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Instructions to the Collectors of the Election at the Polling Stations

The Collectors of the Election at the Polling Stations are instructed to observe the following instructions:—

INSTRUCTIONS AND CAUTIONS TO VOTERS

The following instructions are given to the voters at the Polling Stations:—

1. The voters should arrive at the Polling Station at the time specified on the ballot paper.

2. The voters should bring their ballot papers with them.

3. The voters should not discuss the merits of the candidates or the issues of the election.

4. The voters should not attempt to influence any other voter.

5. The voters should not attempt to tamper with the ballot papers.

6. The voters should not attempt to bring any other person to the Polling Station.

7. The voters should not attempt to bring any other person to the Polling Station.

FORMS

9. Previously to the commencement of the Election, you should procure the requisite supply of the Forms prescribed for use in the Election. With regard to the Forms for the Election (Forms A, B, C, D, E, F, G, H, I, J, K, L, M, N, O, P, Q, R, S, T, U, V, W, X, Y, Z) that should be printed and transmitted to you from this Office a quantity of the same number of copies as was forwarded to you last year will accordingly be furnished to you in due time for printing and distribution according to Article 3 of the General Order. If however you should be of opinion that the number of copies printed last year is greater or less than will be required for the present year you will be good enough to report the fact immediately stating the number which you consider necessary. In the absence of any communication from you before the 20th instant, the same number as was furnished last year will be provided.

10. With regard to the other Forms steps should be taken in due time to provide a sufficient supply of those which may be required for carrying on the Election as prescribed by the General Order. The Forms can be procured from Messrs. A. TAYLOR & CO. (Printers), Abbey Street, Dublin; but should you employ any other Printer it will be necessary for you to compare the several Forms carefully with those prescribed in the General Order, as you will be responsible for their accuracy, and it is advisable that you should ascertain and compare the prices at which they are procurable, before you order them.

FLACARD

11. A Flacard, containing a description of the Electoral Divisions in the Union as at present constituted, to be posted in case of contest, as hereinafter should be prepared, and a sufficient number of copies thereof for posting, obtained when necessary, in like manner with the Voting Papers.

STATEMENTS OF CLAIMS TO VOTE, &c.

12. The Forms (A.1, A.2, B.1 and 2, C.1, and C.2 and 3) for Statements of Claims to be entitled to Vote, and Appointments of Proxies with their Applications, and the Statements of Corporations and Joint Stock Companies, are to be supplied free of charge, on application made to you, to any Persons, or Corporations, or Companies, respectively, who may require them for their own statements or applications. It would not be expedient to make a more general distribution of these Forms.

REGISTRY OF SUCH CLAIMS

13. With regard to the Registry of such Statements and Appointments in the proper Books, (Forms D.1, 2, 3, 4, 5) the Board request the special attention of the Clerk

Any such statements, &c. should be duly preserved, and in case there be reason to believe that any such statements have been already uttered, the Returning Officer should be immediately notified, and the necessary steps should be taken to prevent any further such statements, and for the purpose thereof, the provisions of the Regulation Order should be duly complied with.

DELIVERY OF VOTING PAPERS.

18. The Returning Officer should, under Article 13 of the Election Regulations, to cause any Voting Paper to be delivered out of the Electoral Division or Ward for which it may be necessary to issue Voting Papers, and if the place named for the receipt of Voting Papers by the Officer or Officers who have made statements, be not in any case within the respective Division or Ward in which the properties are situate, you should immediately communicate with such parties, and request them to name a place within the Division or Ward, and point out to them that otherwise they can only vote in manner provided in Article 29 of the Election Regulations; and you should apprise the parties concerned as above of the substance of the Regulation contained in that Article.

MARKING VOTING PAPERS.

19. A practice appears to have been adopted by the Returning Officer in some instances, of marking on each of the Voting Papers, in addition to the number directed by Article 19 of the Election Regulations, the name of the person for whom it is issued, or his name and address, and in the case of a Proxy, the name of the Proxy, as well as that of the person for whom he is Proxy. The Board think it right to point out, that the Returning Officer is not required by the Regulations to endorse the name of any party on the Voting Paper, and the practice has been found in some instances to lead to error. It seems advisable therefore, that the Returning Officer should not, in this respect, do more than he is required to do by the 19th Article of the Election Order, viz.:—to prepare Lists containing the number of each paper, and the name of the place at which it is to be left, and to endorse each paper with its proper number corresponding to that in the List.

