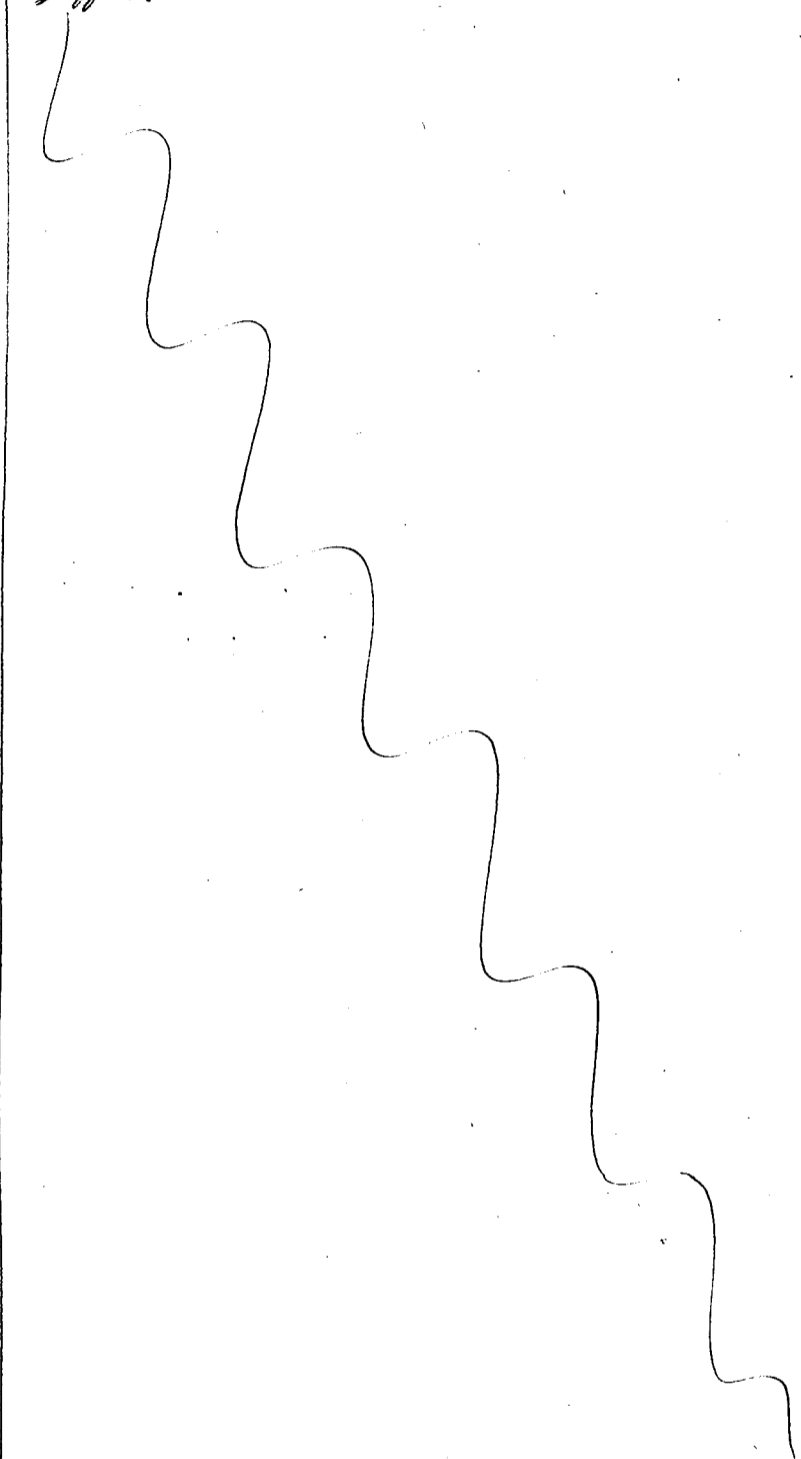
PRESENT: In the Chair, Colonel Charles Knox

Gentlemen,

I beg to state that since my return from leave of absence on the 30th ultimo, I have used every precaution to prevent against the future entrance

to the Workhouse, by three persons upon whom suspicious rests, for having done so on a recent occasion, as detected in Mr. May's report on the day week.

