The Minutes of last Meeting were read and Signed.

The Warehouse Register was produced, examined, and authenticated, from No. 2885 to No. 2891 both inclusive, by the signature of the Chairman, and countersignature of the Clerk.

The Out-door Relief Register was produced, examined and authenticated from No. to No. inclusive, by the signature of the Chairman and countersignature of the Clerk.

The Clerk's Report on the execution of Orders previously made by the Board was read to the following effect:

We forward for the information of the Board of Guardians, the following extracts from the District Inspector's Report of the 11th of March last, on the Kallumoke Poor Law Union National School.
"The course of training and instruction is suitable; and the proficiency in both Male and

Female

Female Departments feet, —

The Male School is now in the same efficient state as ascertained at last inspection; the teacher is painstaking, and the result of the examination gave ample evidence that Reading, Writing and Arithmetic are well attended to, and the third and fourth classes have made fair progress since last inspection."

Though the numbers in the lower classes is proportionally greater in the Female, than in the Male School: yet the female teacher has made a considerable number of removals from Just Wood since last visit, the Reading has improved, but she has still to complain that the junior pupils read in quite too low a tone of voice, the second class pupils are not ready at giving an intelligent explanation of the lesson read: and they require to improve in mental calculations and Geography on the whole, however, this part of the School has made fair progress since last inspection.

The School as a whole may be said to be progressing."

was proposed by C. C. Miller Esq. seconded by
Geoffrey Mathew Esq. - Resolved, - That the
Poor Law Commissioners be requested to rescind their
sealed Order of the 20th June 1864, and divide
the present Ballinacorney District, into
two Districts, according to the arrangement
originally proposed by the Board of Guardians on the
24th March 1864, No. 1. or Ballinacorney District
to comprise the Electoral Divisions of Ballinacorney,
Kilmacnee, and Neale, No. 2, to comprise the
Electoral Divisions of Ballinacorney, Ballymore,
Cappaghtruff, Owenbrum, and Pultney.

That the object of the Board of Guardians in
desiring to accomplish this change is of a
two fold nature,

First, That it would tend to a more
efficient administration of the Medical Charities in
the proposed No. 2 District.

Secondly, That it would relieve the Rate-payers
of the Electoral Divisions of Ballinacorney, Kilmacnee,
and Neale, from contributing to the Maintenance
of a Dispensary at Cappaghtruff, and the payment of
a Resident Medical Officer in that locality, and thus
remove a great source of dissatisfaction which the

the present arrangement has engendered.
 That it must be obvious to the Poor Law Commissioners, that the existing arrangements in the Cappaghduff District are defective, from the mere fact that the Dispensary and residence of the Medical Officer are at least 14 statute miles distant from Ballinacree, where the meetings of the Committee of Management of Ballinacree Dispensary District are held, and should unfortunately, an epidemic disease break out, in that remote District, (an event by no means improbable) and that the Poor Law Commissioners could feel bound, in the exercise of their powers, to put into operation, the provisions of the Diseases Prevention Act 1855 the Sanitary Committee for that District, would hold its meetings in Ballinacree, where the Medical Officer would be required to attend weekly, perhaps to the unavoidable neglect of any urgent and important duties.

As a further illustration of the working of the present arrangement, the Board of Guardians calls attention to the fact; that should the Medical Officer at Cappaghduff, be prevented from sickness, or other sufficient cause from performing his duties he must communicate with the Honorary Secretary, or Chairman of the Ballinacree Dispensary Committee, either of whose residence is over 14 miles distant from Cappaghduff, and the appointment of his substitute must be made at a meeting convened, to be held in the Town of Ballinacree.

As regards the question of location, the Board submits that it is both impolitic and unjust to ask the Rate-payers of the heavily taxed Divisions of Ballinacree, Tubman, and Auld to contribute to the support of a Dispensary established for the exclusive benefit of the people

residents

residing in the District, west of Joseph ^{7 March} 1864.
 It appears that the cost of the Medical Charities Expenditure in the Ballinacree Dispensary District, as at present constituted, amounts to three pence in the pound, save the arrangement originally proposed by the Guardians on 24th March 1864, carried out, the cost on the Ballinacree District would be the excess 10¹/₄ in the pound, and on the proposed new District 8¹/₄ in the pound, so that if the Poor Law Commissioners accede to the request contained in their Resolution, the additional location henceforward to be borne by the Rate-payers of the proposed No. 2 District, will not exceed 8¹/₄ in the pound, assuming, that no aid would be derived from sources, other than the poor rates.

