Kiltane Abbey.

About three miles west of Banger, to the left of the read leading to Geesala, is the eld disused graveyard of Kiltane, in which are the ruins of the eld Abbey named Cill tSeadna, new Kiltane. The history of this rule seems clouded in obscurity but it is believed to be a seventh century foundation. I understand that this is the Kiltane which, with Cill Orclana and Cill Fanna, was erected in one night. As usual with most of the old graveyards in this part of Mayo, it is impossible to properly inspect any old remains because of the impenetrable tangle of tall nettles and undergrowth but so far as I could judge, the building was about thirty feet long or upwards of forty feet and about eighteen feet wide. The reef of course, has disappeared but the east gable and both side walls are almost intact. The latter are about fourteen feet high and the west gable has disappeared completely. one high, slit-like window in the standing gable and a smaller one on the south walk. The burial ground and ruin are in the care of the Board of Health, the caretaker being Mr Michael MacAndrew, Kiltane.
