As I was sitting on the day-room table on the table referred to above, Mr Fenner came in with a story in his hand and asked me what conversation it was going on with here last night, I told him I was able to explain it now as last night, short and says he at once, I told him if he had any charge against me I was ready to go to the local J.P. I said then to myself it was better to take my discharge I went down

and to the Police Station and on the way I saw from his office he was in a room at the top in the street and called me a Pooker.

I was in the room of the gentleman who collected of the workhouse permission to have Mr Brennan, Mr Gibbons, and Mr Platt collected drinking every night in his parlour, the day the table was taken, or some time about that, he was not able to give out the papers until Mr Brennan gave it out, — he was under the influence of drink, he didn't take the names the hospital was, and last Saturday night, Mr Brennan took the names, and on Sunday at all taken on Sunday night, but it was the man used to answer him every night.

This man said in the presence of my son and he showing him, that he would, show you Mr and Mr Donnell's house a fortnight time if he got a chance of them

The man that should go into the Union its detention at his wife house on the table above.

Mr Brennan can tell the time he was drunk, I hope the Guardians will give me justice.

Richard Steady who was present when his letter was read, stated that owing to illness, his son was unable to attend, when which it was resolved that the consideration of his letter be adjourned to this day week.

I am informed that this side, viz the alluvial side, is only used for watering cattle, and that the inhabitants usually draw water from the opposite, the alluvial side.

It has been stated that two Latices connected with the drainage channels flow into the River, I examined the River at that point and failed to find any outlet from those Latices, and I am informed that they are in no way connected with the River.

For ordinary domestic purposes, I am of opinion that the water of the River is quite good enough.

I have with respect to drinking water, and supplying supply can.

can be obtained from spring - within easy reach of the town.

I visited and examined three: two in Wallagep and one on the River bank, adjacent to the town - the former contains an inexhaustible supply of excellent water, for during the last summer the supply was failed, I am further informed, so right of passage to these wells exists.

I visited the well on the River and it is in no way liable to sewage pollution.

I have not heard of any case of typhoid fever (or fever usually produced by sewage contamination) and I am informed that no case of typhoid fever has occurred for many years, the latter fever may be ascribed usually to malarial fever caused by unsanitary conditions apart from water contamination.

These additions have been of considerable magnitude standing between the all-rotor, all-around, and Hospital cases, as to their various duties, the present having every statement to the general management of the Union, I have pointed out the defects and the regulations most applicable to them, and feel sure they will result in greater economy to the Union.

The Local Government Board request that the Board will be good enough to intimate to the Officers concerned that the Board will not permit the future management of the Workhouse to be imperiously affected by the squabbles of the Officers, and unless Captain Sampson is enabled, after a short interval, to report a marked improvement in the general condition of the Workhouse, the Board will urge the Guardians to consider the necessity of making a change in some of the present staff of Officers.

The all-rotor, all-around, and Hospital cases, were called before the Board of Guardians and the foregoing letter read to them.
