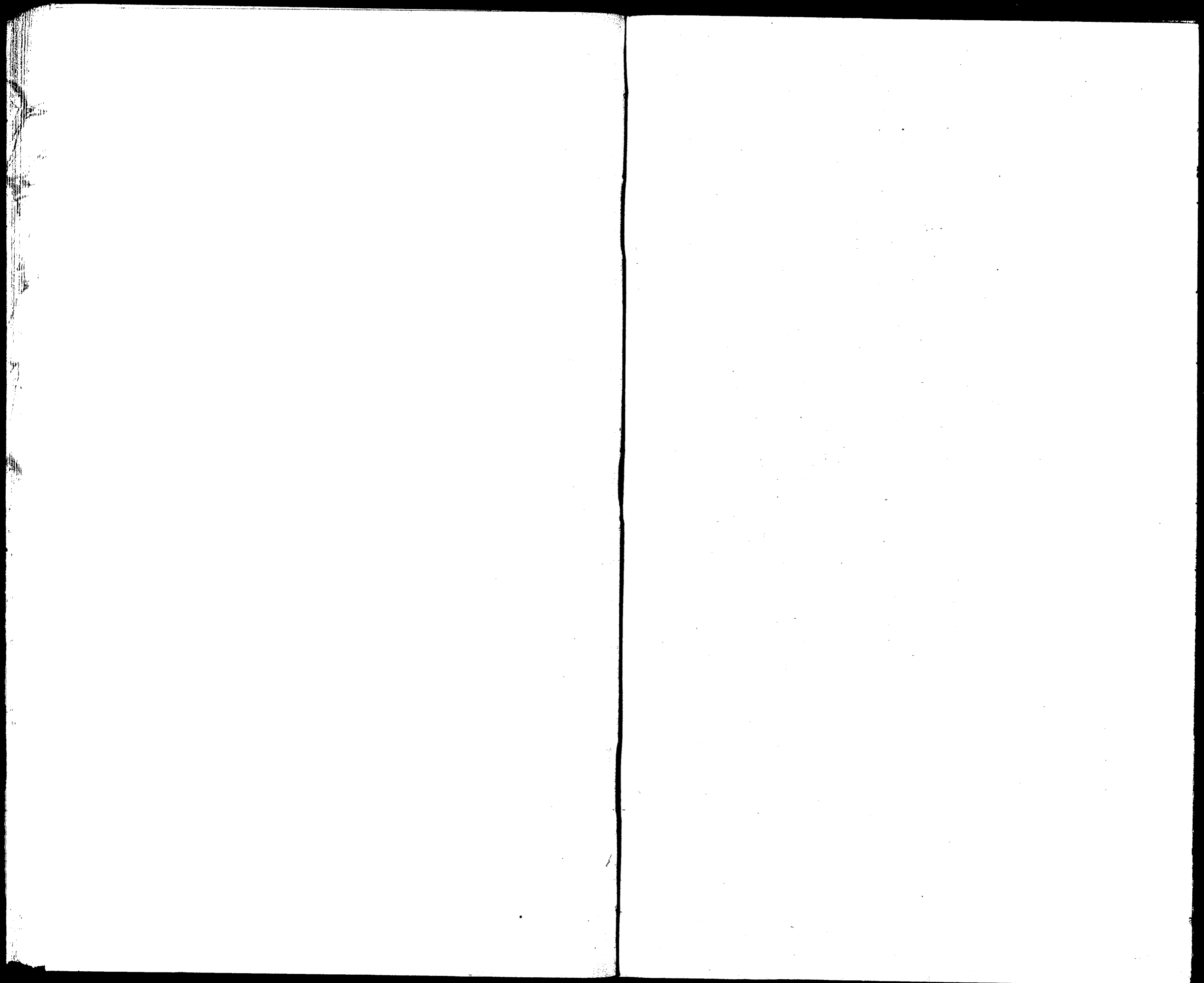
