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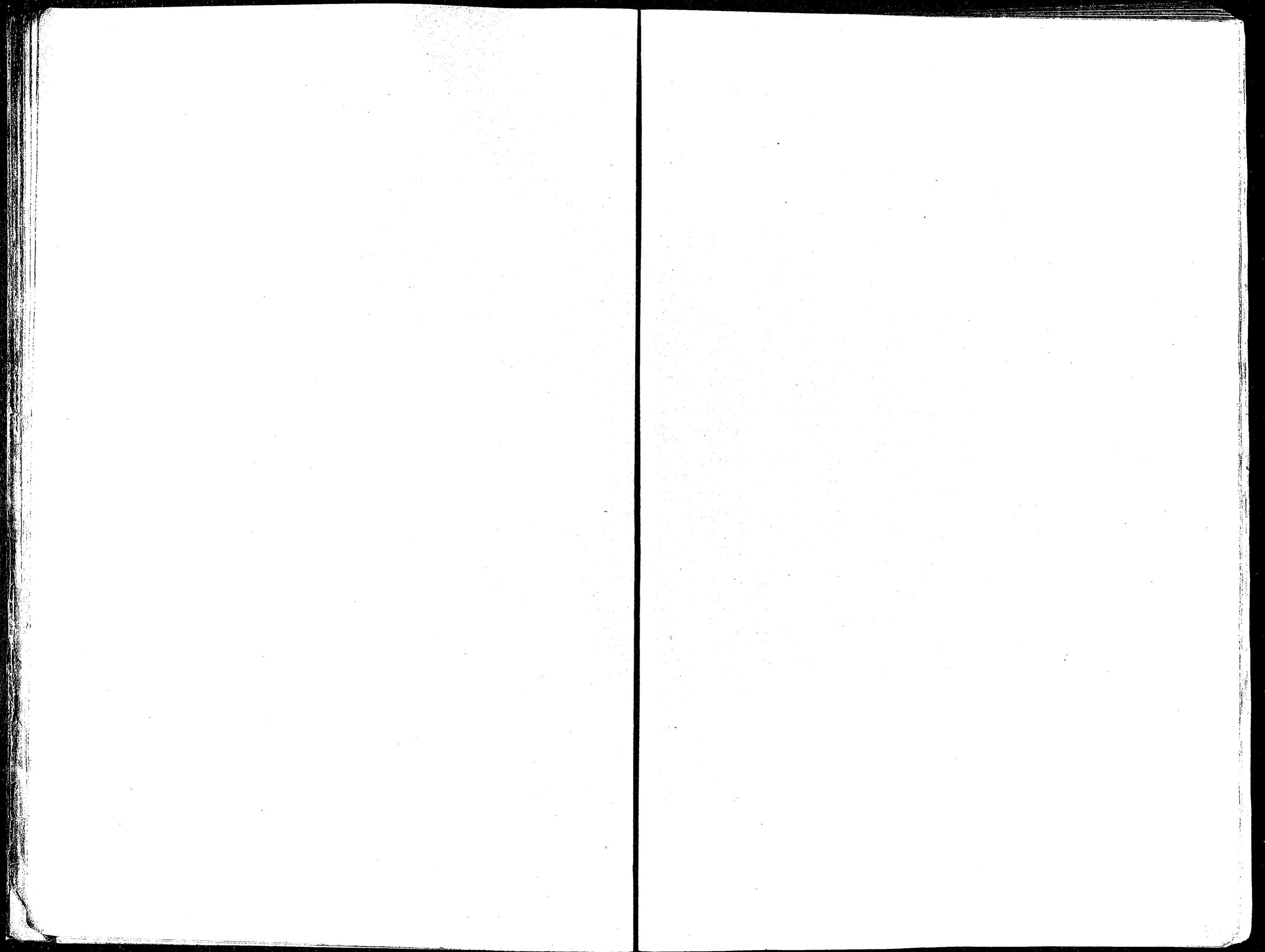

