The proficiency of the girls may now be considered excellent, as July last their per centage of proficiency was 88; it has now been raised to 111<sup>1</sup>/<sub>2</sub>.

While it is thus evident that both the teachers have been performing their duty to the children committed to their charge; it is to be regretted that M<sup>r</sup>. Cleaver, during his long service as a National School teacher, should not have made himself sufficiently acquainted with the Practical Rules issued by the Commissioners of National Education, to have enabled him, when examined by the Guardians upon the subject, to guard them from the error of supposing that teachers of Poor Law Union National Schools were not required to give notice to the District Inspector of their intention to close the school at any time not duly notified on the Term Table"

of the Board of Guardians of Clarendon Union on the 15<sup>th</sup> instant, on the subject.

The Board of Guardians desires to offer the following remarks in reference to the explanation furnished by the Relieving Officer of the Clarendon Union:

1<sup>st</sup>. The Board submits that it forms no part of the Relieving Officer's duty to procure employment for applicants for Relief, his duty being one of a very simple nature, and clearly defined in the Poor Law Commissioners Regulations, namely:— to relieve destitution in cases of sudden and urgent necessity, and as it appears that the Board of Guardians of Clarendon Union did not meet for the transaction of business on Wednesday the 8<sup>th</sup> Inst. the Board considers, he should, as regards the case of Anthony Cunningham, have exercised the provisional powers with which he is invested, in a humane and liberal spirit,

2<sup>nd</sup>. The Board must take issue with the Relieving Officer on the fact of Anthony Cunningham's inability to work, for when he presented himself for admission to the Ballinacree Workhouse on Thursday the 9<sup>th</sup> Inst. he was quite incapable of physical exertion, and the Board cannot imagine how so great a change could be brought about in his condition within the brief period of twenty four hours— from being an able bodied labourer at Clarendon on Wednesday the 8<sup>th</sup> Inst. to a wretched half starved looking being at Ballinacree Workhouse on Thursday the 9<sup>th</sup> Inst. apparently suffering from extreme want and debility,

3<sup>rd</sup>. The Board notwithstanding the Relieving Officer's denial to the contrary, believes, that the principal reason for his refusal to relieve Anthony Cunningham was, that he originally belonged to Ballinacree Union