RETURNING OFFICER'S DUTIES GENERALLY.

20. The Returning Officer should take care to make himself well acquainted with the Regulations contained in the General Order, before the Election commences. With a view to general convenience and economy, the business of the Election is to be transacted, as far as

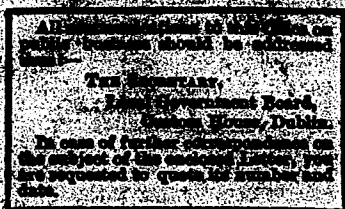

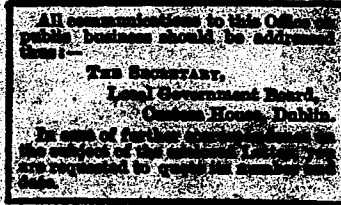

where pigs and cattle are kept also the filth
of the whole public road from the watershed

[PUBLIC No. 195.]

An Act to Regulate Immigration.

Be it enacted by the Senate and House of Representatives of the United States of America in Congress assembled,—That there shall be levied, collected, and paid a duty of fifty cents for each and every passenger not a citizen of the United States who shall come by steam or rail vessel from a foreign port to any port within the United States. The said duty shall be paid to the Collector of Customs of the port to which such passenger shall come, or if there be no Collector at that port, then to the Collector of Customs nearest thereto, by the Master, Owner, Agent or Consignee of every such vessel, within twenty-four hours after the ontry thereof into such port. The money thus collected shall be paid into the United States Treasury, and shall constitute a fund to be called the Immigrant Fund, and shall be used, under the direction of the Secretary of the Treasury, to defray the expense of regulating Immigration under this Act, and for the care of Immigrants arriving in the United States, for the relief of such as are in distress, and for the general purposes and expenses of carrying this Act into effect. The duty imposed by this Section shall be a lien upon the vessels which shall bring such passengers into the United States, and shall be a debt in favour of the United States against the Owner or Owners of such vessels; and the payment of such duty may be enforced by any legal or equitable remedy. Provided, that no greater sum shall be expended for the purposes hereinbefore mentioned, at any port, than shall have been collected at such port.

Section 2. That the Secretary of the Treasury is hereby charged with the duty of executing the provisions of this Act and with supervision over the business of Immigration to the United States, and for that purpose he shall have power to enter into contracts with such State Commission, Board, or Officers as may be designated for that purpose by the Governor of any State to take charge of the local affairs of Immigration in the ports within said State, and to provide for the support and relief of such Immigrants therein landing, as may fall into distress or need public aid, under the rules and regulations to be prescribed by

Collector of such port, and such persons shall not be permitted to land.

Section 3. That the Secretary of the Treasury shall establish such regulations and rules and issue from time to time such instructions not inconsistent with law as he shall deem best calculated to protect the United States and immigrants into the United States from fraud and loss, and for carrying out the provisions of this Act and the Immigration Laws of the United States; and he shall prescribe all forms of bonds, entries and other papers to be used under and in the enforcement of the various provisions of this Act.

Section 4. That all foreign convicts except those convicted of political offences, upon arrival, shall be sent back to the nations to which they belong and from whence they came. The Secretary of the Treasury may designate the State Board of Charities of any State in which such Board shall exist by law, or any Commission in any State, or any person or persons in any State, whose duty it shall be to execute the provisions of this Section without compensation. The Secretary of the Treasury shall prescribe regulations for the return of the aforesaid persons to the countries from whence they came, and shall furnish instructions to the Board, Commission or persons charged with the execution of the provisions of this Section as to the mode of procedure in respect thereto, and may change such instructions from time to time.

The expense of such return of the aforesaid persons not permitted to land shall be borne by the owners of the vessels in which they came.

Section 5. That this Act shall take effect immediately.

