Resolved, subject to the approval of the Local Government Board, that a sum of six pounds, be expended out of the Union Rates for the purpose of assisting to defray the expenses of the Emigration to America of two children of the Workhouse named Margaret Whitchell, aged 45 years, and her daughter Sarah Whitchell, aged 14 years, chargeable to the Union at large.

Resolved, that the children be discharged from the Workhouse named Margaret Whitchell, who are about leaving the Workhouse with their uncle, and that such of the Workhouse children as are given them and leaving.

The Board of Guardians having had under its consideration the Report made into by Mr. Alfred Bliffard, his opinion of the Mullinagh Workhouse, it was

Resolved, that the sum which would be payable to Mr. Bliffard on 25th March next, had he performed his contract according to specification, namely:— Seven pounds, five shillings, be declared forfeited; that the Board does not however consider that it would be advisable to institute legal proceedings against Mr. Bliffard, for recovery of the difference between that sum, and the actual amount, which has been paid to Mr. Bliffard for executing repairs of Workhouse premises.

Resolved, that the Workhouse at Mullinagh be treated as a Workhouse, and be advertised to be included in the Mullinagh Union, and all the necessary arrangements, for the purpose of the following:— Workhouse supplies, repairs, alterations, &c. for Workhouse and Premises — Notices to be conveyed at the Meeting of the Board of Guardians to be held on Thursday 15th of February.

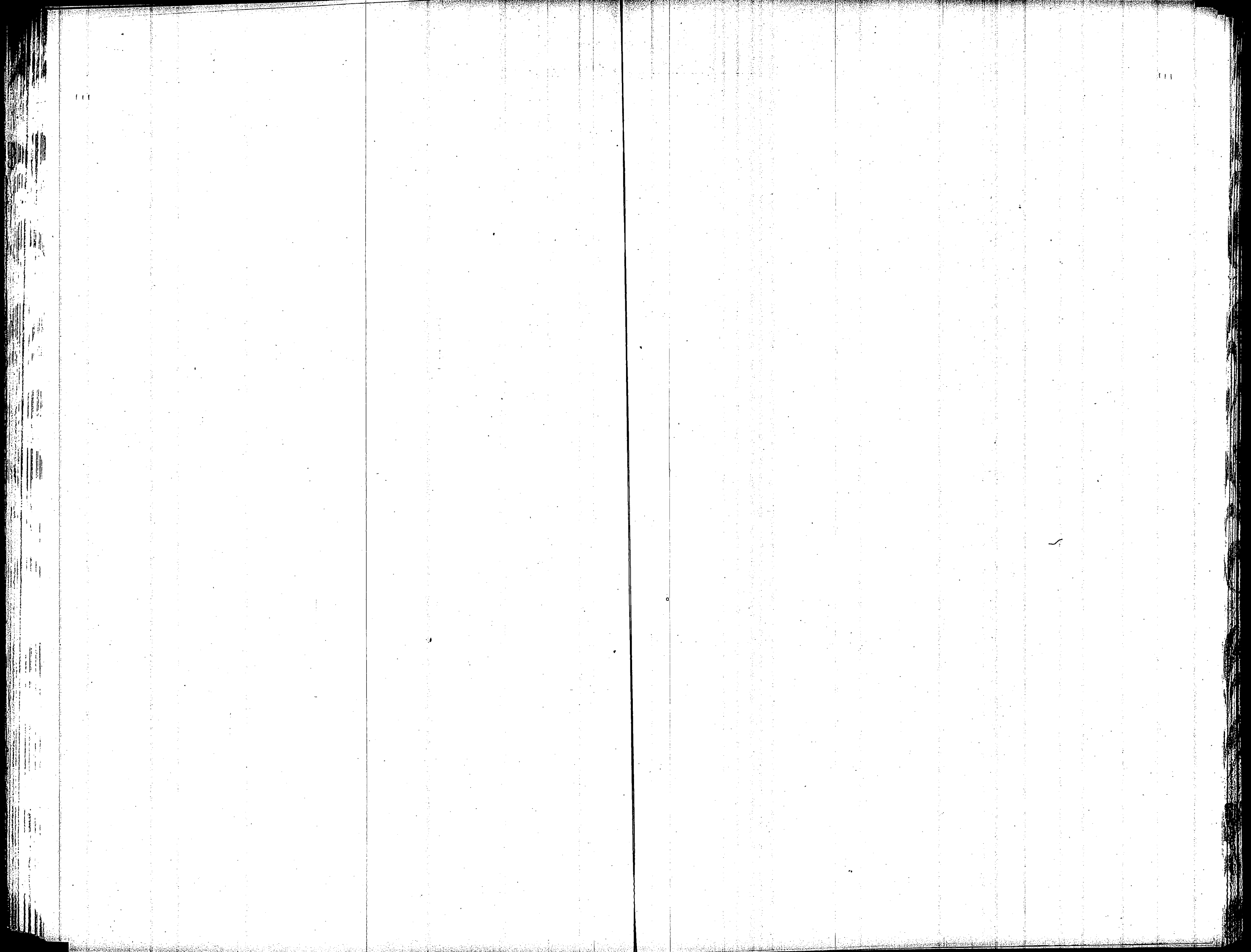