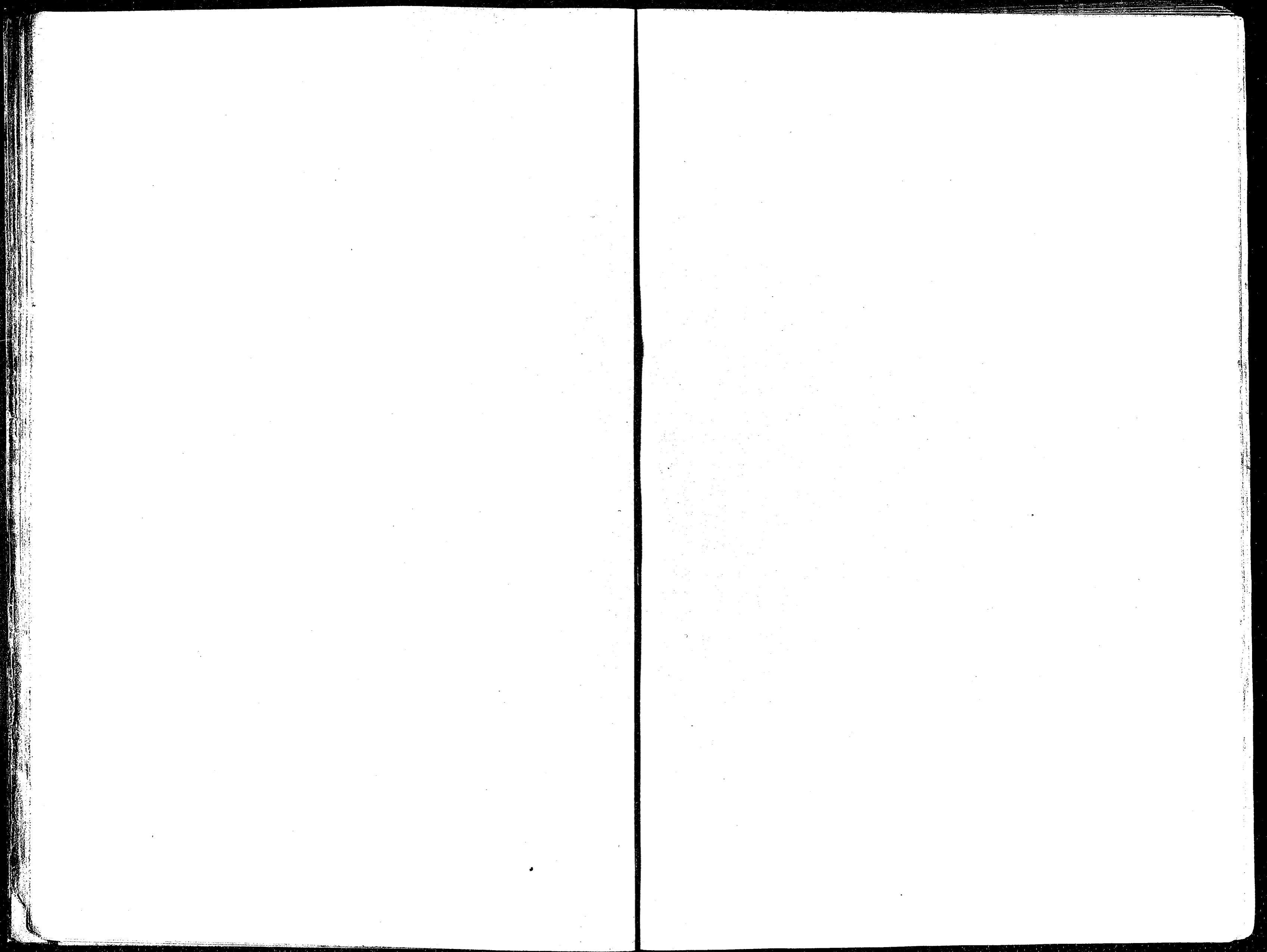

COPY of MINUTES of Proceedings of the Board of Guardians, at a Meeting held on 17th day the 26th day of April 1850

The Minutes of last Meeting were read and Signed.
 Notices of Marriage between the parties hereunder named having been received from the District Registrar by the Clerk, were duly read at the Board this day in accordance with the 15th section of the 7 & 8 Vic. c. 81.

The Workhouse Register was produced, examined, and authenticated, from No. _____ to No. _____, both inclusive, by the signature of the Chairman, and countersignature of the Clerk.