The Board of Guardians is however pleased to perceive from paragraph 18. of the Commissioners Report for the current year, that a sum of £59,000, is included in the Civil Service estimates for year 1867-68. for the purpose of defraying part of the expense of Medical Salaries and Medical and Surgical appliances in the Irish Workhouses and Dispensaries, and should this grant be allocated, according to the recommendations of the Poor Law Commissioners, the additional location incidental to the formation of No. 2 District would be very trifling.

In reply to the Poor Law Commissioners Letter of the 24th ultimo, it is Resolved. - That the Board observe, with satisfaction, that neither the Poor Law Commissioners, nor their efficient Medical Inspector, Dr. Haighan, have attempted to controvert the first argument adduced, for the necessity of dividing the present Ballinacree Dispensary District, into two Districts, for the Board never advanced as a reason for the formation of the proposed No. 2 District, that the existing arrangements were not such, as to place Medical Relief within reach of the sick from all parts of the District, the Resolution of the Board of the 11th ultimo will not even by implication, bear out that construction, but the Board did point out, that the arrangements as regards the attendance of the Medical Officer at Dispensary Meetings, and the discharge of his duties in certain contingencies, under the Sanitary Acts, would be found to be defective, owing to the remoteness of his residence from Ballinacree, and that these arrangements could be improved upon, by the establishment of a separate Committee of Management at Cappaharduff, the members forming which would be acquainted with the requirements of the people residing in that District, and the Board cannot claim the merit of originality in placing the view of the case before the Poor Law Commissioners, for it emanated from them,

in the first instance, as on reference to their letter of April 15th 1864, the Commissioners recommend that a separate Committee of Management, should be formed at Cappaghduff, provided the services of a non resident Medical Officer could be procured at a moderate salary, and this proposition was a second time urged by the Poor Law Commissioners in their letter of June 1st 1864.

The Board of Guardians are free to admit, that it would be inconvenient to the people residing in the eastern portion of Parlovat, to compel them to attend at Cappaghduff Dispensary, but the change would be an advantage to those residing in the northern and western parts, — at the same time the inconvenience is not greater than what occurs in other Divisions of the Union, for instance Beuiricard, which is more distant from the Dispensary Store of Mollinacut, than Parlovat from Cappaghduff.

That although the number of paupers in the workhouse chargeable to the Electoral Divisions of the proposed N. D. District is few, were it not, that this was, ample accommodation in the workhouse during the present season, the pressure of applications for out door relief from that District would have been so great, as to cause the Board of Guardians to levy very heavy rates on the rate-payers.

It cannot be denied that a large percentage, nearly one third of the entire number of paupers in the workhouse, is chargeable to the Ballinacree Electoral Division, but the great bulk of these paupers, were originally resident in the several Districts, and having been evicted from their holdings, came to reside in —
Ballinacree

Ballinacree, where after a short time they became destitute, and chargeable to Ballinacree Division, The Board of Guardians respectfully refers upon the Poor Law Commissioners, that it is anxious to adhere to an arrangement, under which the over-taxed rate-payers of Ballinacree, Kilmacree, and other Divisions, are made contribute to the maintenance of a Dispensary at Cappaghduff, and so long as such a state of things is suffered to continue, it will be a fruitful source of dissatisfaction, and will not measure improve the working of the Poor Law System in the Union, for the great majority of the Guardians look upon it as a vicious principle, that heavily taxed Electoral Divisions, should be coerced to assist other Divisions in which the taxation is a mere trifle,

The Board of Guardians of Ballinacree Union, have always evinced an anxious desire to co-operate with the Poor Law Commissioners in any matter calculated to benefit the Poor, and have invariably paid due deference to the Commissioners views, and the Board now trusts that the Commissioners will be pleased on re-consideration of the subject, to accede to its almost unanimous request, by dividing the District into two Districts,

The Memorial of the Mullinow Board of Guardians, to His Excellency the most Noble, the Marquis of Abercorn Lord Lieutenant and General Governor of Ireland.

