

## HISTORIC SITES

Royal Seats, scenes of historic events—battles, mass meetings, historic festivals, &c. Location.  
Landowner. Historical or traditional notes.

"The French Invasion" and the "Rebels of Castlebar". One of the most important dates in Irish history. [Synopsis—> August 22nd 1798 general Humbert landed at Killcummin near Killala with 1000 men and 3 small field guns and bearing 3000 muskets and 1000 French uniforms for the Irish who were to join with the invaders. Keeling—an Irishman who went into French service in 1797, and Matthew Tone, brother to Wolfe Tone, landed with Humbert. Killala taken on that day, and Ballina the day following by General Sanguin. On Aug. 25th R. Humbert came to Ballina where hundreds of Irish joined his ranks including General George Blake, Austin Smalley of Buncrana, Captain James O'Dowd of Benicorran etc. Colonel James McDonnell also joined.—R.

## HISTORIC HOUSES; BURIAL PLACES [Cont'd on page 6]

(a) Birth places or one-time residences of distinguished Irishmen or other personalities. Location and description. Present owner or occupant. (b) Burial places of distinguished personalities.

(a) "Thomastown" the poetess. Born in Rathbawn in the house now occupied by Mrs. Connelly. A simple two-storey red-tiled house bearing a plaque with the words "Bhí an tseac seo do nugraí Shéibhín Ógáin an tseac — 'Tomássín' — baircfeadh an teangeolaí 1829–1908". Oliver Goldsmith's best known work is her poetic collection "Wild Flowers from the Wayside". Most stirring verses for "the nation". A poem of feeling is "My Necc" — a lament for Thomas Davis. "Thomastown" named Rev. H. H. Connelly — migrated to Australia and died there. Rev. Dr. Brown is buried Castlebar.

(b) The Brennan brothers — Louis and Michael, born in the house now Connelly & Co., Main St., Castlebar. Their father is buried in the Castlebar Cemetery — a rough Irish inscription on his tombstone. Louis Brennan, who died at the close of the Great War years, is famed as the inventor of the gyroscope (memorial) and for his torpedo experiments. He left Ireland for Australia when young. Michael Brennan, artist, who left Ireland when young to study painting in Italy. Died in Algiers somewhere about 1870's at the age of 30. Even then he had gained considerable fame as a painter.

(a) Major General Geo. Smalley whose memorial is erected just inside First Church walls in Ellison St., Castlebar. Born in Rothee now vacant (owner - Mr. O'Dwyer) directly across Rothee street.

His inscription on the memorial reads:

To the memory of Major Gen. George Smalley C.B. who expired in London on the 16th May 1843 in his 63rd year of his age and whose mortal remains repose in the family burying place at Tuamish Abbey. This statue is erected by a numerous circle of his naval, military and civil friends amongst whom are the members of the ancient and most benevolent order of the Friendly Brothers of St. Patrick, as a small tribute of their esteem and affection. He served his country in Egypt, North America, West Indies, the Mediterranean etc. etc. and he commanded the 2nd Battalion of the 44th Regt. at Waterloo where he was twice wounded and subsequently for many years commanded the 88th Regt. as Lieutenant Ranger. He was a good and pious Christian, a zealous and excellent soldier and a sincere and true friend.

The two front pillars flanking the monument bears heraldic symbols interlaced with motto "Terra Marique Patens" and "Qui separabit?" Also the places and dates of general Smalley's service — "Egypt 13th Regt. 12 April 1801" — "North America - West Indies 101 Regt." — "Waterloo 44th Regt. 15-16-17-18 June 1815" — "Mediterranean 88 Regt."

(a) Sir Martin Archer Shee - famous portrait painter, President of the Royal Irish Academy, born in Castlebar (house not known) [KINDLY CHECK DATES OF BIRTH AND DEATH]

(a) Charles Smalley - The Irish Oregon - around whom Charles Lewis wrote his famous novel - born in Spencer Park House which stands in own grounds between Spencer St. and Castlebar station. (to right of road).