The Out-door Relief Register was produced, examined, and authenticated from No. 1015 to No. 1045, inclusive, by the signature of the Chairman and countersignature of the Clerk. The Clerk's Report on the execution of Orders previously made by the Board was read, to the following effect:

The Ledger was produced by the Clerk, posted up to the last day of Meeting, with the proper Debits and Credits, as ordered on that day. The Treasurer's Book of Receipts and Payments was produced, by which it appeared that there had been received during the week, - £ 245 . 11 . 5 Paid during the week, - £ 476 . 3 . 7 And that the Balance on the Account in favor of the Guardians was - £ 2320 . 5 . 2 The Book was signed by the Chairman. The Weekly balance-sheets of the several Collectors were laid before the Board, their accuracy having been first ascertained and authenticated by the Clerk. The lodgments made of Rates collected in the several Electoral Divisions appear to have been as follows:-

The Clerk's Account of petty Disbursements made by him since last Meeting, amounting to £ 110 . 10 . 11 was produced and passed. The following Books were exhibited by the Clerk, he having first ascertained the accuracy of the entries made therein by the Master of the Workhouse, and authenticated the same by his signature:

By which it appeared that the Cost of Provisions and Necessaries received during the week, was £ 173 . 15 . 1 d.

Summary table of costs: Debit Provision Account, and Credit Invoice Account. The Cost of Provisions and Necessaries consumed was 116 . 11 . 3. Aided the general average Cost of an Inmate for the week was 104. Average cost in Infirmary, 13. Average cost in Fever Hospital, 15.4.

Circular from Poor Law Commissioners N^o 12967 dated 19 April regarding a Balance Return.

Letter from same N^o 21,927 dated 20 April 1857 expressing questions for answers to be signed by person who may be appointed a Master in rooms of a Mr. Murphy.

Letter from same N^o 18,681/50 dated 20 April expressing objection of the appointment of Ellen Werns as Assistant Schoolmistress.

Letter from same N^o 21,451/50 dated 23 April relating to the claims of the Hollymount Constabulary for their services and the distribution and collection of Noting Papers in October last.

Resolved that the amount of the claim by the Constabulary should be discharged till the Board cannot refrain from expressing their opinion, that the Constabulary in the Union whose other duties are comparatively light and who are well paid by the Government should not be remunerated for their service from the funds of an impoverished Union.

Letter from same N^o 22,201/50 dated 23 April requesting that the accounts to 23 Feb. should be forthwith Balance cast.

Letter from Central Board of Health N^o 3107/50 dated 24 April, relative to Temporary Street Sweeping Returns.

Letter from Poor Law Commissioners N^o 19,734/50 dated 25 April expressing the Comrs. sanction of the appointment of a Station to the Ballinacole Dispensary. Accordingly to be done at the salary proposed and forwarding queries to be answered by person who may be appointed as such.

Letter from same N^o 19,734/50 dated 25 April stating that the Comrs. are of opinion that the Board of Guardians are not to be held responsible in declining to interfere with regard to the labours of the Chaplain in the Resolution of the Board on the 5th Inst. also stating that the conduct of Mr. Ralph the Apothecary and Mr. Divers the Nurse has been very irregular, and recommending that if the facts of the case be as represented to the Commissioners, Mr. Ralph be warned to confine himself in future, strictly to the discharge of his medical duties, and that Mr. Divers be removed from her situation, also stating that the Chaplains Book should not be made the means of carrying on communications, between Clergymen officiating in the Workhouse.

Mr. Ralph Apothecary was called before the Board and the Commissioners letter read for him - Mr. Divers is ordered to act as Nurse until Mr. Catherine Mr. Mahow appointed at last Meeting commence her duties.

Resolved that the Master be instructed not to allow any Clergymen except the Chaplain or person officiating as such in the absence of the Recognized Chaplain to write in the Chaplains Book.

Letter from Poor Law Commissioners N^o 22,107 dated 25 April, stating that Mr. Chelan P.D.S. appears to think it probable that the insufficient supply of Milk affords to the sick inmates of the Workhouse, has been productive of ill effects. he also states that the quantity of Linen supplied to the inmates is not sufficient, and requesting the Board of Guardians to pay particular attention to those opinions with a view to their seeing that the Diets prescribed for the inmates are duly adhered to and the wants of the sick provided for.

The cases of provisional relief, and applications for relief were considered and decided on, as set forth in the Application and Report Books.