Respectfully sheweth, That the Poor Law Union of Mullinow, comprises 18 Electoral Divisions,

That, previous to June 1864, the Mullinow Medical Dispensary District, was composed of 6 Electoral Divisions, viz Mullinow, Kilmacne, Keale, Cappaghdruff, and Ballymore, with the two other Electoral Divisions of Kallenchalla, and Greenbrow, subsequently added, to form two Dispensary Districts,

That, the latter 5 Electoral Divisions, form the western, while the three former form the eastern part of the District, which forms the subject of this Memorial.

That an application was made in April 1864 to the Poor Law Commissioners, proposing to be signed, by a large number of the Rate-payers of the 5 western Divisions, praying for a separate Dispensary District with a Dispensary and resident Doctor at Cappaghdruff.

That the Commissioners sent the application to the Mullinow Board, requesting the formation of a new Dispensary District, comprising the 5 western Electoral Divisions.

That the Mullinow Board assented to this, providing that the new Dispensary should be self supporting.

That

That the Poor Law Commissioners agreed to this proposition, and in their letter of April 6th 1864 requested the Ballinacree Board to fix the District's salary, and make arrangements to provide a suitable house for a Dispensary.

That the Commissioners delayed action in the matter, being in correspondence with a gentleman who owned large Estates in one of the Western Divisions.

That the Ballinacree Board, was surprised by a sealed Order on 29th June 1864, disavowing altogether their own previous arrangements, and the suggestion of the Ballinacree Board, as the sealed Order created a new Dispensary District, including the 4 Electoral Divisions of Cappaduff, Ballinacree, Dallymore and Ducaulrim, but decreeing that the other 11 Electoral Divisions of Ballinacree Kilmaine, should and should contribute to the cost of the new Dispensary District in addition to their own.

That the Ballinacree Board, feeling the injustice of perpetuating a vicious principle, which imposed on 4 Electoral Divisions the onus of supplying another Dispensary, and District in addition to their own, summoned a special Board Meeting on July 11th last, for the consideration of the question. A resolution, requesting the Commissioners to rescind their sealed Order of June 29th 1864 was adopted by a Board of 15 Guardians with 2 dissentients, but the Commissioners refused to comply with the prayer of the resolution.

That another special Board was convened on August 15th last to consider the Commissioners reply when a Board of 18 Guardians with only 3 dissentients sent a remonstrance to the Commissioners against their decision, the

