We have this day visited the House
for the purpose of Stock-taking
and found the different Wards
Dormitories and Hospital Clean
and in good order. The bed-
clothes in use seem to be
pretty good; excepting in some
instances, the blankets are nearly
worn out and have not therefore
the

The warmth necessary for the winter. We recommend that the oldest of the blankets in use be replaced by new ones, and the old ones taken up for summer use.

We also recommend that the stretchers in the infirm wards be improved by adding to one side a rail and also a board between the head of the inmate and the wall. We recommend that the ~~Stretchers~~ Hospital Nurses' room be supplied with two chairs at a cost of about four shillings each, a cheap set of fire iron and that the floor of her room be repaired. We saw the change Dr. Makou suggested in his Hospital Surgery and we consider the alteration desirable, having regard to the increasing cost of medicine and the necessity of storing some descriptions of medicines properly. We are of opinion a large well made press should be got: as proper storing will probably be a saving.

We recommend the mended clothes should be kept in store, until required for use, and removed from the Tailors Shop.

We have checked the Stock under their different headings and found them correct, excepting a

a deficiency of 144 yards Shrouding.

The Guardians approve of the foregoing and it was adopted with the exception of that portion of it which recommends that the stretchers in infirm wards be improved. We consider that one bed in each ward so improved would be sufficient.
