THIS MINUTE BOOK, in which shall be entered the statistical information laid before the Board of Guardians relating to the inmates of the Workhouse, the collection of the Rates, and the state of the Finances of the Union; Minutes of all Orders received from the Commissioners for administering the Laws for Relief of the Poor in Ireland, and of all Letters received from the Commissioners or other parties relating to the business of the Union, and of all directions given by the Board of Guardians thereon; Minutes of the production and examination of the Register, and all other Books and Accounts which are required to be periodically produced, and of all orders given; Minutes of the Reports of the Visiting and Finance Committees, and of the Clerk, the Overseers, and other Officers of the Workhouse, and of all directions given by the Board thereon; Minutes of all orders and checks given, all accounts examined and allowed, and all salaries paid; a statement of the number of cases of provisional relief, and of applications for relief, brought before the Board and considered and decided on by them; as well as all other business, proceedings, and transactions of the Board of Guardians, at any of their Meetings.

The following Letters from the Poor Law Commissioners and others were read by the Clerk, and directions given to answer them respectively to the following effect (or Orders made on them respectively as follows:)

One clear Letter from Poor Law Comrs. N<sup>o</sup> 25 m/12, dated 31<sup>st</sup> March, 1843. forwarding therewith, for the information of the Board of Guardians, a copy of a Bill for establishing compulsory vaccination in Ireland, and stating that any views which the Board may desire to express on the subject should be adopted by them at the first convenient opportunity, and recorded on their Minutes.

It is the unanimous opinion of the Board of Guardians that it would be an advantage to the Country, if the provisions of the proposed Bill were passed into law, and the Guardians request that the Poor Law Commissioners will communicate their views in this respect to the Chief Secretary for Ireland.

Circular Letter from Poor Law Comrs. N<sup>o</sup> 1475 m/12, dated 1<sup>st</sup> April, 1843, requesting to be furnished with a Return respecting the Rates made, and any new Rates agreed upon during Month of March, 1843.

Letter from Poor Law Comrs. N<sup>o</sup> 7118/1843, dated 1<sup>st</sup> April, 1843, stating their objections to the residence of two Ladies of the "Sisters of Mercy" in the Workhouse with the Lady who has been elected Nurse, and requesting of the Board to withdraw the permission which was tendered in the Resolution of the 19<sup>th</sup> ultimo, also stating that they do not wish to urge upon the Guardians the appointment and remuneration of more paid Nurses than may be needed for the service of the Hospital.

That concurring with the Poor Law Commissioners in the views expressed by them regarding the residence of persons in the Workhouse not under official control -

It is Resolved that the permission given to two of the "Sisters" to reside with Miss Fitzpatrick be withdrawn, as however the Board believe it would be for the manifest advantage of the sick in Hospital that three of the "Sisters of Mercy" should be in charge of that Department. The Chairman gave Notice of Motion to carry this desirable object into effect without infringing on the Regulations of the Poor Law Commissioners.

Notice of Motion

I give Notice that I will in this day fortnight move that the Salary and allowance in lieu of Rations proposed to be paid to the Hospital Nurse Miss Fitzpatrick be reduced as follows: -

Salary from £15 to £5 per Annum, allowance in lieu of Rations from £15 to £5 per Annum.

I will also move that two additional Nurses be appointed to the Hospital at salaries of £3 per Annum each, with Allowance to each of £5 yearly in lieu of Rations

I beg to report that two Pauper Stragglers named Catherine Garvey and Catherine Macken, were each sentenced to one month's imprisonment at the last Petty Sessions of Ballinacree for the following offences;— Catherine Garvey for an assault on a pauper Straggler named Bridget Shanally, and Catherine Macken for immorality.

Three Schoolboys named Michael Kelly, Martin McEnahan, and Terence McDermott, absconded from the Workhouse on the 17<sup>th</sup> inst, they have since been arrested, and remanded for presentation at the next Petty Sessions of Ballinacree.
