Letter from Poor Law Commissioners N^o 85. m/s/g. dated 24th April, 1869, requesting to be furnished with a copy of the Rules for all classes, sick and healthy, at present in use in the Ballinacree Workhouse.

Circular Letter from same, N^o 81. m/s/g. dated 24th April, 1869, forwarding therewith a Form to be filled up and returned to the Poor Law Commission Office, duly certified, as soon as the expenses chargeable on the Parliamentary Grant for Medical and Educational purposes for the Half Year ended the 25th March, last, shall have been accurately ascertained.

The Form referred to in the foregoing Circular Letter, was filled up, and duly certified by the presiding Chairman, and Clerk of the Union.

Resolved That the Relieving Officers be called upon to make out Lists of all persons relieved in their Parishes during the Half Year ended 25th March, last, and from henceforward at the termination of each half Year, — according to Form N^o 24, entitled "List of Destitute Persons relieved out of the Workhouse", and to post copies of same on the external doors of all Churches, and Chapels in their Parishes.

The Relieving Officers were called before the Board, and promised to comply with the terms of the foregoing Resolution.

Resolved That a copy of our former Resolution with reference to the appropriation of a portion of the Irish Church Money to Workhouse Hospitals, be sent to all the Unions in Ireland.

Resolved That the Master be authorized to execute in accordance with the directions of the Roman Catholic Chaplain, certain repairs required in the workhouse Chapel.

Resolved That the Board accept the tender of John Bassett, to paint the external and internal wood, iron, and metal work of the Ballinacree Workhouse, General Hospital, and Register Office, for a sum of 5th July 1869, — the work to be executed according to the terms of the specification, and to be completed within fifteen weeks from the time the Contractor is directed to proceed with same, —

The Contractor to cover the external and internal work with two coats, each coat to be of a different colour.

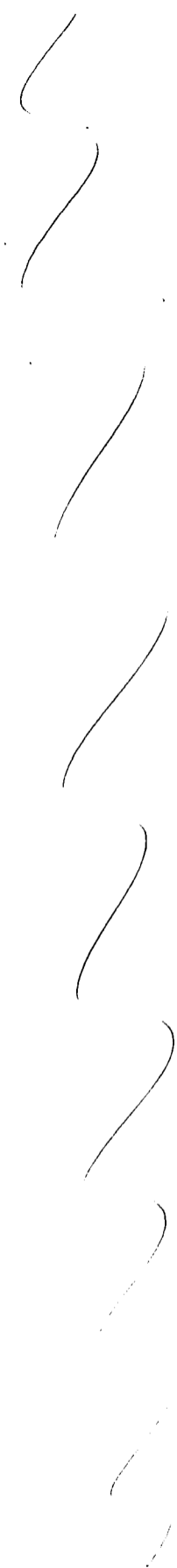
The Board of Guardians will provide all materials except scaffolding, Bricks, and other necessary tools.

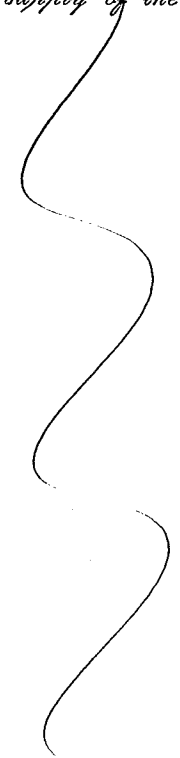

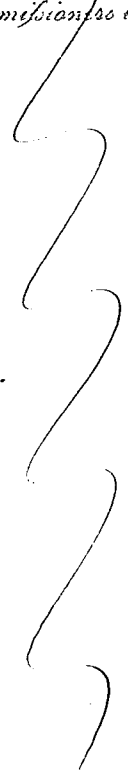

Gentlemen,

In reply to your Circular of the 29th ultimo referring to a statement in the leading article of the "Aberdeen" condemnatory of the present workhouse system.

system in the treatment of children between the ages of 5 and 15 years; the mortality consequent thereon from sources such as may be stated to be engendered by want of cleanliness, food and air and food, viz:- Scrophula and ophthalmia

It is to state for your information that my experience in connexion with the Ballinacree workhouse is altogether antagonistic to the opinion formed by the writer of the article.

That Scrophula and Ophthalmia are not engendered in the Ballinacree Union is clearly proved by the enclosed return; which compiled as it has been with the strictest care as to an unvarnished statement of facts, is in my opinion the most exhausted proof.

It will be seen by the return that of the total of 9 cases treated in the Infirmary for Scrophula and Ophthalmia only 3 cases can be pointed to as having their origin in the House, the remaining 6 having been specially sent in for treatment.

The mortality is not, and since my connexion with the House now nearly three years, I cannot bring to my mind the death of a child between the ages mentioned viz 5 and 15, as to the capability of their becoming good and useful servants, I have no hesitation in stating that their physical appearance can in no way mar their prospect of employment, or be a barrier to their ultimate success.

Many applications have been made to the House for servants and in no case was their "physique" complained of

I most cordially concur with the views entertained by you with regard to Orphan children under 15 years, but do not hold forth my opinion as a foundation for argument against the working of the present system which in the House has proved to be a complete success.

There can be no doubt but that the fire, which I am convinced was accidental, originated in the straw shed, which is situated in a portion of the Women's yard, adjacent to the female wing of the Infirmary Building; I have to add, that every precaution was used to cut off the communication of the fire with the part of the Infirmary, to which at one time it appeared to be extending, and never it not for the valuable assistance rendered by the Workhouse Officials and others in doing so, I fear that the consequences would be more serious. - I have also to state that Messrs Kelly & Kelly Esqrs [Baulett, Gannon, & Talan, Costello and other inhabitants in the Union] did all in their power to assist in extinguishing the fire.