(a) The late Dr. Gilmentin, Archibishop of Tuam, born in Kinshane in the cottage now owned by Mr. T. Moran. Went to school in Cork and Liverpool.

(a) Sir Melchior O'Kelly, last Chief Crown Solicitor for Ireland, buried at Maraghado, Castlebar. (b) Buried in Castlebar Cemetery. Died March 25th 1916.

William Brett of Derritt's Yerrell - house now occupied by his daughter Miss Rose Brett. Born in Belliniste. Died in Castlebar 1944. Painter. An expert on church painting and decoration his art is to be found in almost exclusively in the Connacht churches. A noted authority on Biblical painting. He also painted scenes for many sacred edifices throughout the country besides framed works.

Rev. Fr. J. Dissalley P.P. of Long and the Vale, born in Main St. (Mrs. P. J. Curran's), Castlebar. This was a man who, at the time of the land agitation atough West House, gave to the journalist Redpath the answer "We'll bayonet him" and added a new word to the English language.

Archbishop John McHale of Tuam (1791-1881) whom Daniel O'Connell called "the lion of the field of judges" obtained his early education in Castlebar where he spent two years of classical study under a teacher called Patrick Staunton.

Hanover House - main st., Castlebar: Headquarters of General Hanover and his officers in 1798.

Blackfort castle ruins near Castlebar: Said to have been a residence of the Bentee family who were descendants of the Mac Long, and who held the title of Viscount Mayo. One of the Bentee daughters of Blackfort castle married a man called Gunning of Kilkenny. Their daughters were the "beautiful misses Gunning" who created a sensation in the London Society of their time.

George Robert Fitzgerald of Tullagh. Noted duellist. Called "the first taker". According to Dallan - Archdeacon of Tuam (page 217): He married, mid-18th century, Lady Mary Harvey daughter of the Earl of Rosse. -- Ran away with a Miss Connelly of Killane and brought her to Tullagh where she died. Caught and executed at Castlebar 1780 for the murder of Kendall McDowell, a lawyer. Hanged outside the old jail - now bank of Ireland. He broke the ropes twice; most famous that ever happened between with "Hannibal Dick".

James Daly of Castlebar whose name was linked with Deirdre's in the Cork League movement - prop. of Connaught Telegraph at the time and who used his paper to further the League's aims. Arrested in Castlebar Nov. 18th 1819 and conveyed to Sligo gaol but released soon after. A prominent Cork League.

#### LIVING PERSONALITIES

Margaret Bourke: Soprano, renowned opera singer, b. 1889. Her house was visited in by the Rev. Dr. Mull, Castlebar obtained her early education in Castlebar - then to Charles St., Dublin. Notable voice. Went to Wales for training. Became famous Rev. Sang in all the principal opera houses now especially in U.S.A. [Soprano? Clerk please.]

Ervine Dingley author of the (controversial) book "On Another Man's Wound" - born in Castlebar

Michael Cawley R. artist - R.I.A.C., R.P.T.A. of Illian St. Castlebar. [DETAILS AT DUBLIN]

R. J. King artist of Charles St., Castlebar. Especially noted for his commemorative stamp designs. [DETAILS AT DUBLIN - R.I.A.C.? R.H.C.A.?]

ADDENDA: <sup>James</sup> Hardiman, author of the "History of Galway" - founder of new monastery near Ballyfeane, 1st Nov. 1842 - a condition of his granting lands and house to the Franciscans was that a school must be kept here.

"Say no longer" notorious priest turner of the Penal times whose name is a byword in Co. Mayo - said to have been born in the village of Ballyfeane.

Methodist Church, Castlebar: Has a plaque saying that "John Wesley A.M. laid the first stone May 21st 1795." Wesley (1703-1791) was Methodist founder born at Epworth - England.