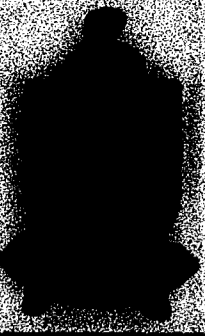

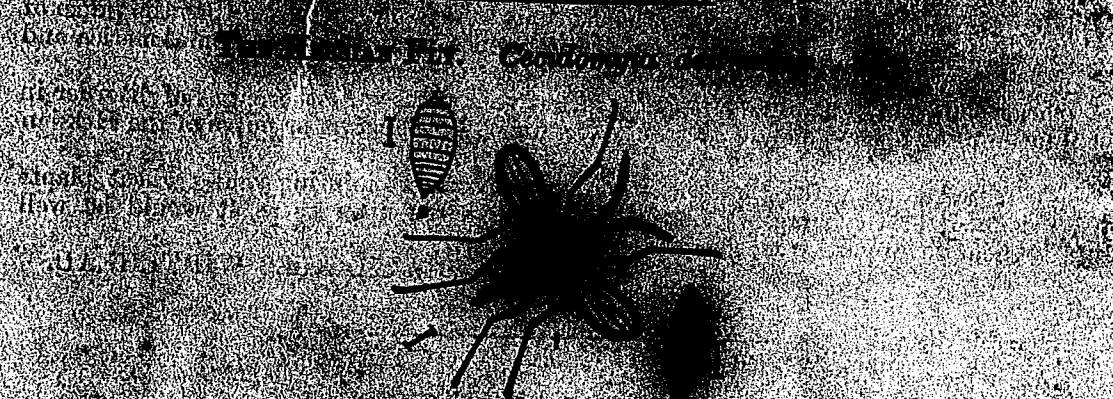


FIG. 1. Hessian fly, adult. FIG. 2. Larva magnified.

This insect is native to Europe, where it is a pest of corn crops in America, Canada, and parts of Germany. In some years it has entirely destroyed the wheat crops in large districts. In the southern States of Georgia, Florida, and Alabama, the fly has committed such ravages that the crops have been ruined and have not enough seed for another year. It has been introduced into this country in 1852, and until this present year, though in 1860 it entered the State of New York.

In 1852 the importation of wheat from America was prohibited by the British Government, and it was ascertained that it was not likely that the insect could be brought over in that way.

Now, however, without any doubt, it has appeared here, and all effort must be made, and every means resorted to, to stamp out this dangerous invader. To effect this, if possible, information is given below as to the nature of the attack of the Hessian fly, and a description of it in its various stages, as well as methods of preventing it from spreading in this country.

The signs of the Attack.

The plants of wheat and barley infested with this insect turn yellow, and become stunted and unproductive. Plants upon sharp gravelly patches, "pincocky places," "stonebrash," or "stone masher," and upon the poorest soils of fields show the attack first and most seriously. As the plants ripen the stalks become root-fallen and scrawled, the ears are small, and the grains misshapen and shrivelled. Corn plants thus affected should be carefully examined, especially their leaves or blades, just at the points where they cover the second joints of the stems from the ground.

The Description of the Insect.

Upon corn plants thus injured either the larva (Fig. 2) of the Hessian fly, or its pupa (Fig. 3) will be found close to the lower joints between the stems and the leaves, or blades.

The larva, which are the authors of the mischief, as they suck out the juices of the plants, are like white or translucent maggots, about the fifteenth of an inch long, having stripes of a greenish hue under their skins. They remain in this state from four to six weeks, and then assume the pupal form.

The pupa are called "flax seeds" in America, because they are like small, elongated seeds. They are a little larger than the larva and are of a chestnut colour. It is not known at present that the Hessian fly has been seen in England.

The pupa are summer hibernals, and when once discovered immediate steps should be taken to prevent their hibernating in the soil (Fig. 1), which would lay eggs upon the corn plants either in the coming autumn or in the spring.

Methods of Prevention.

When the Hessian fly has been discovered, the "flax seeds" have been found should be destroyed by burning, or by plowing them under, or by reaping machines high, or by reaping the wheat low, and burning the stubble. When barley is short and must be cut, it should be cut as high as possible, and the stubble should be kept as high as possible.

Land upon which the crop is to be sown should be immediately after harvest, and burnt. After this has been done, the land should be ploughed in a manner which will bring the straw from the previous year to the surface. If it is found that the soil is too hard, it should be broken up by means of a light harrow. This may be done by hand, or by means of a horse-drawn harrow. The most careful manner of ploughing is that in which the seed is sown in the furrow.

Should it be discovered that the larvae or maggots are infesting young wheat plants in November, or that pupae or "larx seed" are present upon them, it will be well to feed them down hard with sheep.

SUPPLEMENTAL SUGGESTIONS

The following supplemental suggestions have been prepared by Mr. Charles Whitehead, F.L.S., F.G.S., at the request of the Lords of the Privy Council for Agriculture, in consequence of the recent appearance of the Hessian fly in perfect form —

1. In the preparation and issue of the suggestions concerning the Hessian fly, the perfect insect or fly has been seen to come from the pupae of the fly which are found in the stems of wheat and barley plants. It may therefore be assumed that the insect will be of a double brooded habit in this country, as it is in America and Canada, and will attack wheat plants in the autumn, and wheat plants and barley plants in the spring and summer.

