Ballinacree, July 31st 1871

Gentlemen,

I have to acknowledge the receipt of your official Letter enclosing a copy of an extract from a communication of the Poor Law Commissioners, in which they advert to the fact of my not having got a substitute to say Mass at the workhouse, during my short absence on account of the state of my health, on a recent occasion.

In reply they say that it would, if I could, have procured a substitute to say Mass on that occasion at the workhouse, but I really could not, — all having enough to do for themselves, I am obliged by the state of my health, to take some vacation, like any one else, with the kind sanction of the Board; and so does my co-pastor do too; Even the Sisters of Mercy had to go to Mass in the Parish Church, on the occasion referred to, which, certainly would not have occurred, if it were at all in my power to get a Priest to take my place during my necessary absence.

I need hardly observe that the low of Salary for the support of an additional Priest here, who would be

able

able to act as permanent Chaplain to the workhouse ought to be to 100 per Annum. How could he live less? The workhouse Doctor's get that sum; and it is full little for them, and if cannot see why a Chaplain whose duties are far more onerous and trying should not get as much. I know it is needless to inform the Board of Guardians, that the saying Mass at a workhouse on Sundays is only a very small portion of the duties of a workhouse Chaplain & he has besides, daily trying and arduous functions to discharge; those duties of course must be always attended, to by some Priest in the Parish. Praying you to excuse the length of this Letter,

There are still six defaulters in the Ballinrobe Poor Law District, and the relieving officers were directed to serve notices personally on these defaulters, stating that in the event of non-compliance with the provisions of the compulsory Vaccination Act within a fortnight after date of service, the Board of Guardians will direct proceedings to be instituted for recovery of the penalty imposed under Section 8 of the Act.

I beg to inform you that I found it desirable to employ the Slater for a longer period, than I anticipated, when applying for his services on the 19<sup>th</sup> Ultimo, in consequence of defects in different parts of the Establishment having come under my notice since, - which it was necessary to have remedied.
