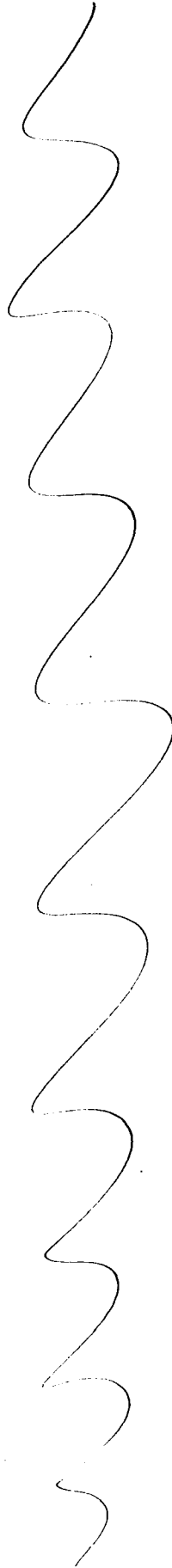

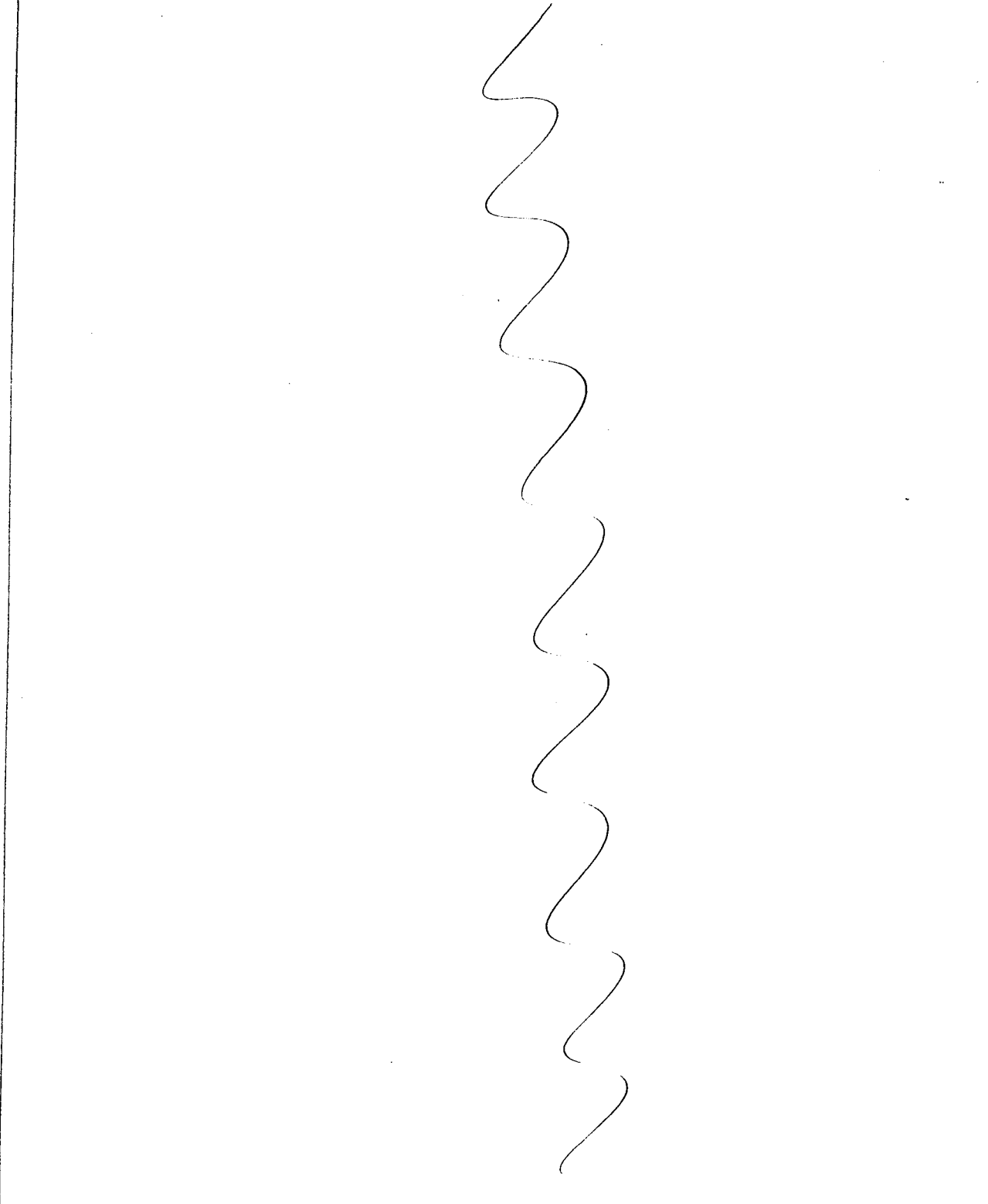

In making the above inquiry I elicited that the deceased either rolled or slid out of her bed during the night, but that she was immediately attended to by one of the inmates named Sally Maughan who states that she found her sitting on the floor near her bed, with the bed clothes - raised her, and that the deceased stated to her that she was not hurt, and said after having fixed in her bed again, that she expected to sleep well during the remainder of the night,

She did not make any complaint, nor did she request the attendance of the Priest or Doctor, she had every convenience near her, in the way of Milk, soap, and other necessaries; and at about 7 or 8 O'Clock in the morning she was found dead in her bed by Anne Joyce and Sally Maughan two inmates of the ward -

Letter from William Beaton West Esq, Clerk to the Guardians of the Westminster Union, dated 22^d Decr 1849 in reference to the irregular removal of Ellen Amey Kelly, and stating that if the Guardians of the Ballinacorney Union are, upon enquiry, satisfied that Ellen Amey Kelly, was born at Clancorney in the Clancorney Union, the Guardians of the Westminster Union are willing to pay the ordinary cost of her removal from the Ballinacorney Union to the Clancorney Union.

That is subsequent to the 23 of February 1850, the Parish of Clancorney, with other Parishes and places were formed into a Poor Law Union called the "Clancorney Union", which is situated in the County of Mayo.

That the Books referred to in the Letter from the Clerk of the Westminster Union do not contain accurate information as regards the Parishes and Poor Law Unions in Ireland; there being no such Poor Law Union as the "Clancorney Union" in the County of Mayo.

Resolved that the Board of Guardians is of opinion that the Poor Law Commissioners should communicate to the Poor Law Commission in England the particulars of the alterations made in the Irish Poor Law Unions in the years 1849 and 1850, which would prevent a recurrence of similar mistakes in future.

In pursuance of Section 511 of Act 1 & 2 Vic cap 54, it was Resolved. - that the Rev. Thomas M. Walker, D.D. be appointed Warden for the year ending 25 March 1850 for that part of the Parish of Ballinacorney situated in the Ballinacorney Electoral Division.

It appearing that the Poor Rate Collector for the Drogheda Electoral Division, is in the habit of issuing Poor Rate Receipts to the Earl of Portlinton, for each item of Rates, paid by his Lordship, as the immediate Lessor of Tenements, valued at and under £10.

It is Resolved that the Board disapprove of such a practice, as the Collector in its opinion should only issue one Receipt for the entire amount paid, endorsing on the back thereof the number in his collecting documents.

The Medical Officer submitted an Estimate of Medicines required for the Workhouse Hospital, - the Estimate was approved of, and an order made directing the Contractor to supply the Medicines so specified therein.