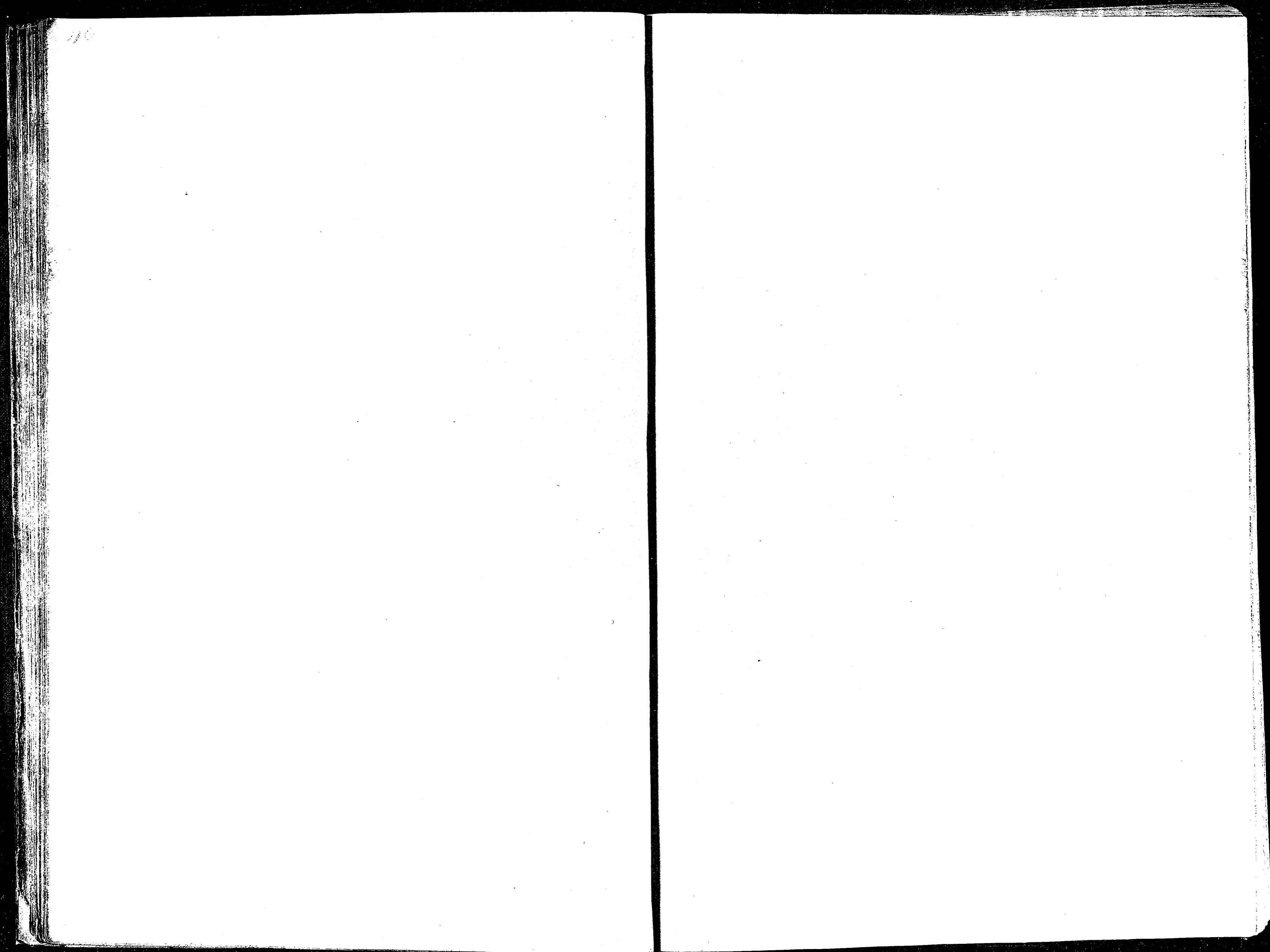

The Board have also had before them Mr Coghlan's explanation in reference to the matter, and it appearing to them by the sworn testimony of Michael Hynds that Mr Coghlan had given Credit to him for a sum of money which he had paid to Pat Mahoney about the same time as that paid by Thomas Brennan, and it appearing that Pat Mahoney was in the habit of receiving Rates for Mr Coghlan,

Resolved that we are of opinion that Mr Coghlan should be held accountable for the amount paid by Brennan to Mahoney viz £1.3.7¹/₂ and that Mr Coghlan be called on to forthwith discharge the amount of the Rates due on the holding of Thomas Brennan.

