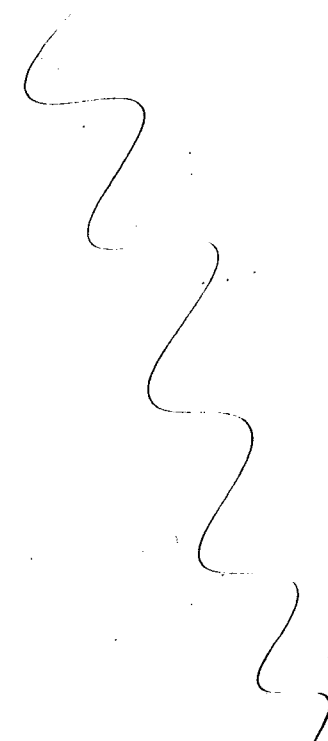

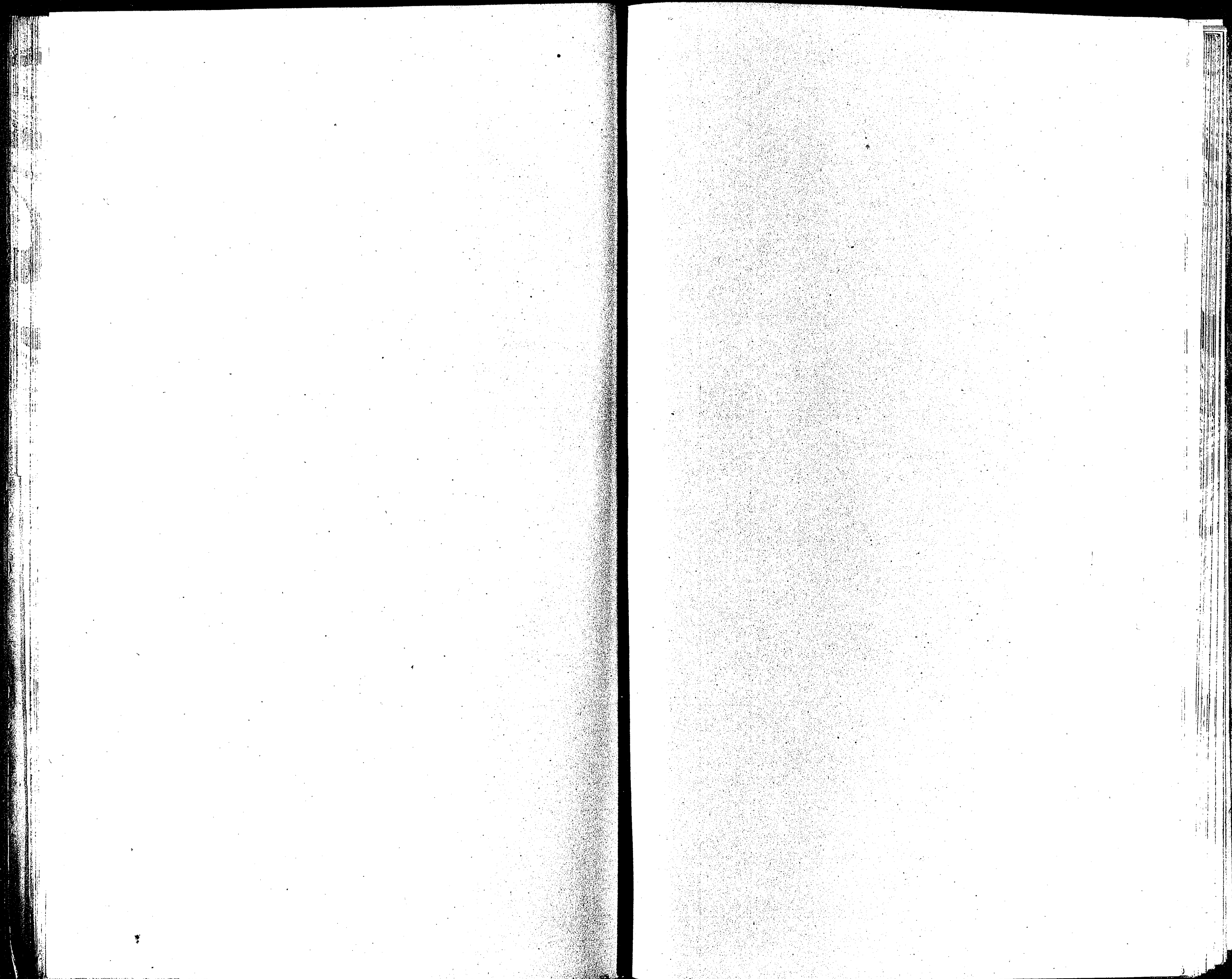

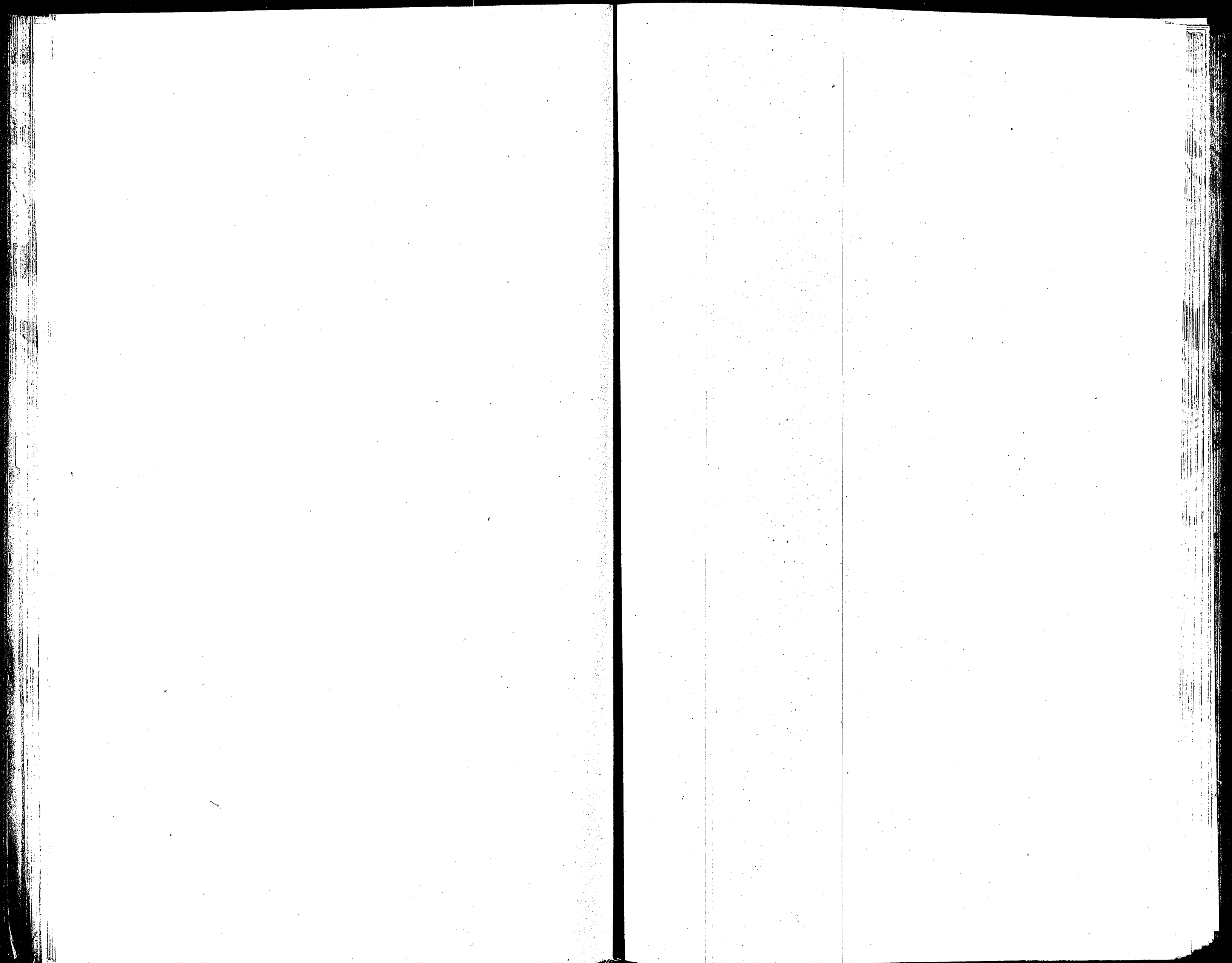

informing me that by the direction of the Board
of Guardians the child of the late John Hobart of

registered as a Roman Catholic, and stating that the
reason which induced the Guardians to come to this
conclusion was that upon inquiry from the
Relieving Officer they were informed that the child's
mother is a "Romanist" — As I cannot believe
that the Board of Guardians would have so decided
had they been rightly informed of the facts, I feel
it to be my duty to bring the case again before
them, and respectfully to ask for its re-consideration,

I will state the facts as briefly as possible,
The late John Hobart when upon his death bed
made a solemn request of me, as the Vicarman
of his Parish, to see that his children were brought
up in the Protestant faith, and he left the sum
of Seventy pounds to each of his children provided
they were educated in that faith, — This will
is in the possession of his Nephew Mr. Walter
Ryan of Exe-square Galway, to whom he
bequeathed the interest in his farm, and by whom
the money is to be paid to the children provided
the condition contained in the will is carried out,

I need scarcely say what an injustice
it would be to the Poor held to debate it here

To the Chairman Board of Guardians
Rathfriland

the benefit of its father's legacy, — now with regard to the mother of the child, I do not think that the Relieving Officer knows anything whatever about her, as it is several years since she went to America, and, if in the land of the living, she may now be a professor of the Mormon creed, which considering her antecedents, is not at all improbable,

I regret to be obliged again to trouble the Board of Guardians in this matter, but a sense of duty obliges me to do so, and I trust if I am addressing a body of Gentlemen, who [when they have accurate information before them] know how to perform theirs, —

May add, in conclusion that arrangements were nearly completed, when the child was taken to the Workhouse, to have it admitted into our Asylum where it would be supported and educated,
