The Parish of Kilmoremoy, which embraces the important Town and suburbs of Balling, is situated on both binks of the River Moy, which river enters the tidal waters of Killala Bay at the Salmon Weir in Balling. This district, which is part of the fertile "Valley of the Moy", offers many and charming vistas, the to Valley of the Moy being ringed in by the Ox and Nephin Mountains, with Killala Bay on the North. It is impossible to ignore the majestic splendour of Nephin Mountain (2,646 ft); and from whatever angle one may view the surrounding country, Nephin, which is about 8 or 10 miles Southwest of Balling, at all times affords a magnificent background to the picturesque scenery on all sides. From Cuig na Sidhe on the Sligo Road, about a mile North-east of Ballina, and from other plentiful eminences, a wonderful view of the mountains is obtainable, with, on a clear fine day, Croagh Patrick in the far Southwest. Belleek Menor, about a mile from Ballina, on the Northern side has been the home of the Gores, the Knox-Gores, and latterly the Saunders Knox-Gores, since the of the Gores, the Knox-Gores, and latterly the Saunders knox-Gores, since the erection of the Manor (then called the Abbey), by one of the original name about the year 1830. The Manor, together with a splendid demesens of over 6,000 wores, has recently been sold to p. J. Frank Beckett, Ballina. The entire contents, including furniture (amongst which are some splendid antiques), will be auctioned next September. The Maner itself, while not beasting of any exceptional architectural features, is splendid and imposing building of lime-stone. About ten years ago a modern ventilation system was installed. The Manor has always been used as a private residence, and has no important historic or external associations. The demashe extends for a considerable distance along the River Moy, where there is an abundance of free trout fishing; and some miles to the Southwest, near Foxford, Mr. Saunders Knox-Gore owned and has retained an excellent stretch of preserved salmon fishing on the River Moy. The demasne proper, i.e. immediately surrounding the Manor, comprises 415 acres whereof 240 acres are thickly wooded, holding an abundance of woodcock and pheasant; 40 acres are devoted to lawn; and another 40 acres to mixed tillage. On the Sligo side there is a grouse moor of 2,000 acres, and near the Demasne, on the Killala Road, a well-filled duck lake. Convenient to the Manor are 3 acres of garden. the walls of which are lined with brick to retain the heat; and la acres are planted with apple and pear traes, the remainder with flowers, vegetables, and other fruits-
