Prisoners' Sunday

The rich man kept his wealth, but he was sad. The gospel reminds us that full and true happiness is found, not in possessions and reputation, but in the way we share our lives in love with God and others.





Many people have little understanding of our prisons and of those incarcerated there. The media highlights major crimes such as murder, assault, and drug dealing which can give the impression that our prisons are full of dangerous people.

However, 70% of those who are imprisoned are serving less than 12 months for less serious offences, many of whom could be dealt with by non-custodial penalties. Our prisons are overcrowded, full of drugs and increasingly violent places. 70% of those sent to prison have an addiction, serve their sentence in a drug-filled environment, and are released again with an addiction. 70% have a mental health problem, which usually gets worse during their sentence. The majority of those in prison come from seriously deprived areas. Many are homeless coming into prison and are released again into homelessness. Most prisoners have issues that were never adequately addressed by society. Indeed, the Irish Prison Service is the only public service available to the poor for which there is no waiting list. And it costs €84,000 to keep someone in prison for a year! The overcrowding in our prisons means that opportunities for rehabilitation are not possible for most prisoners and many come out worse than they came in. We often neglect to consider the impact of imprisonment on the families of prisoners. Imprisonment does not just affect the person sent to prison, but also damages, and sometimes destroys, family relationships. Perhaps it is society, even more than prisoners, that needs rehabilitation.



BISHOPS' PASTORAL LETTER ON IMMIGRATION:

This weekend, the Bishops of Ireland have published a pastoral letter "A Hundred Thousand Welcomes?" which explores what hospitality for migrant people means in contemporary Ireland. Migration presents many challenges for all involved: immigrants seeking safety & a better future, as well as for Governments and communities responsible for providing shelter & support. The parable of the Good Samaritan reminds us that our neighbour includes all, regardless of ethnicity or status. In their letter, the Irish Bishops urge us to contemplate the causes of migration and the gifts that migrants bring to our Church and our country. An example given is our own Irene Nunes,

who came from Brazil to Ballyhaunis 13 years ago and now serves as Sacristan and a member of the Parish Pastoral Council. Irene speaks of the strong sense of belonging and community that she and others have experienced in our parish. As Irish society changes, the Church is tasked with welcoming and

integrating migrants. Parishes are urged to oppose fear and recognise the image of God in every migrant, regardless of nationality. The Bishops are urging us all to welcome and advocate for migrants. NATURE TIP FROM BALLYHAUNIS TIDY TOWNS:

Now is the perfect time to collect and plant seeds from our native trees. Good seeds to plant are Rowan, Hawthorn & Elderberries. The flowers from these native trees are a valuable food source for our pollinators in the Spring. Collecting and growing seeds from healthy Irish trees is the best way to ensure that local trees can flourish, and gaps are restored in native species. While it doesn't directly support pollination, Oak is also an important tree for biodiversity, so pick up some acorns if you're out for a walk and find somewhere suitable to plant them locally.
