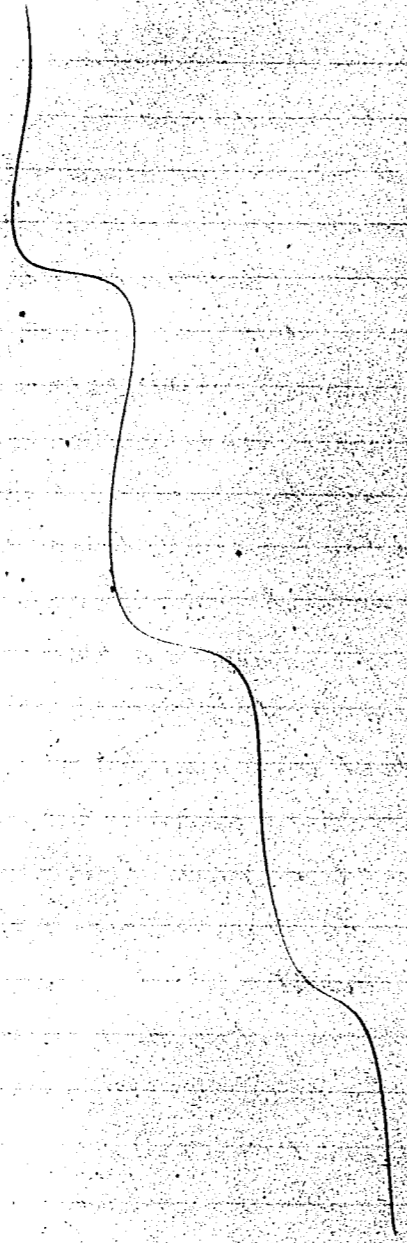

H. Maguire Esq. Just. Assize of Constatulauy at Ballinacole, with view to his making the necessary application to the Coroner to hold the Inquest.



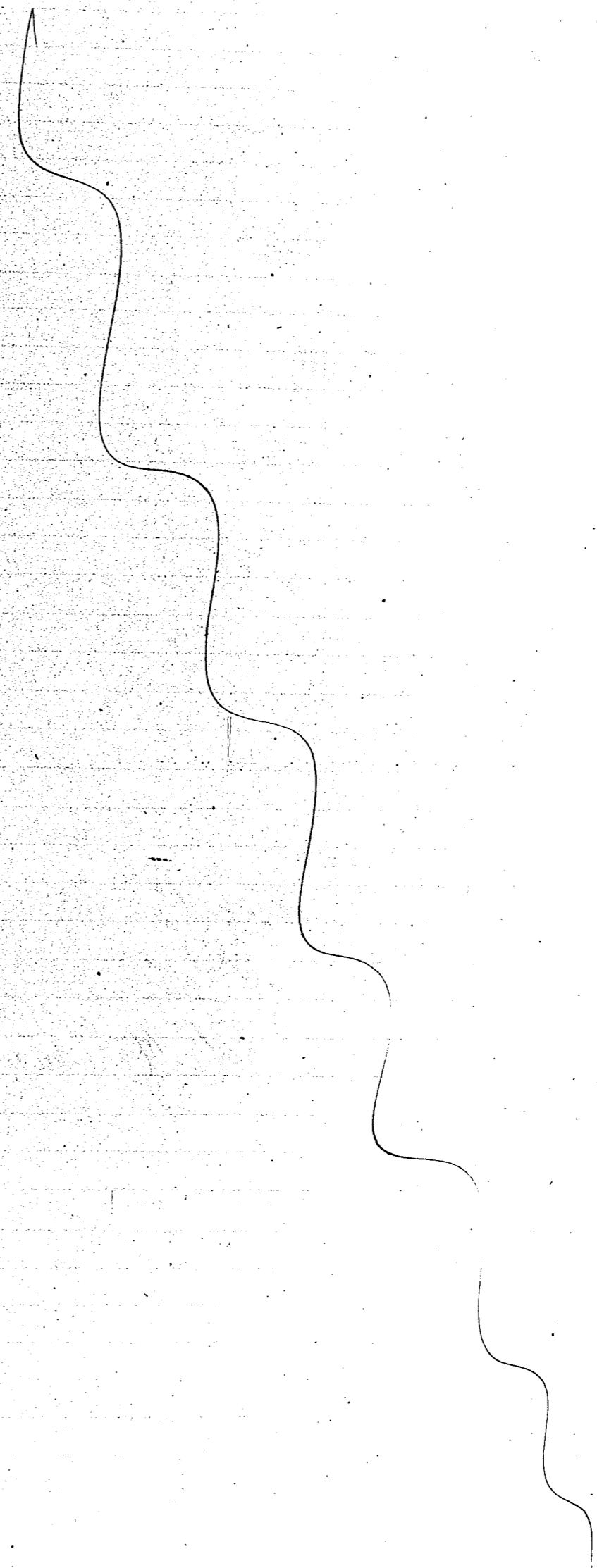
