The Minutes of last Meeting were read and signed.

The Warehouse Register was produced, examined, and authenticated, from No. 656 to No. 667, both inclusive, by the signature of the Chairman, and countersignature of the Clerk.

The Out-door Relief Register was produced, examined, and authenticated from No. — to No. — inclusive, by the signature of the Chairman and countersignature of the Clerk.

The Clerk's Report on the execution of Orders previously made by the Board was read to the following effect:

With reference to the letter of the Poor Law Commissioners dated 26th July 1864 - L^o 14534/1864 on the subject of the disallowances made by the Auditor at his recent Audit of the Union's Accounts for the half Year ended 25th March last, and the Relieving Officer having stated that he applied to John Lyons for repayment of the sum of £3 which was advanced to him by way of loan and that he expressed his willingness to repay it in instalments, It was

Ordered,

That the promissory note of John Lyons joined by a solvent surety be taken for the sum in question payable by three instalments and that the Relieving Officer be directed to witness the execution of the note by the parties referred to,

Letter from ⁹ Mr. James Hammon late Poor Rate Collector dated September 7th 1864 requesting that the Board would grant him a Cheque for his Poundage,
The Board declined to make an order in reference to the foregoing as Mr. Hammon has failed to arrange with Mr. Weston Sol^r in regard to his claim for the Costs of the proceedings taken against Mr. Hammon and his Sureties by order of the Board,

The Report of the Finance Committee was read and approved, and Cheques were duly drawn for the several accounts recommended to be paid,

The Board appointed Mr. John Kelly to the Office of Poor Rate Collector for the Electoral Division of Kilmore in this Union at a remuneration of six pence in the pound on the Amount Collected and lodged by him in the place of James Hammon who was declared unfit to be entrusted with the Collection of any future Rate,

The Board also appointed Mr. John Curry to the Office of Poor Rate Collector for the Electoral Divisions of Knock Walk, and Knock South in this Union at a remuneration of six pence in the pound on the Amount Collected and lodged by him in the place of James Conry who was removed by an order under Seal from the Office of Poor Rate Collector,

With reference to the Case of preparing the Collecting Book of the New Rates for each Electoral Division of the Union, It was

Ordered,

Ordered

That the Gen. Sew. Commission be requested to sanction the payment from the Union funds of the cost of the preparation of the Books in question at the Rate of 2/6 per Book as was allowed last year.

On the application of a Man named Nyles Halligan the Board granted him a further extension of the time allowed him for the repayment of the Balance Outstanding A/c. of the Amount granted him as Relief by way of loan until the first October Next.

The Board Ordered that duplicate Rate Receipts be issued to Messrs John C. Urrachew E. Q., John Muntagh J. M. & John E. Q., and John Poland & Hayo C. Directors.

at the expense of the Ratepayers of the Mayo Electoral
Division of this Union for two Years in the St.
Mary's Asylum for the Blind at Portobello
Dublin, it appears that the parents of
the girl in question resided in this Union at the
time when she was sent to the above institution,
but that they have been lately residing in the Westport
Union for more than twelve Months, and therefore
this Board would suggest that the Cost of her
Maintenance in the Asylum for at least one Year
should be defrayed by the Board of Guardians
of the Westport Union, otherwise it could not be
expected that the Amount hitherto expended in her
Industrial Training would be productive of the
desired result namely, to enable the blind girl to
earn her livelihood by her own industry. The Board