The Master having reported the inferior quality of the meal delivered by the Contractor and the unreasonable times at which such is delivered. 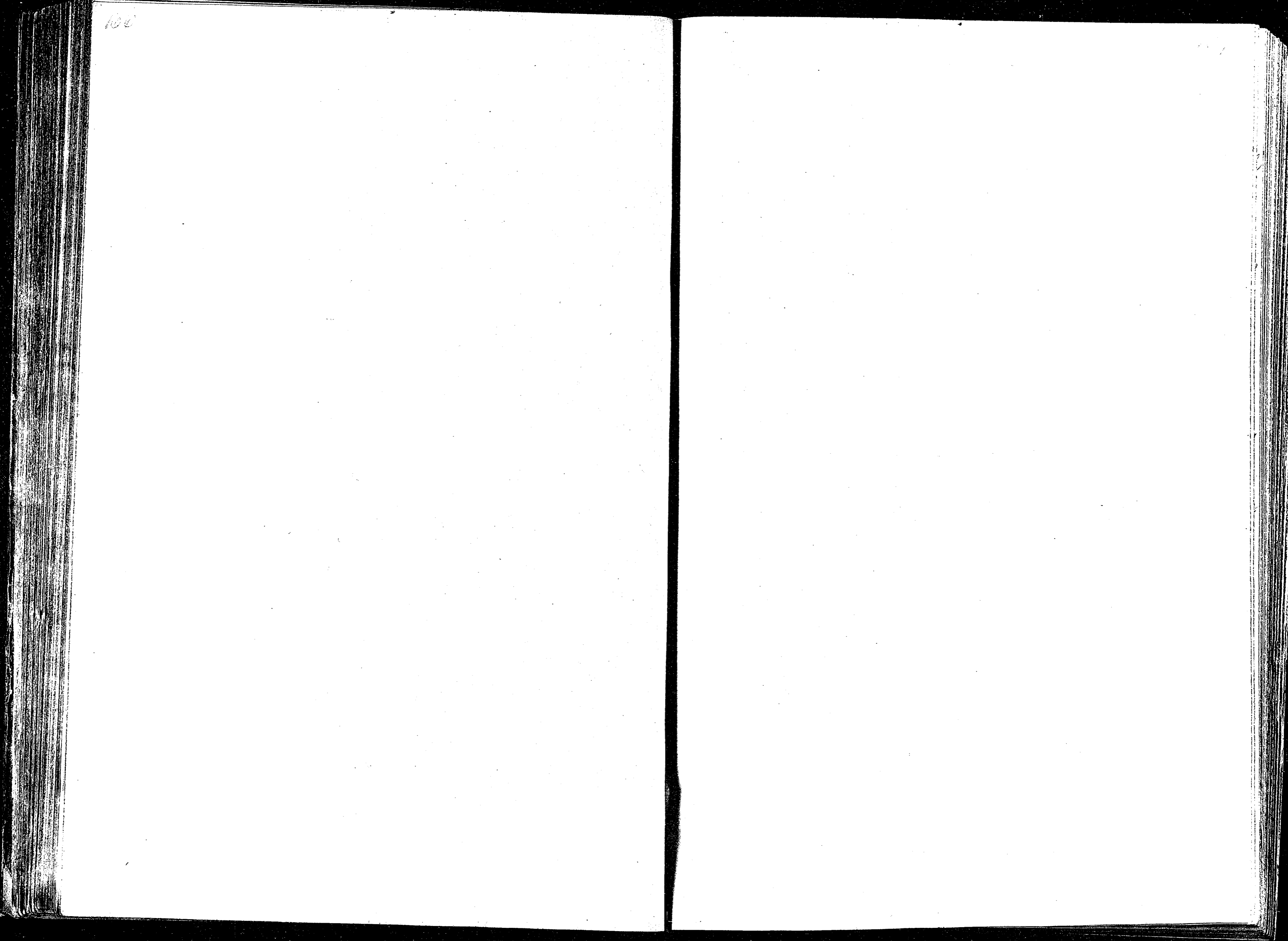

Doctor Roughan's Report

July 16. 1850

Gentlemen, I regret to state that the Mortality in your establishment during the last week has been very large, and I feel it my duty to make some observations on the subject.

The principal cause of the Mortality has been Dysentery occurring in persons of broken down Constitutions and who in many instances have allowed the Disease to proceed unchecked until too late for medical aid, and thus the following persons numbering 15 died within a few days of admission to Hospital, all of whom were in a hopeless state when admitted into Hospital, the average time in Hospital being 3 days.

I would further wish to remark that the number of persons at present under medical treatment is exceedingly large amounting in all to 500. Three Hundred of whom suffer from Dysentery the remaining portion labour under fever of a slight character. I feel that it is necessary for me to state that the Mortality which is caused by Dysentery in a Workhouse is generally 25 per cent. I am glad to state that small Pox seems to have almost disappeared from the establishment, and I have given instruction to prevent the further admission of patients until such time as the Hospital at Ballinrobe shall have been purified by white washing and other means. in conclusion I am happy to say that your Hospitals are in a satisfactory and regular state.
