

He also points out that two wards in the hospital are rather dark and badly ventilated, the windows being very small and high up in the walls; he considers that if the Guardians would break two fair sized windows or even one in each of these wards the ventilation would be greatly improved and the wards rendered much more cheerful. The Board trust that these matters will receive the consideration and attention of the Guardians at an early date.

Ordered: That the Clerk inquire as to the probable cost of the earth closets, and that the master obtain an estimate of the cost of breaking out the windows in the two hospital wards, and find out the cost of the tin basins for the boys' and girls' lavatories.

I submit that, if this plan be allowed to be carried out, these ponds will soon become cesspools from the accumulation of dung and urine in them, and will be a permanent and constant source of polluting the river; while the Railway fence will prevent both people and cattle from having access to the pure water of the river for the distance of a mile, that is from the bridge of Cregduff to the Kilmaine bridge. I recommend that a suitable number of pumps be erected on the lands adjoining the South side of the Railway, and that their suction tubes pass at right angles to and under the Railway into the river.

Or if the Railway Company prefer to divert a part of the Stream let the Channel of the diverted Stream run immediately outside the Railway boundary, and to the South of it