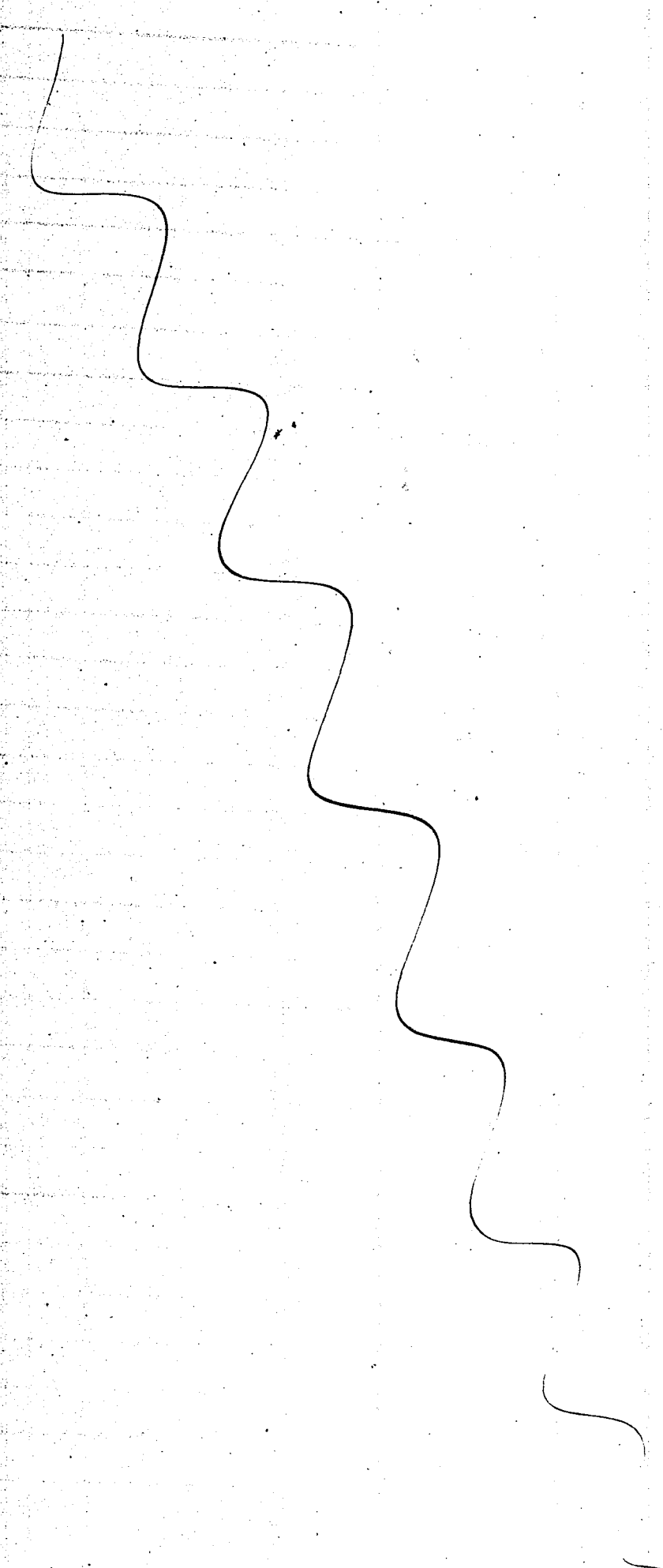

Letter from Commissioners of Valuation, dated 21st October 1867. regarding the Clerk to forward to the Valuation Office, the Valuation Lists relating to the Electoral Divisions of Cornacree, Ballinacree, Hollymount, Male, Newbrook, St. Anne's, Roslee, Bevercand, and Parboyal, in order that the valuation of the lands improved by Drainage may be restored to its original amount, and at the same time returning his thanks to the Board of Guardians for the terms in which their Resolution is conveyed.

Resolved, That this Board beg to tender its thanks to the Commissioners of Valuation for his prompt and courteous attention to its request, — the Board trusts that he will give instructions to have the reduced valuation carried out in the Lists as soon as practicable, and to return the Lists when completed to the Clerk of the Union without delay.

Seconded by Francis Brown Esq, and unanimously Resolved.

That the attention of the Commissioners of Education be requested to an observation made in their Inspector's Report of the first instant

instant, viz:- that the schoolmaster should have notified his leave of absence to the Inspector.
 The Board of Guardians do not conceive that it was the schoolmaster's duty to have done so. He obtained leave of absence from the Board in the usual manner, and they are not aware that he was bound to notify same to the Officer in question.

Read Letter from D. E. Blakel Esq. Solicitor - dated 22^d October 1867, stating that he considered that on every principle of fair play he was entitled to the last professional business given to Mr. Griffin, and requesting the Board's attention to a Resolution passed in 1847 unanimously - appointing him to the office of Solicitor to the Board, and at the same time expressing a hope that the Board would now concur at the determination to entrust to him in future the entire of the legal business of the Union.

That in giving a case to Mr. Griffin on last Board-day the Board acted under an arrangement which provided that Mr. Blakel and Mr. Griffin should alternately get any business that would arise, and in doing so could not mean any disrespect to Mr. Blakel, whose professional duties were always satisfactorily discharged towards the Board.

Referring to the Poor Law Commission's Letter of the 9th instant, N^o. 25. 177/1867. it is Resolved. That they be informed that the Commission of Valuation has stated his intention of returning to its original amount the Valuation of the lands improved by Drainage, the object thereof, of an appeal to Quaint's Sessions could only be to reduce the amount of the Rate made on the increased Valuation, and the Board of Guardians is of opinion that this object can be attained in the following way:-

As there are no areas of Rates carried forward into the new Rate Books, the Column for Areas in the Collecting Warrants is of course blank, the Board of Guardians propose to enter in red ink in this Column the amount of the reduced rating, and instruct the Collectors to collect it from the Rate-payers, - the Board also propose to declare the difference between the rating as it stands in the Rate Books, and the reduced rating as uncollectable.

The Board requests the attention of the Poor Law Commission to this mode of dealing with the question, as the remedy by appeal to