On Tuesday night I ascertained that three boys were lurking about the Entrance gate, and the Porter and myself remained up until 2 o'clock AM, to watch their movements, about 12 o'clock we proceeded to search an unoccupied House of Mr. Stokes, situated quite adjacent to the Workhouse, and where those boys were in the habit of frequenting during the night, we met the "Police Patrol" lying in ambush near the House, and accompanied by them we entered the House in question and found one of these boys named Pitt Sage, lying on some Hay in a corner, and having a coat of fire -

The Report of the Steward and other Officers was read, and Orders made thereon as follows:—

placed near him, — the Police arrested him, and on the following day they brought him before Mr. Kenny, M.P. who discharged him from custody on the grounds that the charge against him was insufficient to warrant his committal to Prison.

Miss Clannery, the newly appointed Hospital Nurse, arrived at the Workhouse on yesterday, and undertook the discharge of her duties in the Hospital.

Letter from Poor Law Commissioners No. 2162 of 1861, dated 31st October 1861, advertising to the Master's Report of the 25th ultimo, in reference to a sum of money stolen from the pauper Nurse of the Essex Hospital; and with regard to this subject stating that they understand that the Master of the Workhouse and the Schoolmistress have been absent on leave and that the Hospital had been placed in charge of the Master, also stating that they think in future whenever the Master is on leave of absence his substitute should reside in the workhouse,

The Commissioners request the Guardians will impress upon their officers the necessity of increased vigilance on their part with a view of preventing the occurrence of such a circumstance in future,

Ordered, That the Clerk be directed to read the foregoing Letter to the several Workhouse Officers,

Resolved, That the Clerk be directed not to allow the Board Room to be used for any purpose except for meetings of the Board of Guardians, or other business connected with the administration of the Poor Law,

Ordered, That the Master provide two proper fastenings to secure the Board Room Windows,

Resolved, That the Master be allowed a sum of £3. as remuneration for her extra services whilst acting as Hospital Nurse for a period of five weeks,

Gentlemen,

Referring to the letter addressed to the Poor Law Commissioners on the 22nd ultimo, by M^r. Thomas Hardiman, M^p. of Wallingford, complaining of the circumstances under which a poor woman named Margaret Deav, has been recently admitted to the workhouse, I beg to report that on Sunday the 21st ultimo, I received an application for relief from the poor woman, and forthwith proceeded to the house in which she resided, which is situated in the Townland of Rathnacreeva in the Electoral Division of Kesh, — I found her in a weak condition suffering from old age and general debility, but she did not complain of any sickness, that once, offered to provide her with some

meat

Meat and such other necessaries food as she might require, and to get the Medical Officer of the District to visit her; she refused to take anything from me, and said that she was only desirous of being admitted to the Workhouse, whom she had been previously an inmate, her friends, and the Parish Priest of Mayo, joined in her request, and I considered it advisable to comply with it.

I provided the covered spring Vehicle for her removal, and also a sufficient quantity of warm bed-clothes, and gave her some on the journey, — a friend of her own accompanied her to the Workhouse,

And since that I did not send for the Medical Officer to visit Margaret Carr prior to her removal, or obtain her certificate of her fitness to be removed.

Margaret Carr, who is a Mendicant Beggar, is 80 years of age, and she has no residence of her own in the District, — she is now in the Workhouse Hospital.

to take the necessary steps for their safe removal to the Asylum,

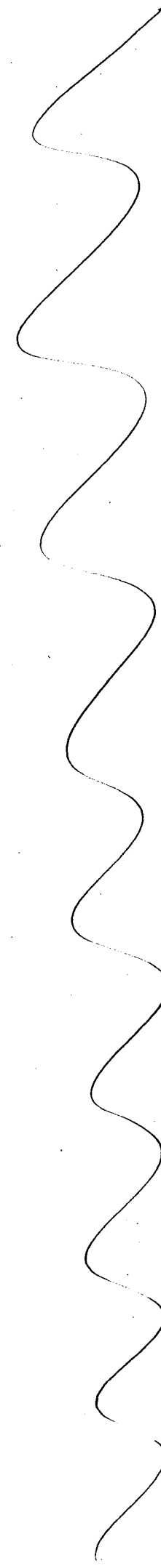