The fly, as it has appeared lately in England, corresponds exactly with the descriptions of American entomologists, and eminent English authorities have pronounced it to be the Hessian Fly, *Cecidomyia destructor* Say. It resembles a very great being about the eighth of an inch long. Its body is brown, with the head and fore part of the body of a rather darker colour. The wings are gray or smoky coloured, and have long fine fringes around them, with peculiar veins characteristic of the *Cecidomyia*. Its long horns, or antennae, are like those of a fly.

As soon as the wheat plants are up, the flies will lay eggs upon them. Larvae, or little white maggots (Fig. 2), will be hatched from them and attack the plants, living on them until they turn to pupae (Fig. 3), in which form they will pass the winter. Flies will come from these pupae in the spring, and deposit eggs upon wheat plants and barley plants. Larvae proceeding from these eggs will injure these plants in the manner observed recently near Harland, Inverness, Perth, and in Essex, and elsewhere.

Farmers, and especially those who are in or near districts that were infested this year, should watch their wheat plants in October and November, and examine them for larvae between the stems and the blades. Should larvae be found, dressings of soot, or of soot and lime, or of guano, would assist in the operations. Wheat plants upon which larvae are seen in the autumn, or upon which pupae are found in the winter, should be fed closely down by sheep in the early spring, if possible. Heavy rollers, withering or ordinary rollers would be serviceable.

It is also important to burn infested stables or barns, and to destroy in any way the flies from being generated. In the case of seeds, which are liable to be attacked, it should be treated with potash or cyanide, or with sulphuric acid, and collected as closely as possible for burning by means of New Doves.

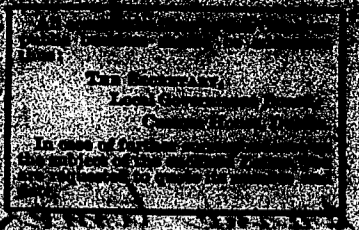

In pursuance of the 4th Section of "The National School Teachers (Ireland) Act, 1875," the Local Government Board for Ireland transmit to you herewith, to be laid before the Board of Guardians of *Ballinrobe* Union, the Notice which they are required by that Section to transmit, on or before the 1st day of January, to the Guardians of every Union which shall not at such time be a contributory Union within the meaning of the Act.

A practice appears to have been adopted by the Returning Officer in some instances, of marking on each of the Voting Papers, in addition to the number directed by Article 19 of the Election Regulations, the name of the person for whom it is issued, or his name and address; and in the case of a Proxy, the name of the Proxy, as well as that of the person for whom he is Proxy. The Board think it right to point out that the Returning Officer is not required by the Regulations to endorse the name of any party on the Voting Paper, and the practice has been found in some instances to lead to error. It seems advisable, therefore, that the Returning Officer should, in this respect, do more than he is required to do by the 19th Article of the Election Order, viz.—to prepare Lists containing the number of each paper, and the name of the place at which it is to be left, and to endorse each paper with its proper number corresponding to that in the List.

RETURNING OFFICER'S DUTIES GENERALLY

20. The Returning Officer should take care to make himself well acquainted with the Regulations contained in the General Order, before the Election commences. With a view to general convenience and economy, the business of the Election is to be transacted, as far as

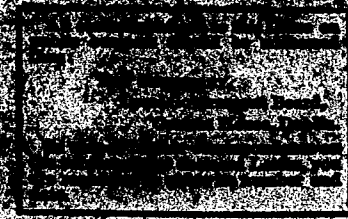

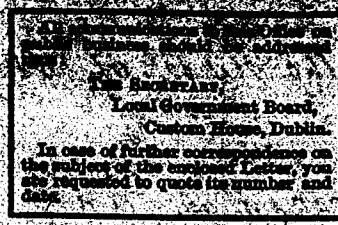

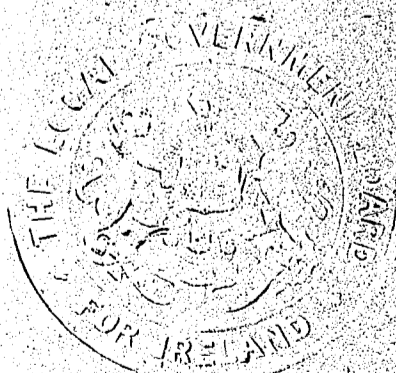

DISCOVERY OF THE PUPA CASES OF THE HESSIAN FLY (MELAX SEEDS) OF
THE HESSIAN FLY IN THE LIGHT GRAINS
AND WEED SEEDS OF THE THRESHING MACHINES,
AND UPON IMPORTED STRAW.

