GOSPEL John 2:1-11

A reading from the holy Gospel according to John.

There was a wedding at Cana in Galilee. The mother of Jesus was there, and Jesus and his disciples had also been invited. When they ran out of wine, since the wine provided for the wedding was all finished, the mother of Jesus said to him, 'They have no wine.' Jesus said, 'Woman, why turn to me? My hour has not come yet.' His mother said to the servants, 'Do whatever he tells you.' There were six stone water jars standing there, meant for

the ablutions that are customary among the Jews: each could hold twenty or thirty gallons. Jesus said to the servants. 'Fill the jars with water,' and they filled them to the brim. 'Draw some out now' he told them 'and take it to the steward.' They did this; the steward tasted the water, and it had turned into wine. Having no idea where it came from - only the servants who had drawn the water knew - the steward called the bridegroom and said, 'People generally serve the best wine first, and keep the cheaper sort till the guests have had plenty to drink; but you have kept the best wine till now.'

This was the first of the signs given by Jesus: it was given at Cana in Galilee. He let his glory be seen, and his disciples believed in him.



Catholic Schools Week begins

Each Sunday liturgy is like a wedding feast in which Jesus is the bridegroom showing his love for us, - his bride - by providing food and drink for our innermost needs.





This Sunday we return to what the Church calls 'Ordinary Time' where we read the accounts of Jesus' earthly ministry. However, there is nothing 'ordinary' about this as it is during these weeks that we hear about all the extra-ordinary things that Jesus did during his earthly life. Today's Gospel is one example. John calls

this account a sign, something that points us to a deeper reality. In the Jewish tradition, a wedding was a symbol for the Kingdom of God and Jesus regularly used the image of a feast to refer to God's dream for our world.

At this wedding feast we are told that Jesus provides an extraordinary amount of wine for the celebration. "There were six stone water jars...each holding twenty or thirty gallons" (Jn 2:6), a minimum of 500 litres. By today's standards that is just over 600 bottles of wine! Not only is this a huge amount, it is also the best wine the guests have had. Sounds like a great party! But remembering that this wedding event is showing us something of who Jesus is, what the Kingdom of God is like and how God operates in our lives, we might focus on the generosity of Jesus in this story today. When have you experienced great generosity? How have you been generous to others?

The stone jars held the water used in purification rituals. This story is a significant reminder of how Jesus can transform something which has become stale into something that brings joy, new life and invites people to dance and celebrate. As followers of Jesus, we too are called to be agents of generosity, celebration and transformation. What in your life needs transformation today?

"Transformation...begins with the people of God who start turning the things of death into things of life. And the kings and presidents and nations will follow." (Shane Claiborne).



CONFIRMATION: The enrolment Mass for Confirmation takes place at the 7.30pm Mass next Saturday evening 25th January. All candidates and their parents are expected to attend. This marks the start of the preparation programme for the Sacrament. "You Shall Be My Witness" is the programme which will be delivered over the coming weeks by parent leaders & volunteers. The Confirmation ceremony will take place in Knock Basilica on Thursday 13th March at 12 noon.

CHILDREN'S LITURGY takes place at the 10am Mass this Sunday 19th January. Children aged 4-8 are invited into the Sacristy during Mass, and will return to their parents after Communion.

CHURCH REFURBISHMENT: Phase One of the planned works get underway this week, as the entire interior of the Church will be repainted. This will be followed by a complete rewiring of the building and the installation of a new modern, more energy-efficient lighting system, emergency lighting, fire alarms and signed emergency exits. Our weekday Masses will take place in the Community Hall for the duration of the works. This has worked well over recent days, and the 10am Mass will continue to be livestreamed on www.ballyhaunisparish.ie and on www.mcn.live. Just choose the option for Mobile Camera (instead of Main Camera) to view our daily Masses online. Weekend Masses, funerals and baptisms will continue to be celebrated in the church. For those who like to pop in during the day to say a prayer & light a candle, access remains open for now to the Blessed Sacrament chapel and the candelabra close to the chapel entrance. The aim is to have the majority of this Phase One work completed before Holy Week. We appreciate the help of volunteers over the past week in preparing the church for painting, and preparing the Hall for morning Mass.

This is a Tax Rebate Scheme which is of considerable financial benefit to the parish. Parishioners who are taxpayers and who contribute €250 or more per year to the Church, by way of the weekly collections or the quarterly priests' collections, can participate by completing the CHY3 Cert, which is valid for 5 years. It will not place any additional cost on you, but is an important part of our income. If you receive a cert, but are <u>not</u> eligible for tax, please sign the section at the bottom of the letter, and return to the Parish Office, so we can update our records.
