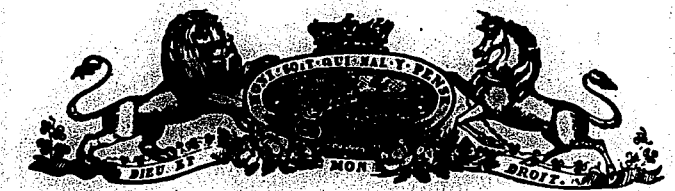

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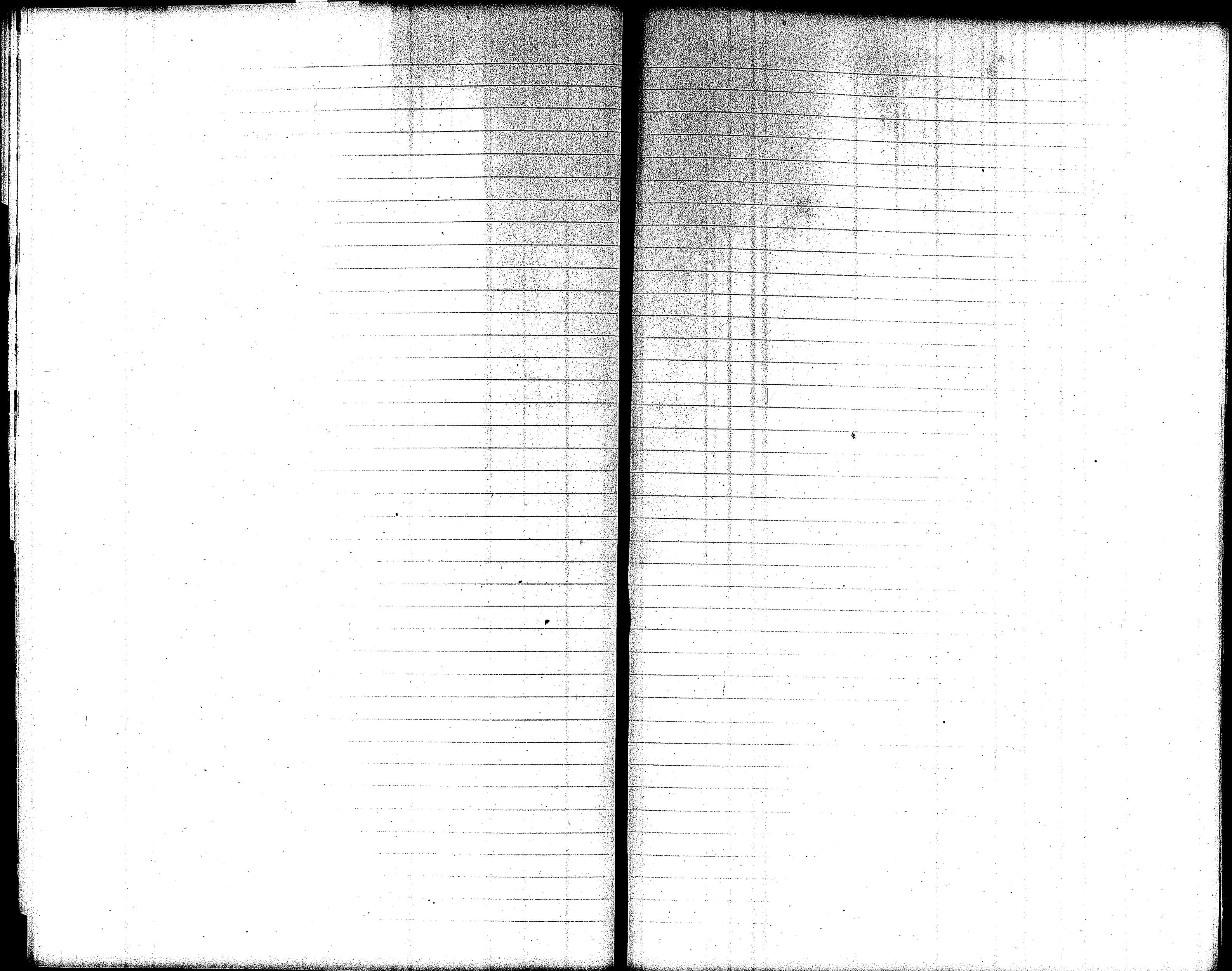

Letter from Local Government Board N^o 2451, 1914 dated 19th November 1914 informing the Board of Guardians that they have received their Inspector D. Bradie's Half Yearly Report relating to the School, in which he states that the entire establishment was in a clean and orderly state, classification and discipline are well maintained, the provisions in store on the day of his inspection were of good quality, the supply of Bedding and Clothing was good and sufficient, and the various buildings were in a good state of repair.

D. Bradie further states that the School children have made satisfactory progress in Literacy attainments, they were clean in their persons and were comfortably and neatly clothed.

P. also states that the Houses and premises in which the children are being kept appear to be clean and free from nuisance injurious to health, and further states that Mr. Kelly, Sub-Sanitary Officer has, under his directions taken steps to prevent the communication of the contagion to other parties.