Pupa Cases of the Hessian Fly have been discovered in considerable numbers among the light grains, and the weed seeds and other refuse from recently threshed wheat and barley.

In view of the urgent importance of preventing the distribution of these Pupa Cases, and their subsequent development into Hessian Flies, in the first warm days of Spring, every means should be adopted at once by Local Authorities to warn agriculturists of this danger.

The light grains and "chogs," and the weed seeds, and all other refuse which fall through the riddles and screens should be carefully examined. If Pupa Cases are found, the light grains and "chogs" should be disposed of, so as to effectually prevent the distribution of the Insect; while the weed seeds and other refuse should be burnt.

As Pupa Cases have been found upon imported straw, just above the first or second joints, agriculturists and other purchasers of foreign baled straw should be warned to examine it closely; and if the chestnut-coloured Pupa Cases are seen upon it, to report to the Local Authority, who are requested to transmit the information to the Agricultural Department.

The Local Government Board for Ireland have had under consideration the proceedings of Boards of Guardians regarding payments voted by them from time to time in pursuance of the 73rd Section of the Act 13 & 14 Vic., chap. 69, as compensation to Clerks of Unions for the duties imposed upon them by the Parliamentary Voters' Acts, and to enable them to remunerate the Poor Rate Collectors and other assistants for their services in connection with the discharge of those duties. Resolutions have been proposed and passed in many cases granting such allowances without any previous notice to the Guardians, and it is the opinion of the Board that this course is open to objection.

For several years the same amount was usually paid to the Clerks as remuneration for their services under the Parliamentary Voters' Acts, and as the annual vote was, in most Unions, very much a matter of form it did not appear to be important that the Guardians should be specially summoned to consider the subject, but the sums proposed now in each year vary considerably, and the Board must request that, in future, at least one week's notice may be given to each Guardian before payments are voted under the Act referred to.

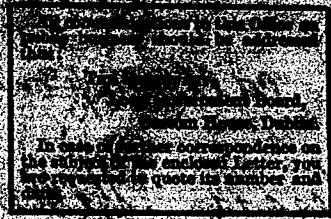

It will be observed that, notwithstanding
the fact that the number of persons in question has
decreased in the last few years, the number of persons on
outdoor relief has increased from 1874, while the amount of outdoor
relief has risen from £2,240 to £10,000.

In the opinion of the Local Government Board, the great increase in this
class of relief has been indirectly brought about by the lax and unsound system
under which the Poor Law is administered by Boards of Guardians in many parts
of the country.

Experience in the execution of the Poor Law both in England and Ireland
has proved conclusively that the direct tendency of any system of outdoor relief
is to demoralise the people and absorb the property of the country, and, while
temporary outdoor relief in cases of sickness ought to be freely afforded, the
practice of permanently relieving persons in that manner in ordinary times, instead
of offering them admission to the workhouse, encourages and perpetuates the
evils referred to.

It is often alleged that as the outdoor relief afforded to an individual costs
less than the maintenance of such pauper in the workhouse the system is
economical, but this view of the matter is most erroneous, for, while only really
deserving persons desire to obtain indoor relief, outdoor relief is eagerly sought for
by and often given to persons who ought not to be maintained at the public cost and
who would not accept it in the workhouse, and the general expenditure is greatly
increased by reason of the excessive number of persons thus supported. No test
of destitution has ever been found so thoroughly effectual as the workhouse test,
and it is due to those who provide the funds for the support of the poor that

It is to be regretted that there are a few Unions in which the Board of Guardians are not so vigilant in their duties as they should be, unless in cases of sickness and other emergencies. The Board of Guardians of the others in the interests of the ratepayers who are already heavily taxed for purposes other than poor relief. The present season an opportune time to bring the matter forward as the autumn is the most favourable season of the year for revising the relief lists, and the Local Government Board hope that the Boards of Guardians who have hitherto afforded outdoor relief very freely will give this important matter their careful consideration, and endeavour to lessen the charges on the ratepayers by re-arranging the Poor Law Acts on a better and more sound principle than obtains in so many parts of Ireland at present.