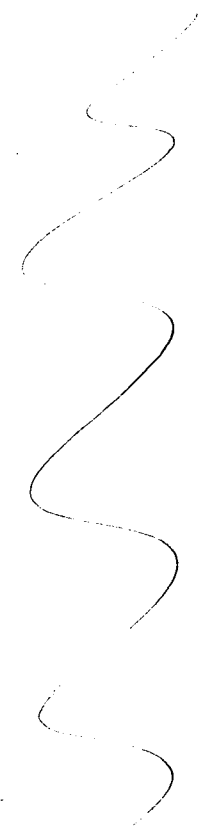

not having come through the walls for some time, the gables of the lower 81 as part of Building I consider now staunch, but the inside of the walls will always appear damp until the present inferior wall plastering shall have been removed, as it can never dry.

The soot-stains on walls are caused by the wet coming down the flues and passing through the walls, where the plastering on the flues is defective, the want of, or rather the absence of fires from the room will account for many such stains and also for a good deal of the dampness.

The tops of all Chimney shafts should be carefully finished off below the stone caps and about the flue openings with cement.

The walls of the strong closet show much appearance of dampness.

Should support that the plaster is to be raked off the walls, the bricks will be raked out and pointed and all to be again plastered with good mortar.

female pupils and though the success up to the present is only moderate it is satisfactory to see able to record some progress in this important Branch, the discipline of the boys' school is very good; in the girls' department the pupils are not disobedient but they have not been sufficiently trained to habits of order, as pointed to Messrs Stanlow & Shadwell, however, he remarks that the average attendance in her department is nearly double the average attendance in the boys' department.

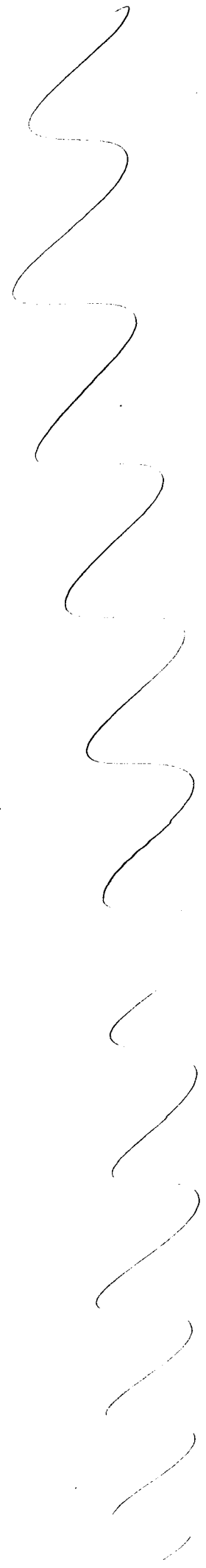

The Clerk read a Letter from Mr. John C. Elliott, Poor Rate Collector, of which the following is a copy.

Strucklabard, Ballinacree
12th August 1867

Gentlemen.

I, Thomas employed as Clerk to copy my collecting warrants [16 in number] for the next new Rate, and will have to pay him a sum of £4, as remuneration for his services, respectfully beg to request that you will be pleased to allow me that amount out of the Rates of the Union, — I am aware that under Article No. 47, paragraph 1 of the General Regulations that it is the duty of the collector to prepare these books, I am also aware that on the 7th of October last, a Letter was addressed to your Board by the Poor Law Commissioners, enjoining that

that they would not object to the allowance of £5, for preparing the Warrants for the year 1868. on the understanding that the collectors should prepare their Books in future, but that the Poor Law Commissioners felt on re-consideration of the subject, have no objection to the continuance of a payment of that nature which has been made every year since 1864, and I desire to place before you, and the Poor Law Commissioners, the following statement of the grounds on which I respectfully submit that I am entitled to payment for copying the collecting warrants; —

From the year 1862 the Poor Rate Collectors in Ballinacree Union were allowed a sum of six pence in the pound for the collection of the Rates; in that year the poundage was reduced to six pence, and the Guardians having taken the reduction of the poundage into consideration in the year 1864, made an allowance to the Collectors for copying their warrants, and continued it yearly ever since.

Before I was appointed to the office of Poor Rate Collector in 1868 — my predecessor was allowed for copying his warrants, and I had no reason to believe that it would not continue,

The Electoral Divisions west of Lough-Black, namely; — Ballinacree, Ballymore, Cappagh, and Poverbum are comprised in my District; the poundage fees paid to me in respect of the collection of the Rates on these Divisions during the current year amounted to £27.0, while the expenses attendant upon the collection considerably exceeded that amount.

In the Strucklabard Union the Poor Rate Collectors are allowed one shilling in the pound for the collection of the Rates, and in the Castletown Union, where the poundage is fixed at six pence in the pound, I have been informed that the Collecting warrants have been always prepared at the expense of

the Union, — County Cops and Income Tax Collectors, who receive a larger rate of remuneration than Poor Rate Collectors, are not put to any expense for the preparation of their Warrants.

In conclusion I beg to add, that since my appointment, I have been most successful in discharging my duties to your satisfaction, as the Union Records will show, and I hope that on your representations, the Poor Law Commissioners will not press their objection to the payment heretofore granted for copying the Collecting Warrants.
