THE MINUTE BOOK, in which shall be entered the statistical information laid before the Board of Guardians relating to the inmates of the Workhouse, the collection of the Rates, and the state of the Finances of the Union; Minutes of all Orders received from the Commissioners for administering the Laws for Relief of the Poor in Ireland, and of all Letters received from the Commissioners or other parties relating to the business of the Union, and of all directions given by the Board of Guardians thereon; Minutes of the production and examination of the Register, and all other Books and Accounts which are required to be periodically produced, examined, and signed; Minutes of the Reports of the Visiting and Finance Committees, and of the Clerk, the Master, and other Officers of the Workhouse, and of all directions given by the Board thereon; Minutes of all monies received and paid, all orders and checks given, all accounts examined and allowed, and all salaries ordered to be paid; a statement of the number of cases of provisional relief, and of applications for relief, brought before the Board and considered and decided on by them; as well as all other business, proceedings, and transactions of the Board of Guardians, at any of their Meetings.

In the Male Department, the course is suited to the age and requirements of the pupils; the proficiency in every respect good, a very small proportion of the boys is in the first class, and in every class the subjects of the programme are taught with care, Penmanship is very carefully taught in this school; every boy in the school (with three exceptions) writes on paper. The only marked defect in the proficiency of the pupils is in the Grammar of the First and Second Classes,

In the Female Department, the course is more limited than in the Male Department, but the children are much younger, about one half of the girls attending at present being under seven years of age, and therefore better suited for the training in an Infant School, - The proficiency on the whole is pretty good; the main defect being in the subject of Catechism, Penmanship is well taught, a few of the older girls being able to write a very neat and stylish hand. A disproportionate number of the pupils in the Female Department appear in the first class, but this is accounted for, partially, by the large number of infants at present in the girls school.

A Report from the Acting Master was read of which the following is a copy:-

Ballinacree Workhouse
25th Oct. 1866

Gentlemen,

I beg to report, that about 3 o'clock AM on the morning of Tuesday the 19th Oct, some person still unknown, effected an entrance into the workhouse premises

premises by scaling the boundary wall, and proceeded fast to the Register Office, [the window of which through some inadvertence was not properly secured by me on the previous night] and threw down the stone erect in that Apartment, but fortunately, without doing it the slightest injury.

The person then recast to the Fever Hospital, and entered one of the lower wards through the upper part of the window, — he stole from under the head of Nancy Hoban, a pauper nurse in charge of the ward, a purse containing 11/6 and departed through a window opposite to that which he entered, — Nancy Hoban was asleep at the time, and did not notice his appearance in the ward, but a convalescent patient named Bridget Kelly, observed him entering and leaving. — I questioned Nancy Hoban, as to how she came to be possessed of so much money, and was informed by her that she received the greater portion of it from paying patients who were in the Fever Hospital last Summer.

The Bonds and other securities in force were laid before the Guardians by the Clerk, together with his Report thereon, as follows: (this on the second Meeting after the Annual Election in every year.)

after leaving the Hospital, the same individual came to the Main Building, and having climbed up the down pipe, he entered one of the Dormitories occupied by the school-children, which adjoins the Matron's sleeping Apartment, and was seen by two of the School-children (who happened to be awake at the time) to search the Closets of the occupants of the Dormitory, with a view (as it appeared to the children) of looking for Money in the pockets of the Clothes, but not succeeding in the object of his search, he left the Ward, — the children were so much afraid that they did not make any alarm.

From all I can learn, suspicion seems to point to one of the Boys whom you refused relief on Thursday last, as being the party guilty of the Acts detailed by me, and from his statements to the Relieving Officer after your refusal, there seems to be good grounds for entertaining the suspicion.

Effectual steps are being taken to secure the windows of the Main Building, so as to prevent the possibility of a person entering the Dormitories by climbing the down pipes.

On Tuesday last, a poor woman named Mary Sweeney, aged 60 years, who has been for a considerable time labouring under "Chronic disease of the Heart" died very suddenly in the Infirmary ward, and an Inquest having been held on her remains by James R. Mallett Esq, one of the Coroners for the County, on Yesterday, a verdict was returned by the Jury, of which the following is a copy:—

" We find that Mary Sweeney died at the Workhouse Ballinacree, on Tuesday the 23rd October 1866, and from the evidence given by Doctor Roughan, we are of opinion, that deceased died of disease of the heart, we are also

and are also of opinion that the Infirmary ward, is not the proper place for a person labouring under such disease"

"We cannot separate, without expressing our disapprobation of Mr. May, who is acting at present as Clerk and Master in refusing to give the use of a suitable room to hold our investigation"

Advised to offer the following remarks in reference to the Verdict

1st That the deceased Mary Sweeney, was placed in the Infirmary ward by the Medical Officer, who considered it the proper place for her,

2^d That I offered the use of the Boys' School Room, in which there was a comfortable fire, with every other requisite convenience, as a suitable apartment for holding the investigation, — I may add that though the Carriers I employed did not think the School Room suitable, yet, Gentlemen of the highest position in Society, and Proprietaries of the Church, have often been for hours in that Room examining the literary progress of the School children,

I also offered the use of any other apartment in the Workhouse with the exception of the Board Room and Report Office, — The former, I did not think it was authorized to offer without the express direction of the Board of Guardians, and the latter, without the authority of the Registrar General.
